

Hepped-Up Phils Record 12th Win In 15 Conflicts

Remember the Whiz Kids? They're gone now although their successors could cause the Dodgers the same grief they suffered in 1950.

That was the year the fighting Philadelphia Phillies themselves untracked themselves right at the wire to overcome the Dodgers and win the National league pennant by two games.

It could happen again and the hepped-up Phils, who have finished in the second division the last seven years, actually believe they can win.

"My ball players won't fall over in a dead shock if they come on to win," says manager Gene Mauch. "They honestly feel the equal of any club in this league."

The Phillies certainly are entitled to feel that way with 12 victories in their last 15 games, a record that has moved them within a half-game of third place and within seven games of the faltering first-place Dodgers.

Hall Storm of Homers

The Phils unloaded a hail-storm of home runs in beating the Cubs, 8-7, Wednesday with Ryno Duren tossing in an eye-opening relief job for good measure.

Was Covington's first-inning homer off loser Paul Tom actually put Philadelphia in front for keeps and Clay Dalrymple and Johnny Callison also reached the seats later in the contest.

The Cubs narrowed the gap when they chased winner Dallas Green with a three-run burst in the eighth and that's when Duren came on to do his stuff.

He got Andre Rodgers to hit an infield grounder which forced Lou Brock at the plate, then struck out Nelson Mathews to end that threat and went on to pitch hitless ball in the ninth.

Sudden thought: Wouldn't that be a sight to see Duren pitch in the World Series against his old Yankee club and his old buddy, Ralph Houk?

The Dodgers' lead was cut to 5 1/2 games when they were beaten by the Reds, 9-5, while the second-place Giants downed the third-place Cardinals, 6-3. The Braves tripped the Colts, 6-1, and the Pirates defeated the Mets, 7-2.

In the American league, the Yankees rocked the Red Sox again, 4-1. The White Sox swept a pair from the Indians, 8-3 and 3-1. The Tigers edged the Angels, 2-1, and the Orioles beat the Athletics, 3-1, in the only games scheduled.

Them Bums who used to be in Brooklyn really blew one — they look like they don't really want to win it. They bobble a couple easy grounders and they don't give Lefty Johnny Podres much support.

But they still stand five and a half games ahead of the Giants, San Francisco that is, and after they lose to the Reds, Ol' Walt Alton opines:

For 35 innings the leaders of the Pacific Coast league's Northern division couldn't score a run. But Wednesday night at San Diego, Dick Bernardino finally broke the ice with a solo homerun in the sixth inning.

Then in the seventh, John Werhas got the homer bug and lofted one out of the park with two mates aboard to hand San Diego a costly, 4-1, setback. Had the Padres won they would have been just two games out of first place in the Southern division because Dallas-Ft. Worth whipped Oklahoma City, 4-2, in 11 innings. In other games, Portland shutout Denver, 6-0; Tacoma downed Seattle, 6-0; and Salt Lake City and Hawaii split a twin bill, 2-1. The Bees winning the first, 2-1, and losing the nightcap, 8-4.

A crowd of 10,028 was on hand in San Diego but Joe Moeller was just too much, although Deron Johnson got his 33rd homerun in the fourth.

Record By Alou

Jesus Alou set a Tacoma team record for total hits in a season when he got his 193rd as the Giants downed Seattle. The old mark was held by his brother Matty. Jesus had a three run homer and two singles.

Jim Constable scattered five hits to gain his eighth victory and did not allow a hit after the second inning.

Dallas-Ft. Worth's victory over the 89ers lightened the Southern division race with the Rangers a game and one-half out and San Diego three off the pace. Don Williams picked up the overtime victory as he relieved Max Mecklenburg in the ninth. The winners were outlasted eight to six.

Three Portland hurlers held Denver scoreless as starter Bob Flynn was credited with his seventh victory. He was relieved in the seventh inning. Bill Harrell and John Wojcik were the big hitters for the Beavers.

Portland officials have appealed a ruling by President Dewey Soriano which removed a 2-1 victory for Portland over San Diego Aug. 18. The appeal went to Frank Shaughnessy, president of the Minor leagues.

Although outlast 8-4 in the opener, Salt Lake City took a 2-1 decision from Hawaii on a game winning double by Don Davis.

SF's Optimistic Giants Will Face Dodgers in Series at LA

San Francisco—UPI—The San Francisco Giants, bursting at the seams with optimism, winged their way to Los Angeles today to take on the front-running Los Angeles Dodgers in the big showdown for the National league pennant.

With their home run bats booming and the pitchers once again going the distance, the Giants finished off a nine-game home stand Wednesday by bombarding the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3, on the strength of four circuit clouts and Billy O'Dell's six-hit pitching.

Tonight big Bob Bolin draws the task of going to the mound for San Francisco against the great Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers.

Bolin Rested

Manager Alvin Dark decided on Bolin following his six-inning shutout relief stint against Cincinnati last week. Bolin has been rested since that time.

