**BEN BELLA THANKED FOR RECOGNITION**  
Algiers - (UPI) - Holden Roberto, head of the National Front for the Liberation of Angola (FNLA), has thanked Premier Ahmed Ben Bella for Algeria's recognition of the FNLA as the Angolan government-in-exile.

**GRENADE INJURES THREE ALGERIANS**  
Toulon, France - (UPI) - Three Algerians were injured yesterday when a grenade was thrown into an Algerian cafe here. Police said the incident stemmed from the continuing quarrel in the Moslem quarter between factions favoring and opposing Algerian Premier Ahmed Ben Bella.

**SPAIN ACCUSED OF VIOLATING JUSTICE**  
Paris - (UPI) - The Communist General Workers Union today accused Spain of "violating the fundamentals of justice" in executing two Spaniards for terrorism. The two, Francisco Granados Gais and Joaquin Delgado Martinez, were strangled to death by a medieval garrote during the week end.

**DUTCH AIRLINE REPORTS LOSS**  
The Hague - (UPI) - KLM Royal Dutch Airlines today reported a net loss of \$5 million (M) in the second quarter of 1963. The company's quarterly report showed seat-occupancy during the second quarter of 1963 was 44.7 per cent against 45.5 per cent for the first and second quarters.

## Market Closes Narrowly Mixed; Steels Are Firm

New York - (UPI) - Stocks turned in a narrowly mixed performance today.

Steels were fractional and for the most part firm. Chrysler backed off from its high and Ford dipped slightly. Chemicals were generally firm but Virginia-Carolina Chemical shaded on news the Justice Department had requested Socony-Mobil for information on a proposed merger between the two companies.

Sinclair and Richfield posted good gains in an otherwise narrow petroleum section. IBM swung widely falling back from its high to finish with a loss.

**Veterans Reminded Of New Insurance**  
Korean conflict veterans who hold GI "RS" insurance policies have only until Sept. 13 to qualify for a special cash dividend by exchanging them for "W" term policies or converting to permanent insurance, Elmer W. Donahoo, Jackson county veterans' service officer, warned today.

After Sept. 13, these veterans may still convert or exchange their policies, Donahoo said, but they will no longer be eligible for the dividend payment.

Only GI insurance policy holders with "RS" insurance that was issued during the period of the Korean conflict are concerned in this program. On or before Sept. 13, they must:

1. Exchange the "RS" term policy for a "W" term policy, generally costing about one-third of what they are now paying; or
2. Convert the "RS" policy to a low-cost permanent plan of insurance.

Veterans affected may contact Donahoo at the Jackson county courthouse, Medford.

### DOG HERO OF '63

Chicago - (UPI) - A German shepherd named Dutch will receive the 10th annual Kennel Ration dog medal today as the 1963 dog hero of the year. Dutch, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Hawthorne of Troy, Pa., helped save the lives of their children, Hugh, 4, and Gordon, 3, last Oct. 31 when they floundered helplessly in a 12-foot pool. Dutch's barking brought Mrs. Hawthorne on the run, and although pregnant she jumped in the water and pulled both to safety.

## Negro Leaders Tell Final Plans For Giant March on Washington

New York - (UPI) - Leaders of the Aug. 28 march on Washington issued final plans today for the giant civil rights demonstration and demanded desegregation of all schools this year.

In a 12-page organizing manual, the leaders charged that "the southern Democrats came to power by disenfranchising the Negro. They know that semi-slavery for one means semi-slavery for all."

### Quotes From the News

Los Angeles—Evangelist Billy Graham in a sermon on sex: "It is a God-given instinct. Used right, it is a wonderful servant. Used wrong, it is a terrible tyrant."

## Goldwater Inclined To Avoid Primaries If He Enters Race

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) has said he would be "inclined" to stay out of state primary races, if he decided to make a bid for the GOP presidential nomination.

However, Goldwater said he was not trying to capture the Republican nomination.

"At this moment I have no intention" of running, Goldwater said.

