Portland—UPB—A contract covering 20,000 employees at 49 pulp and paper mills on the Pacific Coast has been ratified by the members of two unions, it was announced Tuesday.

Representatives of the United Papermakers and Paperworkers and the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers reached agreement on the pact earlier this month with officials from the Pacific Coast Association of Pulp and Paper Manufacturers.

The mills are located in Oregon, Washington and California. Oscar W. Robertson of Portland, union chairman at the negotiations, announced the ratification but would not disclose the vote.

A similar contract was rejected by the union's membership last month. However, there was no threat of a strike.

The one-year pact, which is retroactive to June 1, includes benefits of about 10 cents an hour. It puts minimum hourly wage rates at \$2.37 for men, \$2.10 for women and \$3.34 1/2 for journey-men mechanical employees.

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Fadeley Argues Against Proposed Title on Ballot

Salem—UPB—The ballot title on the proposed tax referendum prepared by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Thornton "describes a few trees but not the forest," the Oregon Supreme Court was told Tuesday.

The statement came from State Sen. Edward Fadeley (D-Eugene) attorney for a Lane county group which has challenged Thornton's ballot title.

The high court held a 40 minute hearing on the ballot title appeal Tuesday afternoon.

It is expected to make a swift decision in the case, clearing the way for circulation of petitions calling for a referendum on the 1963 legislature's bill to raise an added \$60 million in tax revenues.

Petition Deadline Sept. 1 Foes of the tax increase plan have until Sept. 1 to collect 23,185 names if they are to bring the question to a vote in October.

The court can either affirm the ballot title Thornton has prepared, substitute one proposed by Fadeley, or write its own version.

Fadeley argued the Thornton title failed to set out the chief purpose of the bill—to raise money needed to balance the state's budget.

Donald Burnett, State Tax Commission attorney, defended the ballot title which Thornton submitted.

He noted the tax proposal makes 38 substantial changes in the state's tax law, 11 of them major ones, and the ballot title is limited by law to 25 words.

Burnett said the proposed Thornton ballot title is designed to list those which would have the greatest impact.

Fadeley said the Thornton ballot title failed to mention the liberalized treatment for capital gains taxes which would affect about 90,000 persons and the special treatment for heads of households which would affect 30,000.

He noted also that the title failed to mention the substitution of tax credits for personal exemptions which will affect all taxpayers.

Sonic Boom Said Part of Jet Age Los Angeles—UPB—Sonic booms are part of the jet age and a citizen's only recourse is to file a claim for damages.

So said Col. James K. Howling of the North American Defense Command, Denver, Colo., when he was asked to appear Tuesday before the city council following a sonic blast last week that shook most of the city.

"The Air Force seeks to control the noise and vibration by regulation," he said. "But it is not always successful."

He said Air Force research has proved sonic booms cannot cause human injury but can crack plaster and break windows. He said that in such case a citizen should contact the nearest Air Force base for a claims form.

Simmons Agrees To Injunction Portland—UPB—Charles M. Simmons, five of his associates, and eight companies which they control agreed Tuesday to a preliminary injunction restraining them from offering securities to prospective investors.

The agreement, which followed a complaint filed last week by the federal government, was reached by Simmons' attorneys and the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission.

The complaint charged Simmons with various violations in security sales and investment contracts, and asked that a preliminary injunction be issued against him and the companies be placed in a receivership.

The government indicated most of the investments were in land, but said in the complaint that some were in purported charitable and educational institutions.

Singled out as part of the corporation complex, in addition to La Pine Acres, Inc., in central Oregon, were a senior citizens' residence development near Wilsonville and various Oregon and California lands.
