

Pennant Still in Sight As Giants Top Mets 9-1

San Francisco—Juan Marichal, a big winner with the so-so San Francisco Giants served notice today that they still can win the pennant.

"We're 8½ games behind Los Angeles but there still are a lot of games to be played," the smiling right hander said Tuesday night after hurling the Giants to a four-hit, 9-1, victory over the New York Mets.

"And we're in much better shape now than last year when we were four games back of the Dodgers in mid-

September," he added. "We won that pennant and we have a good chance to win this one."

The two teams meet in the second game of their three-game series today, with Jack Sanford (9-11) attempting to make it three straight for the Giants. He opposes the Mets' Al Jackson (6-11).

Marichal, with Willie Mays crashing two homers, rolled to his 16th win of the season Tuesday night, while luckless Roger Craig of the Mets was battered into the showers for this 15th straight loss.

"I'm swinging pretty good, but I dunno if I'm breaking

out of any slump or not," Mays said when told that he has collected 10 hits in his last 20 trips to the plate and nudged his average up to .274.

Mays made his 100th hit of the season a two-run homer off Craig in the second inning that dispatched the Mets hurler to the showers, then smashed one off lefty Ken Mackenzie in the sixth for homer number 21.

The Giants got Marichal seven runs in the first two frames, three of them unearned tallies that came across during the first.

An error by center fielder Joe Hicks, who had wrecked the Giants in New York six nights ago with a clutch homer, let one unearned run across in the first and set up two others that tallied on Jim Davenport's single.

Craig, now 2-17, then was bombed for four straight hits and four more runs—all earned—in the next inning. Mays' first homer of the game caused manager Casey Stengel to rush in reliever Larry Bear-

Yankee Runaway Continues

New York—(UPI)—The New York Yankees are running off with the American league pennant and those fellows with the footprints on their backs are the Los Angeles Angels.

The Angels were run over by the romping, tromping Yankees for the second day in a row Tuesday, losing 7-0, with New York's substitute players doing most of the damage.

A well-known frontliner, Whitey Ford, who has a remarkable 15-3 pitching record this season—took the mound against the Angels today in the windup of their three-game Yankee stadium series. Righthander Don Lee, 4-5, drew the starting assignment for Los Angeles.

It was a frustrating game for Bill Rigney's team Tuesday night as ex-Dodger Stan Williams, who has had his troubles this season, blanked the Angels on four hits before a Los Angeles rally in the eighth. Then ex-Senator Steve Hamilton took over with the bases loaded and none out. He proceeded to strike out Leon Wagner, Lee Thomas and Billy Moran to end the inning.

The Angels loaded the sacks again in the ninth with one out, but Hamilton showed he was up to the situation again by fanning Albie Pearson and getting Jim Fregosi to hit into a force play to end the game.

Starter Paul Foytack kept the Yankees scoreless for the first three innings, but was tagged for a solo home run by Johnny Blanchard in the fourth inning. In the sixth, however, the Yankees ran away with six more runs.

The six-run inning was punctuated by Blanchard's second home run of the game, this time with two men on base. Cleve Boyer also homered, his 11th of the season. Blanchard, batting .225 going into the game, was filling in for the sidelined Roger Maris in right field.

Third baseman Frank Kostro, recently brought up from Hawaii, went 2-for-4 for the second straight night, but was not brought around by his teammates in either game. Los Angeles left 11 runners on base Tuesday night.

Harvey Tonn of the Central Point entry in the Jackson County Softball Association, last year's batting champ in the major league, is leading the loop again this year, according to statistics compiled from major league games through July 15.

Tonn had an average of .391 as of that date, with 9 hits in 23 trips to the plate. Tonn barely qualifies for the official lead in the batting race, as no batter with fewer than 23 times at bat was counted officially in the statistics.

Next highest average belongs to Jess Munyon of John Wheeler with .382. Dale McCarty of Wheeler has .375, Vern Parent of Central Point .372, Les Walker of Jay Allen .367 and Wayne Gillaspie of Southern Oregon Dry Kiln .357.

No one on the United Grocers team who has been to the plate 23 or more times is above .300. The best mark is held by Dale Matheny with .289.

Jay Allen, league leader, leads in team batting with a .301 mark.

In pitching stats, Milan Kurtz of John Wheeler has the best record, 8-0. Willie Barnum of Jay Allen is 6-0. Strikeout king of the league is Jim Van Zwol of Central Point, who has fanned 109.

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Red Sox Give Turley A Try

Boston—(UPI)—The Boston Red Sox will try one time New York fireballer Bob Turley in a renewed bid to check the Yankees' threatened American league runaway.

The Red Sox announced last night that they had signed the veteran Turley just a few hours after he was declared a free agent by Los Angeles. The 32-year-old righthander was not claimed after being placed on the waiver list by the Angels three days ago.

Turley was given his release after posting a 2-7 record in 19 appearances with Los Angeles. Oddly, his two victories were shutouts, one and three-hitters, and he impressed the Red Sox though losing to them earlier this season.

The indefinite status of veteran Boston starter Gene Conley, who has been on the disabled list for nearly a month, contributed to the Turley signing.

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Hydroplane Qualifies
