This Week's Plan for Home Builders

It's so easy these days to build a home with the individuality you're looking for and the quality you want. In fact, the house you build today should be better built, better looking and require less maintenance than its earlier postwar counterpart. This well planned home makes the most of a small lot and a limited budget without sacrificing beauty or convenience. Compact as it is, the plan permits good separation of different areas and an easy center traffic flow. Just off the entry is the den or bedroom. Note its accessibility to the three-quarter bath which can also be entered from the service-kitchen area. This bath—as well as the family bath—has a pullman lavatory plus its own linen or storage closet.

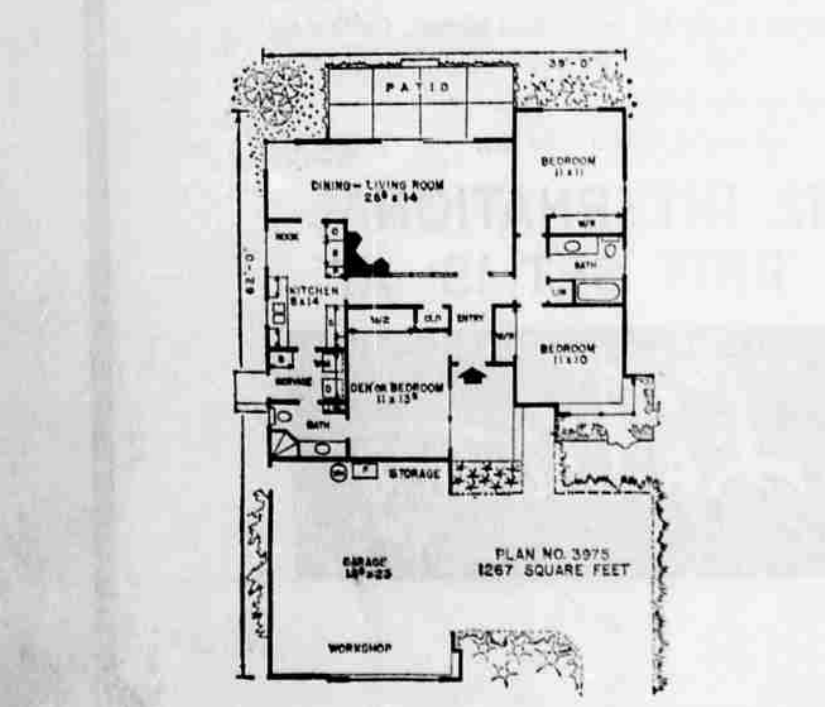
Informal Entertaining
The living room, dining ell and adjoining patio provide an area for either formal or informal entertaining, outdoor dining, lounging and casual living. No kitchen can be truthfully called modern today unless it is equipped with the latest building provides space for the serving of family meals and has an abundant amount of cabinets. This kitchen enjoys all of these conveniences. Roomy wardrobe closets are in each bedroom, a guest closet is near the entry and a broom closet is in the service while a deep linen backs up to the tub in the family bath. Exterior Design
Too many of today's builders give very little attention to the exterior design of their attached garages. This is becoming more important as the width of the house decreases. This situation is certainly not true in this instance. The ridge of the roof runs parallel with the street so that the rough texture of the wood roofing faces the street. A level plate at the front wall allows the roof to be lowered which in turn complements the gable bay and the wide diamond pane window at the front wall. So as to decrease the apparent height of the wall, that portion of the wall in the gable has been projected out past the garage door. Band sawy corbels are located under this projection. Tapered pieces of wood—which in a technical sense are barge rafters on the gable—have been made a part of the garage design. All of this, plus the board and batt siding, the brick veneer and the bay windows at the front of the bedroom combine to complement the front elevation of this striking exterior.

No Action Reported On Paper Firm Sale

Portland—The Federal Trade Commission said today no action had been taken on the proposed sale of St. Helens Paper Co. by Crown Zellerbach to Boise Cascade Corp. The FTC said study of the proposed sale had not been completed. A report from San Francisco Wednesday said the St. Helens mill would be sold to Boise Cascade for \$30 million, minus some equipment and timber. Crown acquired the mill in 1955, but was ordered to divest itself of the property under terms of federal antitrust laws. The U. S. Supreme Court last year upheld the FTC divestiture order.
