### Guardsmen Start Second Week

Warrenton - Southern Oregon National Guardsmen reached the mid-point of annual summer training here Saturday, as they marched in the annual Governor's Day Review. Several hundred spectators were on hand. Gov. Mark O. Hatfield took the salute of some 1,050 men of the 249th Air Defense Artillery and supporting units. They filed past the reviewing stand under gray coastal skies, with a hint of rain in the air. Following the review, troops were given free time until resumption of training today. They return home Saturday, Aug. 10. Hatfield was joined on the reviewing stand by Maj. Gen. Paul L. Kliever, Oregon adjutant general; and Brig. Gen. Donald N. Anderson, assistant adjutant general and camp commander. Heading List - The list of other officials on hand were Maj. Gen. Frederick R. Zierath, commander of Ft. Lewis and 4th Infantry division; Brig. Gen. Carroll McColpin, Portland Air Defense Sector and

Adair Air Force Station commander. The governor presented the Eisenhower Trophy, awarded annually to the state's top Guard unit, to Albany's Battery C, Third Automatic Weapons Battalion, Capt. Darwynne Knoffer accepted the gleaming bronze loving cup. Medford, Ashland and Klamath Falls units of the Second Automatic Weapons Battalion passed the reviewing stand under command of Maj. Ardis Warren, Ashland, battalion commander. Leading their troops past the stand were First Lt. Paul D. Lovejoy, Headquarters Battery, Ashland; Capt. Raymond R. Harris, Battery A, Medford; Capt. Leonard D. Springer, Battery B, Klamath Falls; Capt. Richard L. Gilchrist, Battery C, Klamath Falls; and Capt. Charles E. Henry, Battery D, Medford.
