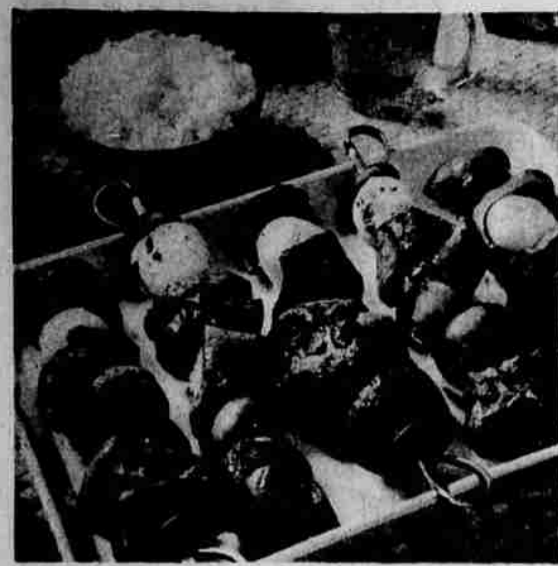

For your next patio party serve Party Shishkabobs of lamb marinated in beer or ale combined with savory herbs such as basil, oregano, thyme and bay leaf with dry mustard, oil, garlic and lemon juice. This recipe will yield 10 to 12 servings.

## Party Shishkabob Ideal For Patio Entertaining

A good main dish for any patio barbecue party is shishkabobs combined with peppers, onions, mushrooms and tomato wedges.

This recipe calls for the traditional marinated lamb kabobs but with beer or ale added to the marinade seasoning.

Savory herbs such as basil, oregano, thyme and bay leaf combine with oil, garlic, lemon juice and your choice of beer or ale for the tenderizing and seasoning process.

The portions in this recipe will yield 10 to 12 servings and is ideal for your next barbecue party.

**PARTY SHISHKABOB**  
One leg of lamb (5 to 7 pounds) boned; one peeled, minced clove garlic; one-third cup olive or salad oil; one cup beer or ale; two tablespoons lemon juice; one-half teaspoon coarsely ground pepper; one tablespoon salt; one bay leaf; one-half teaspoon dry mustard; one teaspoon crushed basil; one-half teaspoon crushed oregano; one-half

teaspoon thyme; six to eight green peppers; 16 to 20 small white onions; 16 to 20 mushrooms; 16 to 20 tomato wedges.  
Have your meatman remove bone from leg of lamb and cut meat into two-inch chunks, removing gristle and most of fat. To make marinade, combine garlic, olive oil, beer, lemon juice, pepper, salt, bay leaf, mustard, basil, oregano and thyme in large bowl. Add lamb pieces and let stand in refrigerator at least three hours or overnight. Turn the lamb in the marinade occasionally.

Cut seeded green peppers into two-inch pieces. Cut peeled onions in halves. Remove stems from mushrooms. When ready to cook, alternate marinated lamb chunks, green pepper pieces, halved onions, mushroom caps and tomato wedges on 10 to 12 long metal skewers. Brush vegetables with melted butter or margarine. Broil over coals or in oven broiler three inches from heat source until tender, about 15 minutes, turning skewers to brown food evenly. Yield, 10 to 12 servings.
