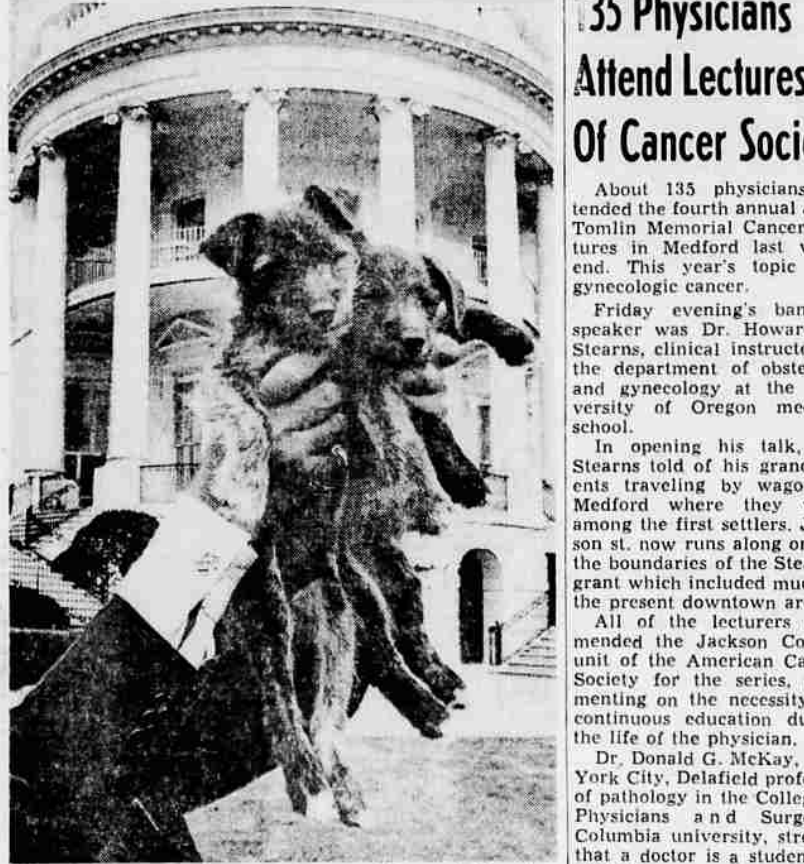

35 Physicians Attend Lectures Of Cancer Society

About 135 physicians attended the fourth annual John Tomlin Memorial Cancer lectures in Medford last week.

Friday evening's banquet speaker was Dr. Howard C. Stearns, clinical instructor in the department of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Oregon medical school.

In opening his talk, Dr. Stearns told of his grandparents traveling by wagon to Medford where they were among the first settlers.

All of the lecturers commended the Jackson County Society for the series, commenting on the necessity for continuous education during the life of the physician.

Dr. Donald G. McKay, New York City, Delafield professor of pathology in the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia university, stressed that a doctor is a student all his life.

Medicine is constantly acquiring new methods of diagnosis and treatment and it is through the efforts of organizations such as the American Cancer Society that doctors are seeing a diminishing incidence of certain type of cancer.

Among the other speakers in the fields of pathology, radiology and gynecology for the lectures were Dr. James M. Whitley, president of the Oregon division, American Cancer Society, and a clinical professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Oregon medical school.

Cool Weather Fails To Lessen Crowd at Area Music Festival

Last night's cool weather failed to lessen the size of the audience at the Britt Gardens Music Festival performance in Jacksonville, or to dampen the enthusiasm. A large audience assembled, listened attentively and with evident enjoyment, and applauded warmly at the close.

The program opened with the special fanfare by the brasses and orchestra used for every concert; this is impressive but last night the playing wasn't quite as smooth as past programs. However, the concerto for two trumpets and string orchestra, with James Smith and Charles Lauer as soloists, was well performed.

The Manfredini work was followed by a "Concerto for Clarinet and String Orchestra" by the contemporary composer, Aaron Copland, with David Atkins as soloist. Many listeners find the first portion of this composition rather dry and tedious, but with the mood of the last part, the more substance and appeal.

If Copland means to reflect the tensions, distractions and fears of modern life, he succeeds to a degree in this composition. Accomplished Clarinetist Mr. Atkins is an accomplished clarinetist—the woodwind section of the festival orchestra is said to be especially fine and Mr. Atkins' musicianship has helped to build this reputation.

The program closed with an excellent interpretation of Bach's "Suite No. 3 in D major" as directed by conductor Trudeau. This is music listened attentively and with evident enjoyment, and applauded warmly at the close.
