Churches Offer Specific Answers To Racial Segregation Problems

By LOUIS CASSELS United Press International "All right, you've convinced me. Segregation is wrong and ought to go. But what can I do about it?" Churches are hearing that question with increasing frequency.

One denomination, at least, has come up with some specific, practical answers. The Church of the Brethren is passing out a little pamphlet entitled "Suggestions on Race Relations." It lists more than two dozen concrete things that individuals and local congregations can do.

The pamphlet doesn't waste words rehearsing familiar arguments about why church members should be involved. It simply says:

"A racial revolution is upon us. We can neither stop it nor delay it. We can only hope to help guide it by active participation in it as concerned Christians."

Suggests Some Action Here are some of the recommendations for individual action:

1. "Take the initiative in becoming well acquainted with Negroes and include them socially in your circle of friends."

2. "Cordially invite non-white persons who are not active elsewhere to your church activities and let them know that they would be welcome as members."

3. "Give a friendly welcome to any non-whites who move into your neighborhood, and encourage your neighbors to accept them."

4. "Offer to rent or sell to non-whites on the same basis as whites, and clearly give this information to your real estate agent."

5. "Let your landlord know that you would welcome non-whites as fellow tenants, and that you favor his renting on an open occupancy basis."

6. "Joint and support those

community agencies which are working for justice and equality among the races."

7. "Inform the business people with whom you deal that you welcome being served by persons without regard to race."

8. "Hire and promote on the basis of merit without regard to race."

9. "Let your employer and fellow employees know that you favor an equal job opportunity employment policy."

10. "Write to your government leaders, urging them to enact and enforce adequate civil rights legislation."

Advice For Congregations For congregations, the pamphlet offers this advice:

1. Adopt a clear-cut policy

that "membership will be accorded with regard to racial background" and make this policy known through local newspapers and other means. One way is to put up a sign near the entrance saying unequivocally: "This church welcomes persons of every race."

2. Institute a special "study course on race relations" for adults and young people, with classes meeting once a week, perhaps on Sunday evening. Concentrate on the real problems of your own community - not those of a distant city or region. Ask the leaders of the Negro community to help you identify "the most serious areas of discrimination" in your town, and to formulate plans for removing them.

3. Organize a "family visitation program" which will enable white and Negro families to exchange visits in each other's homes.

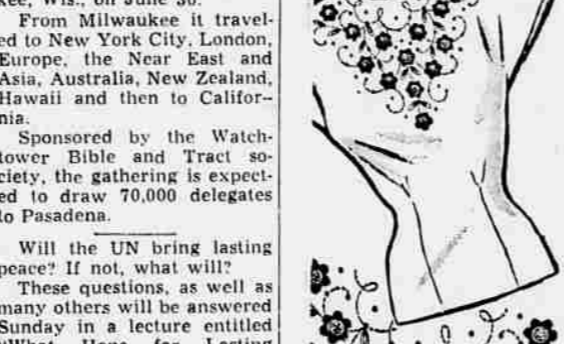
4. Encourage members of the congregation to participate - as representatives of the church - in "non-violent" demonstrations and protests, such as sit-ins.

5. Make direct financial contributions, from the congregational budget, to major civil rights organizations.

6. Join "on an equal basis" with a Negro congregation in sponsoring some joint project such as a worship service, vacation Bible school, talent night, or a community service undertaking.

7. Cooperate with Catholics and Jews and other Protestant groups in mounting an interfaith attack on race problems in your community. If no local interfaith organization exists, take the lead in forming one.

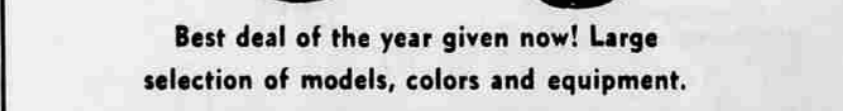
