Railroads Pace Easier Stock Market; Motor Section Soft, Chemicals Mixed

New York—(UPI)—Ralls paced an easier stock market today. Some representative losses in the section were Norfolk & Western off 1 1/2 and Chicago & North Western off 3/4. New York Central, Pennsylv-

ania, Chicago Rock Island, Nickel Plate and Northern Pacific all slipped fractions. Steels eased. Chrysler lost nearly 1 in the soft motors section. Eastman Kodak picked up a large fraction in a mixed chemicals group. Amerasia dropped 2 1/2 in a mixed petroleum group. Metals were easier with Alcoa, Mueller Brass, St. Joseph Lead and U.S. Smelting off large fractions.

AMMUNITION DUMP EXPLOSION KILLS 32

AMERICAN EXPORTS TO WEST GERMANY INCREASE
Bonn, Germany—(UPI)—American exports to West Germany increased 20 per cent during the first six months of this year, the economics ministry here said Tuesday.

International Paper Earnings Increase

New York—(UPI)—International Paper company said today the firm's total sales for the first six months of 1963 amounted to about \$560 million compared to \$584.4 million in the same period of 1962. Earnings amounted to \$32.4 million in the first half of 1963 and \$31.7 million in the first half of 1962. The firm reported the new pulp and paper mill at Gardiner, Ore., was making rapid progress and that it was expected to start on schedule during the first quarter of 1964. The board of directors declared quarterly dividends of \$1 per share on the common stock, payable Sept. 16 to holders of record Aug. 28.

Washington—(UPI)—A clergyman from Eugene, Ore., told a Senate subcommittee Tuesday that discrimination against Negroes exists on a "very quiet basis" in Oregon and even at the University of Oregon.

The statement was made by Dr. Wesley G. Nicholson, pastor of the First Congregational Church in Eugene, before the Senate Employment and Manpower subcommittee.

Dance Instructor Attends Courses

Teachers from New York and Hollywood taught many versions of ballet, tap, jazz and ballroom dancing. Mrs. See was accompanied on the trip by Mrs. Gino Baldo of Weed.

Portland Woman Enters Innocent Plea

Portland—(UPI)—Mrs. Irene Brown, 55, Portland, pleaded innocent in Circuit Court Tuesday to a charge of second degree murder. Mrs. Brown is charged with the fatal shooting of her husband, Henry Brown, 53, a Portland policeman, at their home this year.

The clergyman and Dr. Kenneth Polk, assistant professor of sociology at the university, appeared before the committee to urge extension of a law under which communities receive federal grants to help plan youth employment programs.

The topic of racial discrimination was brought out when Subcommittee Chairman Joseph S. Slark (D-Pa.) asked whether the juvenile delinquency rate was higher among minority groups.

Dr. Nicholson, who said there was no difference in the delinquency rate in Lane county, suggested that discrimination was found throughout the country, Clark had expressed surprise that it should exist in Oregon.

Dr. Nicholson said a "tense situation" exists in Portland and elsewhere in the state. He

cited the case of a Negro electrician who worked for the Bonneville Power Administration. He said the Negro had previously worked in Olympia, Wash., where he found everyone to be "very friendly" in stores, churches and schools.

But since being transferred to Portland, Dr. Nicholson said, "The Negro has been most unhappy" because he had found people to be "very unfriendly."

The clergyman said he thought the problem was "local" rather than a difference between the states when asked by Clark why Negroes should receive a less friendly reception in Oregon than in Washington.

The two Oregonians testified as spokesmen for the Lane County Youth Study Board, which received a \$192,000 grant for an 18-month planning program to combat juvenile delinquency.

They told the committee that in rural areas such as Lane county there was less juvenile delinquency than in urban areas but that it was growing at an "alarming" rate. Dr. Polk told the com-

mittee that delinquency in Lane county involved less serious offenses than in large urban areas. The major problem, in Lane county, he said, was drinking among youth.

Trucker Killed By Own Vehicle

Crescent City, Calif.—(UPI)—Truck driver Edward Nelson, 40, Corvallis, Ore., died Tuesday night on U.S. Highway 101 south of here when he was run over by his own vehicle.

The Highway Patrol said Nelson was coming off a high hill when his brakes failed. He scraped the side of the road for several hundred yards in a futile attempt to slow down. Then he attempted to leap to safety and was crushed by the dual tires of his own truck.

New Library, Dorm At Oregon State

Corvallis—(UPI)—A new \$2.4 million library and 373-bed dormitory will be ready for opening of fall term at Oregon State University, the school said today.

The new library will have 1,600 study stations compared with 600 in the present library. The older building will be converted into a classroom and office building once the books are moved to the new structure.

The new residence hall is the seventh built in the past seven years at OSU.

Irish Pup Joins Kennedy Canine Corps

Hyannis Port, Mass.—(UPI)—The canine corps of the Kennedy clan had a new addition today—a docile cocker spaniel pup known only as "Number 8."

The little dog was brought from Washington to Otis Air Force Base, Mass., by the President as a surprise gift Tuesday to his hospitalized wife and their two children. The dog was given to the President at Shannon during his recent visit to Ireland. The reason for its temporary name was that there already are seven other Kennedy dogs.

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
