

Warwick Aids Old Lates As Colts Edge Giants, 6-5

Many major leaguers who are traded come back to haunt their old club - but not Carl Warwick.

The only regular in the majors who bats right and throws left did his old Los Angeles Dodgers teammates a big favor Monday night when he pitched the Houston Colts to a 6-5 comeback victory over the San Francisco Giants.

It was a tough setback for the Giants, who had hoped to pick up ground on the idle Dodgers. Instead, Al Dark's men dropped five games off the pace and into a second-place tie with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Warwick, who broke in to the majors with the Dodgers in 1961 before moving on to St. Louis and then Houston, knocked in the Colts' winning run with a line single that capped a two-run rally in the bottom of the ninth.

It was the third time the Colts had come from behind

in the game - the only one scheduled in the majors Monday. The Giants had tied the score at four-all in the eighth with the help of Willie McCovey's 33rd home run of the season and went ahead in the top of the ninth on another solo blast by Willie Mays, his 28th of the campaign.

Juan Marichal of the Giants and Houston's Don Nottebart - a pair of no-hit pitchers - duelled through the first seven innings but neither figured in the decision. Hal Woodeshick, who relieved Nottebart in the eighth, gained his ninth victory against six defeats and Jack Fisher (6-8) was the loser.

The two teams will meet in the second contest of the three-game series tonight, with Jim Duffalo (3-0) of the Giants scheduled to oppose Hector (Skinny) Brown (4-6) of the Colts.

Marichal was thwarted at still another shot at his 18th victory Monday night, despite the efforts of McCovey and Mays.

Marichal had allowed only three hits in seven innings, but was trailing by a score of 4-2 going into the top of the eighth. McCovey opened the frame with his 33rd homer of the year, and Mays tied it up on a fielder's choice.

Then with only one away and the bases loaded, manager Alvin Dark sent in Joey Amalfitano to bat for Marichal - and by all appearances, the Giants would get the go-ahead run to give Juan the lead.

But pinch runner Billy O'Dell stormed down the third base line on three successful bunt attempts, and Amalfitano was retired as he fouled off all three efforts. The side was retired, and the game moved into the ninth still tied.

Mays, who had three hits during the night, untied it quickly with his 28th homer of the season. However, the Colts pulled it out of the fire with two runs in the bottom of the ninth.

The Dodgers resumed their road trip today at Chicago, where they opened a three-game set against the Cubs. Last season, Walt Alston's men lost only four of 18 games to Chicago. They haven't found the Cubs such pushovers this season, posting eight victories in 13 games.

The New York Yankees, riding along with a 7½ game lead in the American League, open a two-week road trip tonight with a doubleheader against the Washington Senators. August was a bad month for the Yankees last season when their pitching collapsed and they finished the month with a 17-18 record.

Pennel Batters Pole Vault Mark With 16-10¼ Effort

London - (UPI) - A contented John Pennel predicted today that his new world pole vault mark would last only as long as it took him to return to shape next season.

"I hope to reach 17 feet, four inches, or maybe even 17 feet, six inches by Olympic time next year," he said.

Pennel busted his own world record Monday with a vault of 16 feet, 10¼ inches, which helped carry the United States men's track and field team to a 120-91 victory over Britain in a dual meet. It was the fourth victory without defeat for the Yankees on their European tour.

However, the U.S. women, given a chance to win their first meet of the tour, fell apart on the final day against England and lost, 65½-51½. The British 440-yard relay team set a women's world record of 45.2 seconds.

Pennel extended the drama of his record attempt until his final jump before a receptive crowd of 30,000 in White City Stadium. After failing on his first two attempts at 16-10¼, the 22-year-old Northeast Louisiana State student cleared the bar on his third try. He then missed three attempts at 17 feet, ¼ inch. Pennel's old mark of 16-8¾ was set here July 13 and equaled by him at Warsaw on July 26.

The U.S. men won six of the 10 events on the final day's program for a total of 13 in the two-day meet. An outstanding effort was turned in by Henry Carr of Arizona State University, who established a stadium record of 20.9 seconds in winning the 880-yard run. Frank Covelli of Arizona State U. in the javelin (251 feet, 10½ inches), and by the 1,600-yard relay team (3:07.2).

The lone U.S. women's victory on the final day was recorded by Sharon Shepherd of Cleveland in the discus.

Sonny May Decide Today

Philadelphia - (UPI) - This may be the day of decision for Sonny Liston.

The world heavyweight champion may decide today whether to defend his title against brash Cassius Clay in Philadelphia, Sept. 30, or against another challenger in December at Miami Beach or Las Vegas, Nev., for home television.

For Liston the big question is whether the Nilon brothers - Bob, Jim and Jack - and their attorneys have been able to devise a promotional plan for the "seven million dollar" Clay fight that will satisfy both the Pennsylvania State Athletic commission and Liston.

Despite the optimism of Commissioner Alfred Klein, others close to the somewhat frantic conferences Monday and Tuesday night insist that no satisfactory plan to Liston has yet been devised and that he is ready to jump to Madison Square Garden in New York.

There are unconfirmed reports that the Garden would give Sonny \$300,000 for defending at Miami Beach or Las Vegas against tall Ernie Terrell of Chicago for home television in December.
