That's the reason for both wonderment and hope to Dr. Salvatore P. Lucia who is a highly regarded medical scientist, a professor of medicine, and a conspicuous scientific friend of the wine.

His wonder is that in such a short time the "experimental method," which is backbone of modern science, has given scientific backing to accumulated medical folklore and superstitions of the ages as they bear on wine as a remedy for whatever ails you.

Scientists Study Data Gathered During Eclipse

By United Press International Scientists today studied photographs and other data gathered during Saturday's total eclipse for possible secrets of the solar system.

At Boston, Mass., the sun was obscured 94.4 per cent. At Seattle, Wash., the percentage was 63.3. In the southern States, only about half of the sun was blotted out.

Looking for Answers Scientists, equipped with all the gear modern technology has devised to observe celestial phenomena, were stationed at vantage points along the way looking for answers to some of the puzzles surrounding an event as old as the solar system itself.

Death Again With Wartime Buddies During Reunion

By CHARLES H. WILSON, JR. San Francisco—(UPI)—Two men, thrown together by a brush with death during World War II, met for the first time since the war in a modest suburban home here a few days ago, and again death was a silent companion.

The reunion was at the home of Robert F. Brown who survived his first brush with death when his fighter plane was shot down over the Netherlands in 1944.

Now, at the age of 41 and with an attractive wife and two children, Brown is again fighting for his life. Only this time the enemy is cancer and Brown knows he will succumb to the disease "in a month or so."

His visitor was Jon Ket, a Dutch army captain who fought World War II in the shadows of the Dutch underground. It was Ket who hid Brown from the Nazis during the war and who, when he learned of his friend's disease, rushed to San Francisco for their first and final reunion.

When Ket found he could not afford the trip, Prince Bernard of the Netherlands, who had led the Dutch underground resistance during the war, offered to supply funds.

Ket was able to spend only two days with Brown, and the little time they had together was filled with the memories of the five months they spent together in the underground.