"The fact that we've gotten well-pitched games, from Juan Marchal, Jack Sanford and O'Dell in the past three games helped give our bullpen a rest," said Giants' pitching coach Larry Jansen.

"The about-face came when our hitters went to work early and got them some runs. It makes a difference when you have a few runs cushion to work on."

On Wednesday Chuck Hiller hit a homer with a man on in the first inning; Tom Haller hit one in the second and Haller and Orlando Cepeda hit back-to-back homers in the fourth.

All the blows came off Bob Gibson who went the distance and was charged with his eighth defeat against 14 wins. The victory was O'Dell's 12th against six losses.

State Policeman Urges That Huntsmen Try To Practice Safety Rules

"Let's try to practice our safety rules," counseled State Policeman Rafe Anders yesterday at the noon luncheon of Medford Kiwanis club.

Anders, who is with the game law enforcement division of state police, spoke concerning the forthcoming hunting seasons in Oregon.

Anders, who ranks 10th in the nation in pistol shooting after recent national matches at Camp Perry, Ohio, cautioned hunters among Kiwanians concerning firearms safety. "Accidents could be avoided if people used good sense," he remarked.

"We're killing too many people," the state policeman declared. "It's unnecessary," he said, adding that it is hard to find anyone who can imitate a deer or bear in the woods.

Deer Outlook Good

Anders advised hunters to get permission of property owners to hunt on their land and spoke of the complaints received by his department of persons being disrespectful of the property of others.

Anders predicted good hunting for deer hunters in this area. He said that between Fish Lake and Howard prairie he had noted more deer than he had seen for many years. The officer indicated good grouse and pheasant hunting but noted that few ducks have been seen, locally. Concerning the dove and band-tail pigeon season which opens Sunday, Anders said that he hadn't seen any band-tails yet this season in the valley. He pointed out that these pigeons are migratory. The state policeman mentioned that fall hunting in this area will open Saturday with the archery deer season in the Greensprings unit. He brought out that archers this year will not be allowed to shoot their arrows from vehicles as they have in the past.

Hambletonian Trot Won By Scot as Anticipated

Duquoin, Ill. —UPI—Speedy Scot won the Hambletonian as expected, but it wasn't easy, and the big bay colt had to break a 15-year-old speed record of his granddaddy to chalk up the triumph.

The classic trotter from Castleton Farm came from behind to win the 2nd and 3rd heats of the \$115,549 stake in 1:58 and 1:58 2-5, and posted a total clocking of 3:54 to better the all-age record for three heats divided, 5:58 1-5 by Rodney, in 1948.

Rodney, who finished second in the Hambletonian in 1947, was the sire of Speedster, a fifth place finisher in the 1957 Hambletonian and the father of Speedy Scot.

Wednesday's win was the first Hambletonian victory for Ralph Baldwin, Speedy Scot's driver, in 13 tries.

Speedy Scot, a 2-5 favorite by virtue of his five victories in six starts going into the Hambletonian, was hard pressed in every heat by underdogged Floris, a chestnut piloted by the oldest driver in the race, 60-year-old Harry Pownall.

Set World Mark

Floris not only set a world record by taking the first heat in 1:57 3-5, but caught the pacemaking Speedy Scot in the stretch to do it. The previous world mark for three-year-old trotters was 1:58 1-5 by Caleb in 1961.

Floris' triumph also was in the fastest time ever recorded in the Hambletonian, and Speedy Scot could do no better than the second fastest time ever with his 1:58. His 1:58 2-5 clocking in the deciding heat equalled the previous Hambletonian record set by victorious Harlan Dean in 1961.

Speedy Scot and Floris actually made the race a two-horse contest, before a record crowd of 41,280, even though 14 started and 11 remained for the 3rd heat.

The Chicago White Sox are caught up in another fight, and for a change this is one they can win.

For the last few months, the White Sox have been chasing the New York Yankees for the American league lead. This drive apparently hit a dead end last week when Chicago dropped three of four games at New York.

The payoff for second place isn't nearly as sweet, but it's one the White Sox could savor after a hard year's work. And instead of worrying about the Yankees, they're concerned now with the Minnesota Twins and Baltimore Orioles.

Chicago moved a full game up on the third-place Twins by sweeping a doubleheader from the Cleveland Indians Wednesday night, 8-3 and 3-1. Pitching, long the team's strength, counted heavily again as Juan Pizarro, Eddie Fisher and Jim Brosnan total 10 hits.

Pizarro Fans 10

Pizarro, working with only two days rest in the first game, struck out 10 and was touched for just six hits in gaining his 16th victory against eight losses.

Fisher pitched three-hit ball in the nightcap before being removed for a pinch hitter in the ninth inning, and Brosnan came in to save his seventh triumph in 15 decisions.

Baltimore trimmed the Kansas City Athletics, 3-1, but still lost ground in the chase for second place, falling two games behind the White Sox. In afternoon contests, the Yankees beat the Boston Red Sox, 4-1, and the Detroit Tigers edged the Los Angeles Angels, 2-1. Minnesota and Washington were not scheduled.
