Ed Simmons Ousts Justin Smith, Andy Toyly Spills Larry Butler In Southern Oregon Golf Tourney

Eddie Simmons, veteran golfer of the home links, pulled off a repeat of his club championship finale yesterday and surged into the quarterfinals of the Southern Oregon tourney here.

Simmons ousted medalist Justin Smith, another Medfordite, 4 and 2 to gain a berth in this morning's round of eight. Joining Simmons in quarterfinals were Roy Morgan, Royal Oaks; Harvey Woods, Ashland; Rob Ashman, Bellevue, Wash.; Bob Smith, Portland and Fort Ord, Calif.; and Lynn Creason, Jim Sheldon and Dr. Dave Boals, all of Medford.

Like six times winner Simmons, Creason is a former Southern Oregon champ. Ashman was the 1962 Pacific Northwest Golf association amateur champion. Smith, Sheldon and Boals have been runners-up in this traditional Labor day holidays event at Medford's Rogue Valley Country club.

Stacey Victory

With initial teeoff time at 9 a.m. today it will be Simmons versus Morgan, Woods against Ashman, Bob Smith against Creason and Sheldon playing Boals. Morning winners will vie in afternoon semifinals with teeoff at 2:30 o'clock.

Defending champion Pam Stacey, past champions Helen Davies and June Robinson, along with Mildred Maxwell won ladies' quarterfinals yesterday and go out this morning in semifinals of championship flight competition. Miss Robinson goes against Mrs. Stacey. Davies at 8:20 a.m. Miss Stacey opposes Mrs. Maxwell.

In the senior division Andy Toyly, Red Bluff, Calif., a veteran of some 15 Southern Oregon tournaments, spoiled the bid of Larry Butler, Ashland, to defend his title. Toyly nicked the Southern Oregon college professor 1 up.

The outcome put Toyly against past champion Carl Schmidt, Medford, who won from Cy Harbeck, Denver, Colo., yesterday, 6 and 5.

Finals Monday

Dave Hill and Marvin Clark, both Grants Pass, lead off the senior semis at 12:10 p.m. today. Yesterday Hill downed Vern Hallin, Eureka, Calif., 6 and 4, while Clark won from E. A. Pearson, Medford, 5 and 4.

Finals in the tourney will be played on Monday in the 36-hole tournament. Men's championship match teeoff times are 9:30 a.m. and 2:15 p.m. for the 18s of the 36-hole match. Ladies' times are 9:15 a.m. and 2 p.m. Senior title tussle will begin at 1:30 p.m. Only in the men's and women's championship flights are the final matches 36 holes. All others are 18.

In the men's quarterfinals Morgan rallied over Harry Millette, Yreka, Calif., 2 and 1. Woods beat Mickey Shaw, Milwaukie, 3 and 2. Ashman whipped George Mack, Portland, 4 and 2. Smith downed Tim Berg, Medford, 3 and 1. Creason tripped Ed Kovacovich, Eureka, 2 and 1. Sheldon turned back Ron Mitchell, Chico, Calif., 3 and 2, and Boals trimmed Bob Wolsborn, Portland, 2 and 1.

Lack Luster

It was a lack luster day yesterday in the women's championship bracket as Miss Robinson, Albany, beat Mrs. Helen Root, Redmond, 3 and 1. Mrs. Davies, Medford, subdued Mrs. Tom Teutsch, Eugene, 5 and 4. Miss Stacey, Medford, defeated Mrs. Wil-

lyam Miller, Medford, 7 and 6 and Mrs. Maxwell, Lodi, Calif., nipped Mrs. Lloyd Brooks, Medford.

None of the ladies played sensationally. Miss Robinson and Mrs. Maxwell had close battles on their hands. Mrs. Davies had a spotty game and Miss Stacey had problems with her shots on the fairways. Her tee shots and close game were adequate.

Miss Robinson trailed Mrs. Root by two holes after three holes, losing the second hole to a bird and the third when she double bogied. The 1961 champ then began to collect her game and was even on No. 6. She birdied No. 7 and went on to a 3 up lead at the turn. She lost the next two holes to pars but bogied No. 12 for 2 up. Miss Robinson was 3 up after a par on 13 but lost 14-40 a bird and dropped 15. She closed out by taking 16 and 17, birdying the latter.

Boals' Bogged

Mrs. Maxwell said she had a "bad day." She also was down two after three holes. She was 1 down at the turn and 2 down after 18 but was even after 12. The Lodi player fielded another bogie but got even on 17 and took 18 with a par to finish.

Mrs. Davies, seven times champ, was never down and she held a 4 up gap after nine holes.

Simmons, who defeated Smith in the recent RVCC men's (Rural) match, pulled away from the medalist after Smith missed a chance to pull even on No. 12 hole. A six-foot putt for a bird refused to go in for Smith, who said his partner was "like an iceberg." Simmons holed an eight-footer for a par.

The past champion was one over par for his match. He was 3 up after birdies on holes seven and eight but lost his advantage with bogies on nine and 10.

