Morgenthau Named To Foundation Post

Hyannis Port, Mass.—(UPI)—Former Treasury Secretary Henry Morgenthau Jr. was named Friday as president of the Eleanor Roosevelt Memorial foundation.

The White House announced the appointments of Morgenthau; former Philadelphia Mayor Richardson Dilworth; Dr. Armand Hammer of Los Angeles, president of the Occidental Petroleum Corp., and of the Hammer Galleries in New York; Ralph McGill, publisher of the Atlanta Constitution; Jesse W. Tapp, of Los Angeles, board chairman of the Bank of America, and Whitney M. Young Jr., of New York, executive director of the National Urban League.

These appointments will bring membership on the foundation's board of trustees to a total of 30. The foundation is conducting a drive to collect \$25 million in support of a program to advance human rights, cancer research, help for underprivileged children, and support of the United Nations.

Governor To Offer Measures at Meet

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va.—(UPI)—Alabama Gov. George Wallace planned to submit four controversial anti-integration resolutions at the 29th annual Southern Governors conference today.

But the fiery little segregationist, who made a "schoolhouse door stand" in an unsuccessful effort to block the enrollment of two Negroes at the University of Alabama, apparently held little hope for their adoption.

The governors will shove racial matters to the background today to consider topics on which they are united rather than divided. These include promoting education, attracting nuclear industries and planning for population increases.

Demonstrators To March in Paris

Paris—(UPI)—About 50 Americans, led by Negro Author James Baldwin, decided Saturday to demonstrate at the U.S. Embassy here to show solidarity with the Aug. 24 civil rights march in Washington.

If the group can get permission from the French police, Baldwin said, they will march from the American church on the left bank of the river Seine to the Embassy on the Concorde Square.

Otherwise, they will present their planned petition to U.S. Ambassador Charles Bohlen on Aug. 27.

"We want to serve notice we are part of this revolution in the United States," Baldwin explained.

The slight, 38-year-old author of "The Fire Next Time" said he would read the petition in a speech at the American church Sunday, but will not participate in the Paris demonstration. He said he will return to the United States Aug. 27 for the Washington march.
