As everyone knows, the panelists on "What's My Line" put on blindfolds and try to identify the mystery guest. Well, on "Who Asked That?" the guest will put on a blindfold and try to identify the panelists.

Sounds like fun, doesn't it? I got the idea for the show from a magazine column that answers questions sent in by curious readers.

Some of the questions are rather bizarre, and, as a hobby, I like to see if I can create situations to fit them.

**Officers Probe Death of Rancher**

Bend — (UPI) — Sheriff's officers from three counties are continuing their search of leads into the death of Philip G. Reinhardt, 72, whose body was found Monday in a canal near here.

An autopsy indicated Reinhardt died from a blow on the side of the head. He was a prominent rancher in the Powell Butte area.

Officers said Reinhardt left his home the night of Aug. 5 and headed across a field. He had \$60 on him that was not found. His body was found caught in a wire fence in the canal a week later.

**'Aloha Week' Slated For Oregonians at National Conclave**

Salem — (UPI) — Next week is "Aloha week" for 18 Oregon legislators, two state officials, and several wives.

The occasion is the meeting in Honolulu, Hawaii, of the national legislative conference, Aug. 19 - 23. At the same time the interstate cooperation commission will hold its annual meeting in Honolulu.

Eighteen of the Oregonians will travel, eat and be housed at state expense during the week of the conferences.

The state will not pay the wives' expenses. Nor will the state pay expenses incurred by delegates who arrive early or delay their departure for pre or post-conference vacations.

Attending the National legislative conference will be Senate President Ben Musa (D-The Dalles), Sen. Glenn Huston (D-Lebanon), Sen. Dwight Hopkins (D-Imbler), House Speaker Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), Rep. William Holmatrom (D-Gearhart), W. O. Kelsey (D-Roseburg), and Rep. W. S. Ouderirk (R-Newport).

Attending the interstate cooperation commission sessions will be Senate Minority Leader Anthony Yturri (R-Ontario), Sen. Al Flegel (D-Roseburg), Rep. Ed Whelan (D-Portland), Rep. Berkeley Lent (D-Portland), Rep. George Filcraft (R-Klamath Falls), and Vern Hill, director of the department of motor vehicles.

Representing the legislative counsel committee at the sessions will be Sen. Donald Husband (R-Eugene), and Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney (D-Portland).

Rep. Robert Smith (R-Burns), will represent the legislative interim committee on highways.

The legislative fiscal committee is sending legislative fiscal officer Kenneth Bragg.

One reason for the large Oregon delegation is that Portland is courting the con-

ference for 1965. Next year the conference will be rotated to somewhere in the eastern part of the U.S.

Also, the total delegation—18 official representatives—seems extra large because both the legislative conference and the interstate cooperation commission are meeting at the same place at the same time. The two groups do not always meet together.

Nevertheless, Sen. Mahoney's participation came as a surprise to many. During the recent legislative session Mahoney was extremely critical of interim committees. He said they did little, if any good.

Mahoney also screened the travel allowance of every state agency and department as the various budgets came before the senate for approval. He refused to approve budgets which had what he considered an unnecessarily large travel allotment.

Mahoney told UPI "I'm going at my own expense. I told Musa some time ago I wouldn't bill the state for my trip, and in fact I have booked passage back on a Matson liner."

"I don't think this is a junket because the Portland chamber is pushing so hard to get the convention in 1965, and they need conventions."

"But I'm not an idiot. I still question the good of these trips, and I'm paying my own way. I was going to announce that after the trip," he added.

**Taft Man, Son Die In Auto-Truck Crash**

Portland — (UPI) — Stuart Allen Richards, 30, and his 5-year-old son Craig, both of Taft, were killed instantly Wednesday night when their small foreign station wagon was struck by a diesel truck pulling a flatbed trailer.

The accident took place on Interstate Highway 80 North, a few miles east of Portland.

The driver of the truck, Leo M. Walter of Spokane, was uninjured.

**New Library To Be Ready This Fall**

Corvallis — A new \$2,385,000 library and 373-bed dormitory will be ready for opening of fall term at Oregon State university.

The new library will have 1,600 study stations compared to 600 in the present library that was built in 1918 with a wing added in 1941. The old building will be converted into a classroom and office building once the books are removed to the new structure.

Open stacks — or free access to all books — will be featured in the new library. This will give students greater opportunity to browse, seek out and choose reference material on their own, Librarian William Carlson said.

The new residence hall is the seventh built in the last seven years at OSU in an attempt to keep housing accommodations abreast of increasing enrollments. It will be named for the late Oregon Sen. Charles L. McNary.

Two additional dormitories of similar design and capacity have been started this summer adjacent to McNary hall. They will be ready for opening of school in 1964.

With the new residence hall, adequate campus housing for single students appears assured for this fall, according to Thomas Adams, director of housing.
