Father of 'Jeep' Dies of Apparent Overdose of Pills

Dayton, Ohio—UPI—Karl K. Probst, 79, the man who once built a car that didn't run but later became the father of World War II's Jeep, died Sunday at his home after apparently taking an overdose of sleeping pills.

Probst had been ill for several weeks.

Probst was born in West Columbia, W. Va., and moved to Columbus when he was 8 years old. He also lived in Toledo, Lansing and Detroit.

He had remained active in the automotive field in recent years and had just completed a design for an improved Jeep seat. At the time of his death Probst was working on a design for a two-cycle automobile engine.

In 1940 he was asked to design a small military personnel carrier that would be better than one the Germans had. As a consulting engineer for the Bantam Car Co. of Butler, Pa., he drew the plans for the Jeep in seven days.

In 1944, after a dispute between the Willis Overland and the Ford Motor Co. concerning the development of the Jeep, the Federal Trade Commission proclaimed Probst the "father" of the vehicle.

The West Virginia native was a 1906 graduate of the Ohio State University. At the age of 12, he and his great uncle built a car that did not run, and later a bicycle that blew up. As a high school student at Columbus, Ohio, he built one of the four cars in the city in 1901.

In 1932 Probst formed his own consulting firm. He lived much of his life in Detroit, and was a design consultant to Chalmers, Dodge, Chrysler, Reo, Kaiser and other motor car companies. He gained a reputation as a strong advocate of light cars.

He was a member of the Hamilton, Ohio, Seventh-day Adventist church. On April 6, 1920, in Middletown, Ohio, he was married to Gladys Kennedy, who survives.

Other survivors include five sons, Irvin Turvey Jr., Thomas Turvey and Floyd M. Turvey, all Medford; and Lloyd M. Turvey and Timothy R. Turvey, Middletown, Ohio; two daughters, Mrs. Martha A. Jones, Aurora, Colo., and Mrs. Doris J. Harrison, Middletown, Ohio; five brothers, Clifford Turvey, Medford; Raymond Turvey, Portland, Ore.; George Turvey, San Diego, Calif.; and Robert Turvey, and Clarence Turvey, Middletown, Ohio, and 27 grandchildren.

Ginn's Back From National Session In New Orleans

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Ginn returned home Friday from New Orleans where Mrs. Ginn was a delegate to the national convention of Florists Telegraph Delivery association held Aug. 18 to 22. She is representative of the southern Oregon district.

Highlights of the convention included a flower-fashion-decorating design school, the introduction of the new 1964 FTD flowers by wire selection guide, business workshops and the annual members meeting.

Robert C. Cherry, mayor of Paducah, Ky., was elected national president of the association.

FTD is a non-profit association owned and operated by its more than 11,000 retail florist members in North and South America. Through the FTD service, and the service of its international affiliate, Interflora, flowers by wire can be sent practically anywhere in the world.

Instituting a flowers-by-wire catalog among FTD members has brought the biggest change in the industry in the last 50 years, according to Mrs. Ginn. The catalog was mainly responsible for a 4.6 per cent increase in sales over sales of last year. The association's sales for the past fiscal year totaled \$72,872,376.32.

The catalog allows persons wiring flowers to choose the arrangements they will send and to see pictures of what will arrive at the receiver's door. Mrs. Ginn pointed out, Medford Flower shop, Leonard's Flowers and Ginn's Flowers are the Medford members of the Florist's Telegraph Delivery association.
