Widow Testifies In Murder Trial

The Dalles (UPI)—The widow of a man who was shot to death last April testified Tuesday she fled from him to the garage of Dolphus Baker, who is on trial for second degree murder.

Baker, 53, is charged in the shooting death of Richard Bisig, 31, at Rufus 30 miles east of here.

Bisig's widow, Janice, 22, was the state's first witness. She said her husband, who had been gone three weeks on a court order, arrived back to try to persuade her to return to him. She said her glasses were broken and she received a black eye.

Mrs. Bisig said she left on the pretext of telling a babysitter she need not come that night and that her husband kept her son, Brian, 2. She said she drove to the home of a deputy sheriff who was gone, so went to Baker's garage.

The shooting occurred after Bisig came to the garage.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Robert McCrea, from Lane County, asked Mrs. Bisig: "Are you, yourself, glad he's dead?"

"Yes," she replied.

Hatfield Believes Kennedy Can Be Beaten Next Year

Salem (UPI)—President John F. Kennedy can be displaced in 1964 if Republicans are willing to go out in an aggressive fashion and slug it out, Gov. Mark Hatfield said Tuesday.

Hatfield told United Press International "the Republicans have any number of candidates who can displace Kennedy."

He said all Republican hopefuls should enter next spring's presidential primary races and "take their chances." He said the primary races will give the people a voice in selection of candidates.

He denied that New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller could be written off as a Republican presidential candidate in 1964 because polls now show his strength has slipped.

"I don't believe any man can be written off until the final bell has sounded. Rockefeller is still in the race, and while he may appear behind at present, he still can come out on top," Hatfield said.

When asked to comment on Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater's apparent strength in the south, Hatfield said Republican candidates should have national appeal. He said the battle should be fought on the basis of principle and issues, not on sectional differences.

Education Groups Meet for Planning

Portland (UPI)—Officers of the state's education organizations were to meet today as a committee to plan a campaign to sell voters on the legislature's \$60 million income measure before Oct. 13.

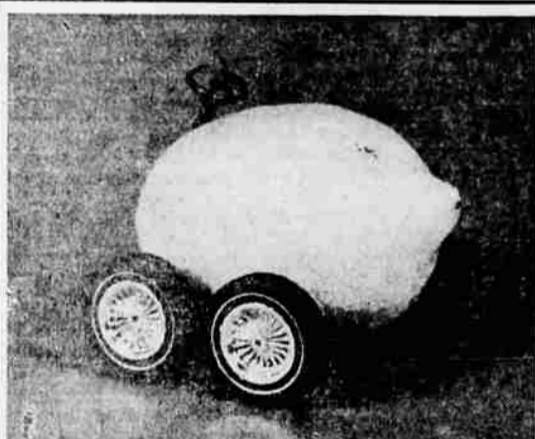
The bill's fate will be determined in a special election brought by referendum.

The committee chairman is Mrs. Stephen Turle, Portland, president of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The committee also invited labor and industry groups to join in the campaign to save the tax bill from defeat.

Most of the \$60 million in new taxes would go to local school districts and state-operated universities and colleges, according to the committee.

The group was formed at a meeting of the Oregon Education Association, PTA and Oregon School Boards Association.

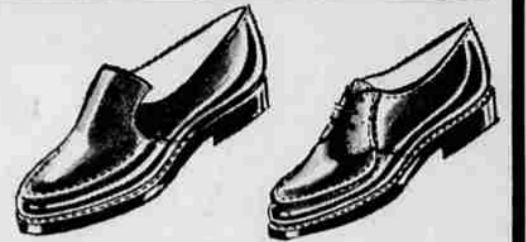
