Security Council Votes Discipline Of Portugal

United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — The Security Council today approved by an 8-0 vote with the United States, Britain and France abstaining a watered down resolution disciplining Portugal for its policy in its overseas territories.

The resolution asks all countries to withhold from Portugal arms, military and other supplies "which would enable it to continue its repression of the peoples of the territories under its administration."

It calls upon Portugal to take steps in those territories—Angola, Mozambique and Portuguese Guinea—to grant self-determination and independence to the natives.

Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson said the United States abstained "primarily because we do not believe the resolution was drafted either in the language or form best calculated to achieve the results we all seek as quickly and harmoniously as possible."

Portugal's NATO allies stood beside her, Norway, after having tried unsuccessfully for two days to gain acceptance of amendments that would have toned down the measure even more, was the only NATO power to vote for discipline of the Lisbon government.

The approved resolution, for which Ghana, Morocco, the Philippines, Venezuela, Brazil, Norway, China and the Soviet Union voted, asks Secretary General Thant to give whatever assistance he deems necessary to carry out the resolution and to report to the council by Oct. 31. This was a month later than the sponsors originally had asked him to report.

New York — (UPI) — Stocks pushed ahead strongly today. Youngstown added nearly 1 in a firm steel group which included Jones & Laughlin and U. S. Steel up 1/2 each. Motors posted fractional gains.

Du Pont soared 2 1/4 in an otherwise quiet chemicals section and Continental Oil tacked on 3/4 in a narrow petroleum group, IBM skyrocketed 5 in a sharply higher electronics group while Beckman and Minneapolis - Honeywell rose nearly 2.

Bristol - Myers advanced 2 in the drugs. U.S. Smelting dropped 1 1/4 in the metals. Campbell Soup and Quaker Oats tacked on 1 each in the foods. Polaroid picked up 2 1/2 but Xerox sank 6 points.

FREEMAN IN WARSAW FOR SHORT VISIT
Warsaw — (UPI) — Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, the highest ranking American to visit Poland in four years, arrived by plane from Moscow today for a 70-hour visit.

VENEZUELA TERRORISTS AIRMAILING BOMBS
Maracaibo, Venezuela — (UPI) — Police revealed today that Communist terrorists have begun airmailing bombs to police officials fighting Red guerrillas.

EAST BERLINERS FLEE TO WEST DESPITE SHOTS
Berlin — (UPI) — Eastern border guards today fired 30 shots at two youths who scampered safely over the Berlin wall to the American sector.

BOLIVIA CONSIDERS STATE OF SIEGE
La Paz, Bolivia — (UPI) — The government was reported considering today the proclamation of a state of siege in the tin-rich mountains of south central Bolivia to curb unrest which might explode into large-scale violence.

Peking Campaign Seen To Harass Soviet Union

London — (UPI) — Communist China plans further attacks on Soviet policy and may match its militant propaganda with pinprick acts of aggression like this week's border incidents in Korea, it was learned today.

Authoritative sources said the new Peking campaign would be aimed at embarrassing Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's search for a settlement of cold war issues with the West.

They considered Peking's charge Tuesday that the Soviets "sold out" to the West in agreeing to a partial nuclear test ban the opening shot in the Chinese campaign.

Communist China continued its criticism of the test ban today, broadcasts monitored in Tokyo showed. It charged the Soviet leaders entered "partnership with the American wild men" by initiating the treaty.

In South Korea, Defense Minister Kim Sung Eun said today his entire 600,000-man armed forces are on alert against any Communist attempt to provoke a new war.

Creating Tension
He said he believes the North Korean attacks that killed three American soldiers were "aimed at creating tension here in order to check Soviet Russia from making approaches to the West."

The State Department said in Washington Tuesday that the Korean attacks may be part of a Peking campaign to increase tension in Asia.

In New Delhi, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru Tuesday night discussed the growing tension on India's border with China in a cabinet meeting.

The sources in London said Chinese Communist party Chairman Mao Tze-tung is said to have evaluated the failure of the ideological talks in Moscow and to have laid down the strategy for the next phase in the dispute.

They said Mao is prepared for a long campaign against Russia, working on these major fronts:

Series of Moves
— China may set in motion a series of cold war moves to harass the West and do harm to any Soviet-Western rapprochement. Besides North Korea, a loyal Peking satellite, and India, where the Chinese are directly involved, possible theaters of action could include Laos and South Viet Nam, where Chinese influence among local Communists is strong.

— It will seek to rally support for its hard line communism throughout the world, and is confident of growing backing among the "have-not" parties of Africa, Latin America, and Asia, with the exception of India.

— It will embark on a policy of self-sufficiency to combat what is now openly termed the "Soviet blockade of China." This will mean developing the Chinese economy, including the armed forces, so that cutoffs of Soviet aid can no longer be a threat.

— It will continue the personal attacks on Khrushchev and his peaceful coexistence policies. The sources said Peking's leaders are well aware they can expect little change as long as Khrushchev remains in power—unless peaceful coexistence fails.

Bee Stings Send Trio To Hospital

Corvallis — (UPI) — Bee stings hospitalized three persons, stung a fourth, killed one horse, and severely injured another here, city police reported Tuesday.

Hospitalized Monday night with more than 100 stings was Roberta Swearingin, 18, owner of one of the horses. Her mother, Ella, was stung more than 75 times, and her father, Ely, 83, was stung more than 50 times. They were reported in serious condition at the Good Samaritan hospital.

Duane V. Ogle, owner of the other horse, was kicked in the head and stepped on by one of the horses.

The melee at the Swearingin residence here started when one of the horses knocked over a beehive. Neighbors, firemen and ambulance crews were called to aid the injured and drive off the bees.

REPORT UNCONFIRMED
New Delhi, India — (UPI) — A spokesman for the Foreign Office said Monday it had "no information" on an Indian press report that Chinese Communists have stationed 2,000 planes in Tibet.
