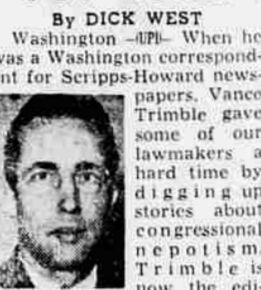
Greyhound Drivers Receive Certificates
