## Eggplant Slices, Parmesan Cheese Add to Casserole

Summer living is easy and so is casserole cooking, especially when it is done with convenience foods. Even shopping is simpler when you buy the large size cans that serve four generously and six adequately. For instance, a 40-ounce can of spaghetti and meat balls is ready to be just spooned into a casserole for baking.

Give it a summer time lift with eggplant slices, coated with parmesan cheese, and browned appealingly before being added. Bake it all together for a simple and delicious family supper dish.

A bright green salad, crunchy and cool, and thin crisp bread sticks make fine accompaniments for this dish. The recipe for spaghetti-meat ball-eggplant casserole calls for one medium eggplant; four tablespoons parmesan cheese; five tablespoons cooking oil and one 40-ounce can of spaghetti and meat balls.

Set the oven at 375 degrees. Wash eggplant. Cut into about quarter inch slices. Coat eggplant slices with about two tablespoons of the cheese. Heat oil. Lightly brown eggplant slices. Drain on paper toweling. Cut in half.

Place spaghetti and meat balls in medium sized baking dish. Place eggplant slices, skin side up, into the spaghetti and meat balls. Sprinkle top with remaining cheese. Bake 20-25 minutes. Makes four to six servings.

To preserve the aroma of a cantaloupe and prevent it from permeating other foods, wash the melon, wrap it tightly in aluminum foil, transparent plastic wrap or several layers of wax paper, and refrigerate.

A small cantaloupe treat for small fry: remove the top from a small melon and scoop out seeds. Fill with a soft drink and a scoop of ice cream and serve with a straw.
