

### This Week's Plan for Home Builders

This home, informal within and closely related to the outdoors, fortifies the belief that today's building materials and good contemporary design go well together.

The private patio at the rear of the house shows how outdoor living can be made part of the original plan. This patio is readily accessible from both the living rooming area and the family room through wide sliding doors. This arrangement considerably expands your entertaining space.

From the oversized double garage, a door opens to a breezy way from where one can either enter the service room or walk across the roofed porch to the front entry door.

**Convenient Guest Closet**  
A convenient guest closet opens to the entry. The size of the entry has been visually expanded by using only a partial wall to separate it from the huge living-dining room. An attractive corner fireplace can be enjoyed from any place in the room and has been located to facilitate furniture arrangement.

The quality of today's kitchen built-ins enhances both its character and value. This kitchen can boast of all the latest built-ins — including refrigerator — plus a roomy pantry. A partial wall to the rear of the built-in range offers a view of the family room and through the glass doors to the rear yard. A large window in the nook overlooks the front yard.

A half bath is off the service while the family bath is located between the two front bedrooms. The family

bath — as well as the private bath in the master bedroom suite — features a pullman lavatory.

**Master Bedroom**  
The impressive master bedroom suite contains a dressing room with a generous amount of wardrobe space, a dressing table and a storage closet to the side of the wide linen which opens to the hall.

There are no breaks in the roof of this uncluttered contemporary exterior. The metal windows in the front wall of the bedroom and bath have been tied together by the wooden frame. Heavy wooden posts have also been used to frame the three stationary

windows at the front wall of the garage.

Officers said unknown persons entered the building and broke open a soft drink machine, removing an estimated \$10 in change.

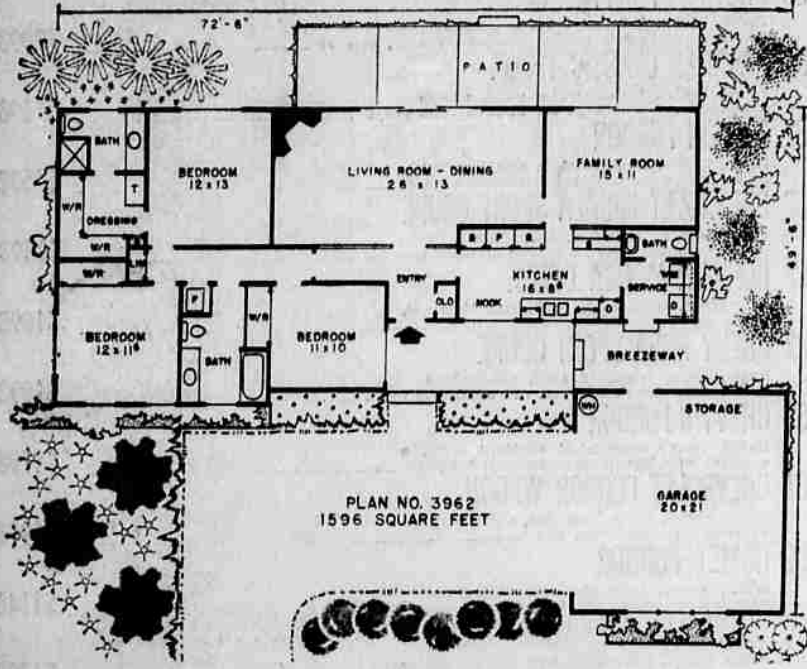
### IKE LIKES TREATY

### Jackie Kennedy Starting Long Convalescence

Hyannis Port, Mass. — (UPI) — First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy was in the starting stage today of a long convalescence that will keep her out of the official White House limelight until early next year.

The President's 34-year-old wife left the Ochs Air Force Base hospital Wednesday in "very satisfactory" condition. She had spent a week there during which her third child, Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, was born and died less than two days later.

Mrs. Kennedy had undergone her fourth cesarean, and although weak and wan looking she walked out of

the hospital hand in hand with the President. She smiled and seemed happy to be going home to Squaw Island and her children, Caroline, nearly 6, and John Jr., almost 3.

Mrs. Kennedy is on the road to recovery, but her obstetrician, Dr. John W. Walsh of Washington, ordered her to cut out all official activities for five months "in order to insure her complete rehabilitation and continuing good health."

Starting in mid-September the First Family is expected to spend several weeks at Hammersmith Farm, the

Newport, R.I. home of Mrs. Kennedy's stepfather and mother, Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss.
