

Walt Alston Not Ready To Push on Panic Button

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Manager Walter Alston of the Los Angeles Dodgers was not ready to hit the panic button today despite his club's four-game losing streak—three of them to the hot Philadelphia Phillies.

"We might have been playing over our heads earlier," Alston said after the Phillies captured a 7-4 decision Sunday. "Now we may be playing under par."

"But if we had to have a losing streak I would rather it came early than at the end of the season like last year," Alston said. The Phillies were playing sizzling baseball and caught the league-leading

Dodgers cooling off after a hot road trip but the Dodger manager said he would take a dozen base hits every day and would win most games with that type of attack.

Sandy Koufax, whose defeat last Thursday by the Pittsburgh Pirates started the four-game losing streak for the Dodgers, comes back tonight in the hope of snapping the string of losses at the expense of the veteran Cal McLish.

Drysdale Stopped
Sunday's loss went to Don Drysdale who had compiled three straight wins during July before tasting his first defeat. But Alston would not fault the tall hurler too much although he gave up a three-run homer to catcher Cal Darymple that put the Phillies ahead in the sixth and they never relinquished the lead.

The manager was more concerned about the two-run homer reliever Ron Perranoski gave up in the seventh inning because the chunky fire man lately has failed to keep the ball low. He hung a curve to outfielder John Callison that brought the Phillies their second homer of the game.

"I don't contemplate any drastic changes," Alston continued. "I might move a few men up and down in the batting order, but as of the moment those are the only switches I have in mind."

Nellie Fox Socks 2,500th Hit of Major Loop Career

Nelson Fox is elbowing his way into the class of baseball immortals, one base at a time. He won't be remembered for his power, nor for his physique, but the scrappy Chicago second baseman who is a throwback to the long ago heroes of baseball will command as many lines in the record books as some of the game's most notable sluggers.

Fox reached another milestone Sunday when he notched the 2,500th hit of his major league career. Typically, it was a single, and typically it turned into the winning run as the White Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles, 4-1.

Only 39 other players have reached the 2,500-hit plateau. Five of them were second basemen, and all now have a place in the Hall of Fame. It's big company indeed for Fox, an unimposing five foot, nine-inch, 160-pounder.

Yankees Split
In other American league games, the New York Yankees overcame the Minnesota Twins, 3-2, after dropping the opener of a doubleheader, 5-1; the Los Angeles Angels swept a twinbill from the Boston Red Sox, 5-0 and 5-4; the Detroit Tigers beat the Washington Senators twice, 3-2 and 7-4; and the Kansas City Athletics stopped the Cleveland Indians, 3-0, in the first game but dropped the nightcap, 12-7.

Will Dodgers Blow Flag Again? Lead Shrinks to 4 1/2 Overnight

Say it ain't so, Walter. You don't often say much but Dodger fans from the Brooklyn Gowanus to the Malibu freeway need a word of assurance today.

That once-imposing seven-game National league lead is down to 4 1/2 games almost overnight and the memory of the 1962 collapse is still fresh. Those San Francisco Giants have won seven straight and the St. Louis Cardinals are in exactly the same striking range, too.

Can it happen again? Well, the Dodgers held a four-game lead as late as Sept. 20 last season and contrived to blow the flag. So, it looks like it could be the same old cliff-hanging suspense again this year.

The Giants rolled to their seventh straight victory by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-1, Sunday while the Philadelphia Phillies beat Los Angeles, 7-4, and handed the Dodgers their fourth loss in a row. The St. Louis Cardinals lost an opportunity to gain important ground when

they dropped a doubleheader to the Chicago Cubs, 5-1 and 16-11, but are tied for second place with the Giants.

Braves Beat Reds
The Milwaukee Braves scored a 5-2 victory after losing to the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3, and the Houston colts dealt the New York Mets their 22nd consecutive road loss, 8-2, in other National league games.

Willie Mays' two-run sixth inning homer enabled the Giants to take a 2-1 lead and Jack Sanford hung on with an eight-inning to snap his six-game losing streak and raise his record to 10-11. Don Schwall surrendered all the San Francisco runs in 6 1/3 innings and lost his fifth game of the season.

The Phillies scored their 11th victory in 13 games on homers by Clay Dalrymple and Johnny Callison that drove in five runs. Callison's homer was the first by a left-handed batter off Ron Perranoski since the Dodger relief ace entered the majors. Relief pitcher John Boozer won his second game for the Phillies and 13-game winner Don Drysdale suffered his 11th loss.

Aims for 20
A crowd of 40,222, the Cubs' largest since June 1, 1952, saw Dick Ellsworth strike out 10 and pitch a seven-hitter for his 15th win. Then the Cubs unleashed a 16-hit attack, including two homers by Lou Brock and one each by Billy Williams and Jim Schaffer to win a nightcap slugfest in which nine homers were hit.

Gene Freese drove in three runs with a homer and a double and Jim Maloney went seven innings to increase his season record to 16-3 in the

opener for the Reds. But the Braves came back to split the doubleheader on the strength of Denny LeMaster's six-hit pitching and two hits each by Denis Menke, Lee Maye and Joe Torre.

The Colts extended the Mets' losing streak on the road to 22 games, equalling the all-time record set by the 1890 Pittsburgh Pirates, on the strength of the six-hit pitching of Ken Johnson and the homers of Carl Warwick and John Bateman. The Colts wrapped up the win with four runs in the first inning to hand Al Jackson his 13th defeat.

Giants Try For Eighth Win in Row

San Francisco — (UPI) — Manager Alvin Dark, quietly pleased by the return of the pitching and hitting which won the San Francisco Giants a pennant last year, gave a right-hander Gaylord Perry (1-3) a chance today to try their winning streak to eight straight.

"Jack Sanford pitched a good game and Willie Mays came up with the big home run — the combination that won the pennant for us last year," Dark said following Sunday's 3-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. "We have not played good ball all the time during this streak. But we certainly got two well-pitched games over the week end."

Tied for Second
As a result the Giants moved into a second-place tie with St. Louis, four and one-half games behind the league-leading Los Angeles Dodgers.

Juan Marichal became the winning pitcher in the major leagues Saturday when he hurled the Giants to a 3-1 victory over the Pirates who blew the game with three errors in the eighth inning. Juan now is 17-6.

Then a crowd of 32,412 watched Sanford give up eight hits Sunday but get some sharp support that helped him post his first win since July 18 after he had lost six in a row.

Manager Danny Murtaugh, his Pirates now losers in eight of their last 11, and are winless this year at Candlestick Park, was to lead with Earl Francis (3-5) today in the final contest of the four game series.
