

# Neutralists Move for Agreement on Stockpile

Geneva - (UPI) - Neutralist negotiators at the 17-nation disarmament conference took steps today to use the latest American proposal on nuclear stockpiles as a basis for new East-West accord.

With the conference in formal recess until Friday, neutral delegates sought meetings with Communist and Western delegations to expand the U.S. plan in private consultations.

The U.S. proposal, which

was cold-shouldered immediately by the Russians, called for a stop of production of fissionable material—Uranium 235—and for the United States and the Soviet Union to transfer quantities of it from their existing stockpiles to peaceful purposes rather than nuclear weapons.

Though the first reaction from Soviet negotiator Semyon K. Tsarapkin was negative, Russian sources hoped the Russians would come around to accepting the proposal because of an American concession.

U.S. negotiator Charles C. Stelle told the conference Wednesday his government was ready to modify a previous 50-50 offer on the ura-

nium transfer to 60 tons for the United States and 40 for the Soviet Union.

Diplomats from the neutral states here—Brazil, Burma, Ethiopia, India, Mexico, Nigeria, Sweden and the United Arab Republic—aimed their moves at a follow-up agreement to the Moscow treaty banning nuclear tests in the atmosphere, in outer space and under water.

They sought to avoid "burying an important idea" in a comprehensive disarmament treaty that would take years more to complete, if ever.

Western officials cautioned, however, that Soviet reaction thus far did not offer much immediate prospect for agreement.

### JAPANESE LEADERS PAY TRIBUTE TO WAR DEAD

Tokyo - (UPI) - Emperor Hirohito, Premier Hayato Ikeda and other leaders paid tribute to the 3 million Japanese dead of World War II today at ceremonies marking the 18th anniversary of the end of the fighting. Hirohito expressed "deep condolence" to the bereaved survivors in a nation-wide radio-television speech broadcast from the Hibiyu auditorium, where the government held its first war memorial service.

### BODIES REMOVED FROM NEPAL LANDSLIDE

Katmandu, Nepal - (UPI) - Forty-one bodies had been recovered today from the landslide which destroyed three villages on the side of a hill near Trishuvo, 50 miles northwest of here, killing nearly 200 persons.

### RUSSIA, TANGANYIKA SIGN TRADE PACT

Dar es Salaam, Tanganyika - (UPI) - Tanganyika will send agricultural products to Russia in exchange for machinery under a trade agreement signed here Wednesday, government officials said.

### JORDANIAN PARLIAMENT VOTES CONFIDENCE

Amman, Jordan - (UPI) - Premier Sharif Hussein Bin Nasser's new government won a 57-1 vote of confidence from Jordan's parliament Wednesday.

# Red China Says Russia Reneged On Bomb Help

Tokyo - (UPI) - Red China charged today that Russia once agreed to help the Peking regime make atomic bombs but later reneged on the promise.

The charge broadcast by the official Peking Radio was believed to be the first time the Chinese Communists publicly have made such an accusation against the Kremlin.

The government statement said Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev apparently scrapped the bomb agreement as a gift to then President Eisenhower during the Russian leader's visit to the United States in 1959.

The Chinese again denounced the Moscow treaty under which Russia, Britain

and the United States agreed to ban nuclear tests in the atmosphere, in outer space and under water. The Chinese consider the treaty a Soviet surrender to Western "imperialism" in communism's struggle to dominate the world.

The Kremlin's failure to help the Communist Chinese acquire nuclear weapons is one of the causes of the deepening rift between Moscow and Peking.

Khrushchev believes that communism will win out over Western capitalism through peaceful competition. He rejects resort to nuclear war, claiming both sides would be losers because of the destruction that would result.

The Chinese Communists insist on a more militant policy.

# Chicago Mayor's Home Picketed In Protest Over Mobile Units

By United Press International White and Negro civil rights demonstrators Wednesday picketed the home of Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley, and integration leaders planned a meeting today to map their next move in the city's turbulent racial scene.

Other demonstrations marked the nation's racial picture in the South, the Middle West and the East Wednesday, but there was a lull in the violence that erupted earlier in the week.

Five pickets marched in front of the home of Daley, last of the nation's big city political bosses. They also picketed the home of Clair M. Roddewig, president of the city board of education.

The protest centered on the use of mobile trailer-like school classrooms which the demonstrators contend perpetuate alleged de facto segregation in the city's schools.

Elizabeth, N. J.: 250 pickets returned to the sites of two construction projects which were plagued with violence earlier in the week. Equipment-carrying trucks moved in and out freely in contrast to the brawling between police and demonstrators Tuesday.

Goldsboro, N. C.: More than 500 Negroes staged the fifth consecutive night of anti-segregation marches Wednesday night. Police said several rocks were hurled at the crowd as they sang and prayed on the courthouse steps. No one was injured. More than 1,000 whites watched the demonstration.

Sparta, Tenn.: White County High School was scheduled to desegregate its classrooms today. The school superintendent said "five or six" of the 36 Negroes registered are on the school football team.

East St. Louis: Integrationists held a kneel-in at two banks which they accused of

discriminatory hiring practices. Peoria, Ill.: Forty-seven demonstrators conducted a lie-down at a parking lot entrance of the Peoria Water Works. They protested alleged racial discrimination in job hiring.

Columbus, Ga.: A Negro policeman was scheduled to begin work today on the city police force, the first of his race on the force in five years. Three others are due to begin work soon.

Macon, Ga.: Attorneys for 44 Negro children went to federal court to force Bibb to integrate its public schools. The Macon county board has refused to voluntarily end public school segregation.

Hollywood - (UPI) - Clifford Odets, 57, playwright, actor and motion picture director and writer, died Wednesday night at Cedars of Lebanon Hospital after surgery for ulcers.

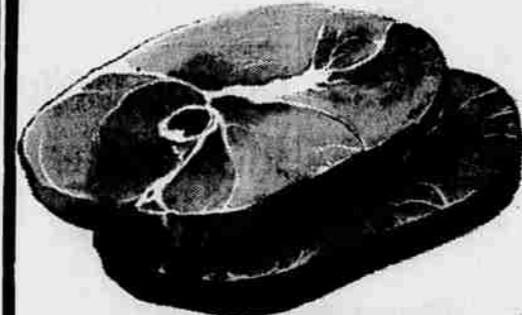
