Another feature of the gallery's program this year will be children's art lesson. Classes are held each week for seven weeks between 1:30 and 3 p.m. All supplies are furnished and tuition is charged. On Mondays children from kindergarten age through the third grade will meet; on Wednesdays, fourth through sixth grade students will study, and on Fridays classes will be conducted for seventh through ninth grade students.
