



HELICOPTER STOPS HERE — Bell Helicopter company's Model 204B stopped at the Medford airport yesterday while on a western demonstration tour. The aircraft with a carrying capacity of 10 to 12 passengers and useful load of 3,182 pounds with seats removed is the largest helicopter Bell has in production. Its gas turbine engines can put it in the air and a mile away in 30 seconds.

Large Helicopter Stops Here

The largest helicopter Bell Helicopter now has in production stopped at the Medford airport yesterday en route to a demonstration for the Bonneville Power Administration in Portland.

Bell's 204B helicopter has a cruising speed of 120 miles per hour compared to 90 miles per hour for the smaller ones. Its gas turbine engine can get it off the ground and a mile away in 30 seconds. It needs no warmup, according to Arthur L. Farnoff, manager of Bell's western division, from Burbank, Calif.

It can fly at 138 miles per hour, climb 2,080 feet per minute and has a 250-mile operational range. It can carry a useful load of 3,182 pounds, and with passenger seats removed, has 140 cubic feet of internal cargo space. Passenger capacity is 10 to 12 persons.

Farnoff said the Portland demonstration is part of a tour which took the aircraft from the company plant at Ft. Worth, Tex., through the rest of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California, with future stops in Washington, British Columbia and Alberta.

Committee Votes Tax Relief for Special Group

Washington — The House Ways and Means committee Tuesday gave its final approval to \$40 million in special tax relief for professional athletes, actors, authors and others whose incomes fluctuate.

The proposal, recommended by President Kennedy, would enable taxpayers to "average" their taxable income over a five-year period in computing their tax bills.

This would permit a person to avoid being thrown into an extremely high tax bracket should he suddenly strike it rich after a period during which he struggled along on a modest income.

The committee made only one change in the draft of the proposal which it previously had tentatively approved for inclusion in its big tax-revision-and-reduction bill. The revision would bar use of the averaging device to lower tax rates on income from gambling, or "wagering" of any kind.

Moving swiftly toward the finish line in the drafting of a compromise version of Kennedy's tax-cutting program, the committee also:

Decision Affirmed — Affirmed an earlier decision to scale down the tax advantages of "trafficking" in real estate which have been systematically exploited by syndicates of investors set up for that purpose. The tougher tax rules would produce about \$15 million in new tax revenue from profits from sale of real estate.

Decision Affirmed — Gave the administration a surprise \$30 million tax victory by reversing its earlier decision to grant a special new tax break to high-paid corporation executives enjoying lavish fringe benefits. The committee Monday decided to leave untouched all of the tax concessions enjoyed by the oil industry except the relief that big oil producing firms got from a Republican Congress nine years ago.

Oregon Professor Awarded Grant

Portland — A seven-year Public Health Service grant for more than a half-million dollars has been awarded to Dr. Howard S. Mason, professor of biochemistry at the University of Oregon Medical School.

The \$537,285 grant is for study to determine mechanisms by which life is supported by oxygen. According to the medical school, this is one of the major unsolved questions of molecular biology.

Dr. Mason has been coeditor of a six-volume treatise on comparative biochemistry and has had fellowships at Cambridge University. He has participated in nine international scientific congresses throughout the world.
