### Festival Concert Series to Open

Ashland — The 1963 Oregon Shakespearean Festival concert series of music and dance will premiere today at 3 o'clock in the Caesar room of the Mark Antony Hotel.

Music Director W. Bernard Windt and Choreographer Shirlee Dodge have announced a full slate of concert offerings, Elizabethan in theme, and employing the full complement of Festival vocalists, instrumentalists, and dancers. The series will be repeated each Sunday and Wednesday afternoons until mid-season, when a second bill will be inaugurated to continue the twice-weekly presentation. Various other dance and music numbers will be added throughout the run, and will be announced.

Included in the initial program will be dance suites based on contrasting themes derived from Shakespearean characters and plot situations such as Ophelia, witches, Henry V and Katherine, Portia, and mistaken identity. A vocal suite, based on Elizabethan tunes, will form the basis for a three-part dance

with movement style derived from pre-classic dance forms. Court Dances

A third suite of dances utilizes the full ensemble of musicians and dancers. Inspired by F. X. Richter's "Sinfonia de Camera," the work is based on early court dances of the Renaissance presented in a more embellished form.

A mixture of drama and dance will be seen in a sixteenth-century dialogue between an elderly dancing master and his eager young pupil. M. Arbeau, the master, instructs his gentleman student in the good manners of the social dance of their day. The instruction concerns the primary steps and movements found in the basse-dance.

Music for the dances had been arranged and scored by Mr. Windt, who has adapted the music to appropriate Renaissance interpretation by using the necessary types of instruments to afford strong color and variety. Choreographer Shirlee Dodge has employed creative use of pre-classic dance forms and styles.

The Festival concerts are presented for the benefit of the Festival's collection of instruments and scores. A nominal admission will be charged.
