League of Women Voters Concludes Aid Workshop

A taped interview with David Bell, administrator for the Agency for International Development, was heard at the final session of a League of Women Voters foreign economic aid workshop Tuesday.

Mr. Bell discussed the work of AID, which was established by Congress in 1961 to unify U.S. foreign aid administration and operations of the U.S. Development Loan Fund and the International Cooperation Administration.

Members of the League met on four Tuesday mornings in July to discuss proposed foreign economic aid legislation for 1963 which will soon emerge from congressional hearings.

In addition to reviewing the proposed legislation, the group studied LWV criteria "for sound and effective foreign economic aid" and the Clay committee's evaluation of aid programs.

They also discussed specific countries and areas which have received U.S. aid.

Report Reviewed

The League has stressed that the Clay report, issued in March by the Committee to

Strengthen the Security of the Free World (headed by General Lucius Clay), came out firmly in support of foreign assistance programs, although the committee did make proposals for changes in the program in order to achieve "the optimum security of the United States and the economic and political stability of the free world." Some of the proposals, such as increased emphasis on self-help and realistic "country plans" have been U.S. policy for some time, the League reports.

President Kennedy's aid message stated that his latest recommendations reflect the work of the Clay committee, "scrutiny" by the new AID administrator, and "the experience gained in our first full year of administering the new and improved program enacted by the Congress in 1961."

Support of the proposed foreign aid legislation by the League of Women Voters of the United States is based on features which correspond to LWV criteria. They are (1) self-help by recipient coun-

tries; (2) increased assistance by other developed countries; (3) improved coordination, staffing and administration; and (4) adequate financing of aid.

The non-partisan voters group is encouraging the writing of letters to Congressmen in support of the legislation.

Mrs. Elmdorff has been visiting here for the past month and during that time she and the Cothrin family visited Crater lake and other points of interest in southern Oregon.

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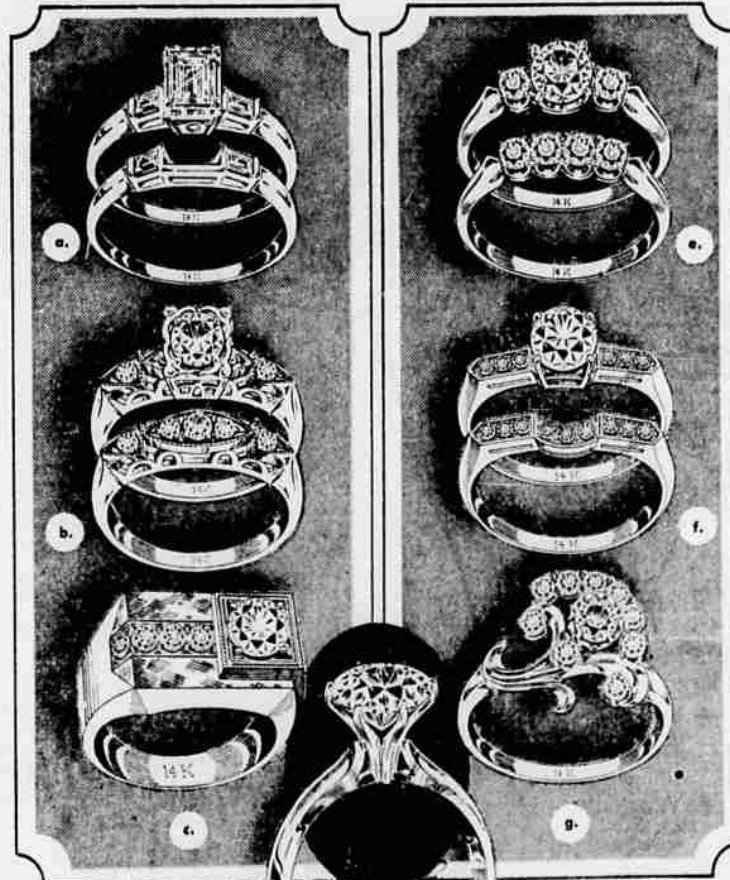
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
