## Alcoholism Problem Among Navajo Tribe

Gallup, N.M. - The unique aspects of alcoholism among the Navajo Indian tribe are bringing, after a century of delay, some unique attempts at a solution.

Social workers, medical authorities and law enforcement personnel agree that alcoholism among the Navajos, while serious, probably is little or no more widespread than among non-Indians.

The Navajo has inherited an unsavory reputation for heavy drinking because in most cases he must do it in public, on city streets, in parks and on highways leading into the reservation.

It is illegal to sell liquor on the sprawling 2,500-square mile reservation covering parts of New Mexico, Utah and Arizona, but bootlegging is widespread.

**Health Problem**

Mrs. Annie Wauneka, a member of the Navajo Tribal council, says alcoholism now is the Number 1 health problem among her people.

The problem is peculiar because first, a Navajo seldom feels shame at being jailed for drunkenness and second, because the hard core of alcoholics among tribal members has proven virtually incurable for more than a century.

Several pilot projects have been tried with the aim of separating the Navajo from his thirst for "firewater." Al-

though all such projects are hampered by a perpetual lack of funds, two in particular show promise of making inroads on Indian alcoholism.

**Honor System**

Gallup city magistrate Lidio Rainaldi has inaugurated a "court honor system" aimed at rehabilitation of chronic drunks.

Rather than a jail sentence, Rainaldi gives hardened drunks the alternative of appearing at Monday night lectures designed to show, through lectures, movies and group discussions, the evils of drink.

Rainaldi says 15 of the most consistent offenders were put on the program at the start and, in the first weeks, "only two were drunk. And they are sober now."

Dave Hayworth, a U.S. Public Health Service social worker at Shiprock, N.M., on the edge of the reservation, also has shown progress with a program he has worked out.

**Screens Candidates**

Hayworth screens "candidates" at the Shiprock hospital to determine the extent of their drinking problem, their motivations and attitude toward "taking the cure."

He sends those found acceptable to Turquoise Lodge, an alcoholic rehabilitation center in Albuquerque operated by the New Mexico Commission on Alcoholism, for a two-week "drying out period."

The big change in treatment, however, comes when the patient returns home to the reservation. Hayworth and co-workers continue to work with him, interviewing him at least once a month either at the hospital or at the hogan (mud hut) on the reservation.

Hayworth says the recovery percentage so far is 65 per cent. He adds that, among the 5 million confirmed alcoholics in the United States, the recovery percentage is only 23 per cent.

**AA Catches On**

Alcoholics Anonymous groups also are beginning to catch hold among the Indian population, social workers report.

A large part of the problem lies in the fact, Mrs. Wauneka says, that "the Navajo doesn't know what drinking socially is." Rather than sit in a quiet bar drinking a martini, a Navajo will buy a 60-cent pint of sweet tokay wine, go outside and down it within minutes.

"The Navajo people don't know how to drink," Mrs. Wauneka says, "and the only way to help is to educate them. I don't know if we ever will."

## Small Worlds Around Us

**The Strange Life of the Little Cabbage Butterfly**

Mrs. Housewife carefully selects the food she will offer her family. Mrs. Cabbage Butterfly does, too. Both are particular in selecting the proper kind which includes that with the most nourishment and the better taste. Although small, most insect larva probably have taste buds or most species show a decided preference for a certain kind of plant.

Most female insects are very particular as to the species of plant on which they lay their eggs in order to assure the newly hatched larva of having the proper kind of food during its early infancy. The egg laying female will search long and diligently for that one particular plant species and shows remarkable accuracy in her selection.

The newly hatched larva, with its taste buds functioning joyously, begins the munching as soon as it is born; it eats just the right kind of food to assure its early and satisfactory development. After reaching adulthood, it will have the same in-born knowledge of plant selection as did its parent.

The yellow or white sulphur butterfly flutters over the cabbage patch. It will completely ignore other fields of vegetation to reach that cabbage patch for those green bulging heads. There the eggs are placed. Mrs. Butterfly will only leave the cabbage patch if there is a cauliflower field nearby. If neither is available, she will deposit her eggs on some other member of the mustard family plants, to which the cabbage and the cauliflower belong.

The eggs are usually deposited singly, out of sight, under the leaf. Each egg is long and pointed at both ends. The larva, so disgustingly familiar to nearly everyone that has seen a head of cabbage, are slender, greenish or a dirty white color, with darker colored stripes along each side of the naked body. Their damage to the cabbage and cauliflower crops reaches staggering proportions, some estimates being as high as 20 per cent of the crop each year.

The cabbage butterfly, mother of the cabbage worm, probably the least desirable of all the butterflies in this usually respected and admired group, has been fluttering over our cabbage fields for about 100 years. The first egg, or larva, came over from Europe. But now, the field of operations has enlarged to cover nearly all of the U.S. and large sections of Canada.

During dry weather, great numbers of cabbage butterflies congregate on exposed mud flats beside ponds, ditch banks or small streams. They seem to select one of these wet spots and visit it every day, sometimes in numbers so great that they appear to resemble snow banks.

The male cabbage butterfly is only about an inch across both wings, but he's a pug-