In a question and answer session before a group of college students, Goldwater said he liked his Senate job.

The real challenge of government was in Congress where the will of the people could best be expressed, Goldwater said.

**Favors Demonstration**  
Queried on the civil rights march scheduled for Aug. 28, "No," Goldwater said, "these people are taxpayers."

Many GOP Southern Votes  
The Arizona lawmaker also said he didn't think it was necessary for Republicans to appeal to the "segregation vote" in the South to win elections, and he predicted the Republican party would get six million votes from the Southern states in 1964.

On the subject of communism, Goldwater said he did not believe the nation could co-exist with a philosophy that is dedicated to its destruction.

On the progressive income tax, Goldwater said: "I see no fairness in taxing success — it denies incentive and destroys ambition."

Asked for his opinion of the John Birch Society, Goldwater said he could not condemn a group working within constitutional grounds. He said he had seen no proof that the society had done anything wrong.

**TWISTED TO DEATH**  
Wuppertal, Germany - (UPI) - Heidemarie Klostermann, 17, twisted to death in a Wuppertal cabaret, according to police. Other dancers in the cabaret said the girl danced the twist for hours Sunday night before suddenly falling unconscious. A doctor ruled she died of a heart attack.

# Wallace Plans to Offer Disputed Bills at Meet

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va. - (UPI) - Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace planned today to submit several controversial civil rights resolutions to the Southern Governors' Conference.

New protests marches were scheduled by Negro demonstrators.

Wallace was to formally submit his proposals soon after conference chairman Orval Faubus of Arkansas announced the make-up of the resolutions committee that will consider—and probably pigeon-hole—the tough resolutions.

Most of the 15 Deep South and border state governors at the conference have shown no inclination to go along with the scrappy Alabama governor.

Then it would be up to Wallace to stage a floor fight Wednesday if he wants to force the resolutions out of committee and onto the floor for a vote.

## Handling of State Welfare Funds Is Termed 'Honest'

Portland - (UPI) - Oregon employee welfare and pension administrators have been generally honest in their handling of welfare funds, a U. S. Department of Labor official said Monday.

Vincent J. Colan, an assistant chief of the division of technical assistance to welfare and pension plans, said the last Labor Department investigation revealed no cases of mishandling of funds in the state.

Colan was here with two other officials to advise some 300 Oregon administrators in reporting and bonding requirements of the Welfare and Pension Disclosure act, as amended last year.

He said the act is designed to put welfare administrators "into a goldfish bowl" to prevent abuses.

Employee welfare and pension plan assets in Oregon total about \$60 million, Colan said, compared to \$8 billion in New York and about half that figure in California.

Faubus, attempting to avert a clash on civil rights, Monday urged the governors—most of them moderates on the racial issue—not to turn the conference into an "arena of conflict." He delayed until today naming of the resolutions committee.

Faubus, who once defied the federal government in the integration of Little Rock's Central High school, went on record as opposing consideration of any controversial resolutions—civil rights or otherwise—at the conference week sessions. He was expected to name a moderate committee that would bury Wallace's proposals.

The behind-the-scenes maneuvering took place while Negroes staged protest marches aimed specifically at Wallace's resolutions and in support of the civil rights moves of West Virginia Gov. W. W. Barron and the Kennedy administration.

The governors scheduled a half-day agenda today, and planned to hold their bi-lateral state dinner tonight. The conference began Sunday and ends Wednesday.

**Converge On Gates**  
About 100 marchers converged on the gates of the plush Greenbrier resort Monday after a three-hour drive from the Charleston-Huntington area more than 115 miles to the west.

Greeted smilingly by Barron, their leaders conferred with the West Virginia governor in his rooms while the marchers were taken on a conducted tour of the big hotel after agreeing to leave their signs outside.

Spokesmen for the group said they would return to picket, to show their disapproval of Wallace's proposals—even though they thought there appeared to be no chance whatever they would be adopted by the governors.
