

# Nine Records Tumble in Girls' State Short Course Swim Meet at Jackson Park Pool

Terrific assault on association standards was recorded yesterday in the boys' preliminaries of the Oregon Association AAU Junior Olympic Short Course Swimming Championships at Jackson pool here.

A total of 14 records were shattered and one was tied. Seven marks fell among the senior boys, five among the juniors and two among the midgets. A junior mark was equalled.

The senior standards set were by Doug Ewen, Portland Aquatic club, 1:04.5 in the 100-yard backstroke; Bruce Hess, Medford, 2:00.7, in 200-yard freestyle; the Reedsport team of Larry Riley, Bob Plov, Lynn Wall and Steve Cary, 1:52.7, in the 200 medley relay and Riley, Plov, Wall and Hugh Mackenzie, 1:41 in the 200 freestyle relay; Ted Leovich, Multnomah Athletic club, 4:25.3 in the 400 freestyle, and 2:18.8 in the 200 individual medley, and Keith Marshall, 2:34.3 in the 200 breaststroke.

The junior records set were by Greg Vaughn, Reedsport, 28.7 in the 50 freestyle and 31.4 in the 50 backstroke; Tom

Coffee, Tualatin Hills, 29.1 in the 50 butterfly; the Eugene YMCA team of R. Courten, B. Huston, Randy King and Scott Wallace, 2:13 in the 200 medley relay, and Bernard Wolfard, Multnomah AC, 2:30.2 in the 200 individual medley.

Coffee tied the 101 record time in the 100 freestyle.

New midget marks were by Guerry Bethell, Multnomah AC, 35.8 in the 50 breaststroke, and Ricky Forman, Multnomah AC, 33.8 in the 50 butterfly.

Nine association records were broken, two by Multnomah Athletic club's intermediate team, Friday in the girls' competition of the annual Oregon Association AAU Junior Olympic Short Course Championships at the City of Medford's Jackson park pool.

Cheryl Jacobson, Eugene YMCA, Barbara Boone, North Bend, and Christie Wittliff, River Road, Eugene, were triple winners. And, two events each were won by Ruth Moreland, North Bend, and Janice Dolan and Paula Alekhus, Multnomah Athletic club, Portland.

The two-day meet concluded yesterday evening with boys' swim finals and boys' and girls' diving finals.

Multnomah's combine of Paula Alekhus, Judy Belford, Sherrie Jenkinson and Janice Dolan toured the 200-yard medley relay in new intermediate time of 2:08 then came back for a record of 1:57.8 in the next to last event of the Friday finals, the 200 freestyle relay.

Miss Alekhus also established a new mark of 2:14.5 in the intermediate individual 200 freestyle race. One other intermediate mark was shattered when Miss Dolan swam the 200-individual medley in 2:27.8.

Jill Crawford Wins

Senior standards fell to Jill Crawford, one of two Medford winners, and to the Eugene YMCA 200 freestyle relayers. Miss Crawford took the 200 freestyle individual event in 2:26.5. The Eugene team of Barbara Blenkins, Jacobson, Mary Bartle and Nancy Tillman, toured the evening's concluding race in 1:59.

In the junior division Miss Boone recorded a new time of 28.6 in the 500 freestyle. Ruth Moreland set a mark of 45.6 in the midget 50 breaststroke and the Eugene

Miss Jacobson won the 100 backstroke, the 400 freestyle and the 200 medley in the senior classification. Miss Boone took the 50 butterfly and the 100 medley as well as the 50 free for juniors.

Miss Wittliff's wins were in 50 free, 50 backstroke and 100 medley. The 10 junior backstroke was won by Miss Alekhus along with the 200 free. Along with her medley record Miss Dolan gained first in 50 free. Miss Moreland also won the 50 butterfly.

Medford's other winner was Rhonda Hess who beat out K. McMullen, Roseburg, for the senior blue ribbon in 100 butterfly.

Two runnersup beat the old records in their events. Lynn Sandberg was second in Miss Crawford in senior freestyle with 2:26.6. North Bend's senior relay team was second to Eugene Y in the 200 freestyle in 2:02.6.

The race program consisted of 34 events, seven in midget, eight in junior, nine in intermediate and 10 in senior.

His feat, however, will not be official because it was not performed during supervised weight-lifting competition, said Robert Radcliff of Medford who was the announcer for the event.

Kirkham said he hopes to establish an official world's record in competition in Portland next year.

# Grid Stars Win Over Green Bay

Chicago—(UP)—Eventual winners from Friday night's collegiate All-Star football win over the Green Bay Packers probably will be the Minnesota Vikings, the Chicago Bears and the Washington Redskins.

The Vikings have title to All-Star quarterback Ron VanderKelen, the Bears to place-kicking, pass-catching end Bob Jencks and the Redskins to pass-catcher Pat Richter.

They were the key men in the Stars 20-17 triumph, an upset scored by a two-touchdown underdog team that ignored the odds, and even Packer coach Vince Lombardi complimented his conquerors.

"We wanted to run," he said, "but they wouldn't let us. I thought we were up, but we just went flat. I expected them to play a fine game and they did."

VanderKelen, who played about 75 per cent of the game on offense, completed eight of 10 passes, one of them for

21 yards to Richter, his Wisconsin teammate, to set up a five-yard touchdown run by Iowa's Larry Ferguson, and another for 73 yards to Richter for the clinching touchdown.

But VanderKelen's other throws kept the Packer defense off balance to set up ground gains of 141 yards, and when the offense stalled, Jencks took over. He kicked field goals of 20 and 33 yards in addition to the point after both touchdowns.

The All-Star defense deserved equal credit. Arkansas' Danny Brabham was a line-backing standout in a defense

which permitted Bart Starr to complete only three of 13 passes in the first half and only 19 of 33 for the game for 169 yards.

Fullback Jim Taylor got both Packer touchdowns, on one-yard plunges, and Jerry Kramer got the other points, on two conversions and a 21-yard field goal.

The All-Star win, breaking a four-game collegiate losing streak in the series, also broke a 19-game Packer winning streak in exhibition games. It was the ninth collegiate win in the series in which the pros have won 19 with two ties.
