

Bad Guys Getting Lumps in War on Organized Crime

Editor's note: The disclosure that a convicted gangland executioner is "singing" on his former associates has focused new attention on the Justice Department's Criminal Division, which is directing the war against the underworld. In the following dispatch, the head of the division discusses its progress.

Washington - (UPI) - At long last, the good guys are giving the bad guys their lumps in the war against organized crime.

"There's no doubt about it," said Asst. Atty Gen. Herbert J. Miller Jr. "The mobs are hurting."

As head of the Justice Department's Criminal Division, 39-year-old Jack Miller is the federal government's field general in the fight to smash the power of nationwide crime syndicates.

He knows better than others that the fight is very far from won, and he is not indulging in premature victory celebrations. But he also knows that the feds are going after big-time criminals these days with unprecedented vigor and determination. And he says it's paying off.

"We've got them on the run," Miller said in an interview with United Press International. "If we can keep the pressure on for another five or six years, we may break the back of this monster."

Takes Over Division
Miller is an amiable, quiet-spoken Republican lawyer from Minneapolis. He was in private law practice with a distinguished Washington firm when Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy asked him in early 1961 to take charge of the criminal division.

At that time, Miller knew no more about organized crime than the average citi-

zen. He'd read stories about its multibillion dollar annual take from gambling, narcotics and other rackets, an about the mysterious "Mafia" which was supposed to coordinate the whole enterprise. But he was inclined, as many citizens still are, to treat it as a myth.

"But it's not a myth," he said with the dogged emphasis of a man who is telling

the truth but expects to be disbelieved.

"The lurid stories in the press don't exaggerate - if anything they underestimate - the scope of the underworld operation, the degree to which it seeks to bribe and corrupt law enforcement officers, the ruthlessness with which it employs murder and other forms of violence to protect

its vast sources of income and silence witnesses."

Says Mafia Exits
Even the "myth" about the Mafia has turned out to be true, he said. The revelations of Joseph Valachi, imprisoned gangland executioner who decided to talk, have given federal officials a wealth of insider information about the sinister organization whose very existence was previously questioned by some investigators.

Valachi not only confirmed its existence: He told just how it operates, and named more than 100 of its top figures.

"Valachi's long song was a 'terrific break' for the criminal division's new intelligence unit, Miller said. The intelligence unit was organized two years ago to bring together in one place all of the information about crime and criminals available to the 26 different federal agencies which have law enforcement responsibilities.

Also of major importance in the stepped-up fight against crime, Miller said, is the legislation enacted by Congress in 1961 which makes it a federal crime to send gambling information or paraphernalia across state lines, or to travel in interstate commerce in support of racketeering.

These laws have given the Federal Bureau of Investigation a legal license to go after big-time gambling, which long has been the number one source of income for the crime syndicates.

"The FBI is now going after organized crime the way it went after the Communist party," said Miller.

The result has been a sharp drop in gambling activity, he said. In many areas, would-be betters are having "real trouble finding a bookie."

The government had never before had such a "CIA for crime," and Miller has found it "extremely helpful." The unit now has dossiers on the activities of 1,200 major racketeering figures, he said.

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American Planes Will Be Better, Halaby Promises

Washington—(UPI)—Keep your shirts on; the American product will be better.

This, in effect, was the advice Federal Aviation Administrator Najeeb E. Halaby gave Wednesday to U.S. airlines caught in a super-sonic dilemma. He followed it up with a formal request to private industry for its ideas on what America's super-sonic airliner should be.

The airlines must: —Order, as Pan American World Airways and Continental Airlines already have, the British-French "Concorde," which will be a super-sonic transport capable of mach 2.2 speeds (twice the speed of sound) and which will have a prototype flying by the end of 1966.

—Wait for an American-built super-sonic transport, which Halaby promised will be "better, faster, longer-ranged and with superior handling and capacity," but which is not expected to be test-flown until 1967.

Halaby conceded the Concorde's head start. But he emphasized that there could be a considerable time lag between the first test flight of an experimental prototype and the entrance of a completely perfected super-sonic transport into scheduled passenger service. In admitting that the Concorde will fly first, he added:

"More important is when it will carry passengers at a profit. We believe an American super-sonic transport will be in actual airline service not more than six months after the Concorde starts carrying passengers."

Halaby backed up this optimistic forecast with a timetable aimed at reducing the Concorde's current lead. It calls for:

—A formal request for specific super-sonic design proposals submitted today by the FAA to the U.S. airframe and engine manufacturing industry.

—Answers to that request handed FAA by Jan. 15, 1964.

—About one year's evaluation of industry's super-sonic transport proposals by FAA and the airlines.

—An FFA-airline decision by Jan. 1, 1965, on the best design or designs, followed by construction of one or two prototypes sometime in 1967.