Nerves Trained

Morgan was never down in his match more than one but never up more than two. The match was even at 12 holes. Morgan won 13 and 14 to go 2 up. Woods was two over par and never trailed against Shaw. He hit the ball well although he did not score well. He encountered a penalty on No. 4, when he lapped his ball while lining up a putt.

Young Ashman played one under par golf and was three up after nine holes.

Long putts were the feature of Bob Smith's victory. He put in one 40-footer. He wound up one under par after being three below at one time. Creason was another with one below course standard. He was four up after eight holes. Sheldon was two under and one up at the turn of his match and one under going into 15 where he double bogied.

Great Shot

An eight-foot shot that dropped four feet from the pin enabled Boals to close his match with a bird when he needed it. Boals was 4 up after eight holes but lost nine and 10. Wolsborn's bird on 15 shrank the gap to one hole. The doctor was two over par.

Hill and Clark were even par in their respective matches. Hill had consecutive birds on No. 5, 6 and 7 holes and Clark had two birdies.

Toyly battled back from a two-hole deficit to beat Butler. The Red Bluff golfer was two holes down after 12. Toyly won 14 with a bird but he looked in trouble on 15 when he shanked a shot into the

rough and then hit to within 20 feet of the green. However, he chipped in from some 40 feet out for a par to win the hole. That evened the match.

The Californian went ahead with a par on 16 the next two holes were halved.

Schmidt was two under par his match. For the route he was two over standard.

Medalist, Past Champs Win Friday's Men's Matches In RVCC's Golfing Classic

Medalist Justin Smith, past champs Eddie Simmons and Lynn Creason and 1962 runner-up Bob Smith all triumphed on Friday in the second round of men's title flight contention of the Southern Oregon Golf tournament at Rogue Valley Country club here.

One past champion, Dom Provost, was eliminated. Justin Smith and Creason gained yesterday's third round with subpar Friday play. Bob Smith was one over standard and Simmons three over.

Medalist Justin downed fellow Rogue Valley club

member, Dr. Jim Wilson, 5 and 2 with a two below par round. Creason, Medford, who took the title in 1958, downed Jim Smith, Grants Pass, 7 and 6 and was also two under with a couple of conceded six-foot putts.

Simmons, another Medfordite, who has won the top Southern Oregon prize six times and is the reigning RVCC club champion, turned back A. B. Johnson, Eugene, 2 and 1, despite three-putting on four greens. Bob Smith was 3 and 2 winner over Paul Moore, Medford, who on Thursday had spilled past champ Bob Atkinson, Portland, 3 and 2.

Minnesota Move Aid To Pascual

Not so long ago, friend and foe alike would have invited a deep scowl had they dared mention home runs within hearing distance of Camilo Pascual.

Opposing batters were reminding him often enough of his one big pitching weakness.

Pascual reached his low point in 1956 when he gave up 34 home runs, at that time an American league record, and lost 18 games in 24 decisions. Not helping him any was the fact he had worked for the Washington Senators, flabbi-tallenders even then, and got little hitting support of his own.

The move from Washington to Minnesota during the expansion three years ago apparently brought out the muscles in his teammates and the sharpness in Pascual because the home run now is coming off the bat.

The long ball meant the difference again Friday night as Herman Killebrew and Bob Allison spanked back-to-back homers to snap a tie and provide the Minnesota Twins with a 5-3 victory over the Chicago White Sox. The win marked Pascual's 18th success of the season.

Side effects of the Twins' most recent power display include: A league record for most home runs in 19 consecutive games, 24; a league record for most homers in six consecutive games, 20; and a tie for most homers in five straight games, 19.

2nd Flight Captured By Miller

Mike Miller, Medford, defeated Guy Gordon on the 20th hole Friday to win the second flight in the Pacific Northwest Golf association junior boys' championship at Tualatin Country club.

Tualatin—UPI—Scott Smith of Lake Oswego captured the Pacific Northwest Golf association junior boys' championship Friday.

The 17-year-old Smith defeated Steve Dossing of Warrenton 4 and 3 in the 36-hole final of his five-day tournament at the Tualatin Golf and Country club.

Smith was the first Oregon player to win the title since Tom Minger of Portland took the crown in the 1956 tourney at Tacoma.

Dallas Tops SF 37-24

Bakersfield, Calif.—Bakersfield Forty Niner fans at least had an excuse today for their team's fourth straight National football league exhibition defeat.

Quarterback John Brodie hit 6 of 14 passes for 161 yards in a hot first half that saw the Prospectors build up a 21-13 lead. But Brodie bruised his forearm and did not perform in the second half. Bobby Waters was cold as ice and Dallas went on to pull out a 37-24 decision.

Rookie halfback Jim Stiger, who played his junior college football at Bakersfield, thrilled the hometown crowd of 9,927 by scoring two second half touchdowns to turn the tide.

He scored from 35 yards out in the final stanza to clinch the win shortly after a brief altercation between San Francisco tackle Bob St. Clair and Cowboy halfback Jerry Norton emptied both benches.

Highlights of that first half saw Brodie hit a 69-yarder to Jim Johnston that set up one touchdown and a 62-yarder to Bernie Casey that scored another. Abe Woodson rambled on a 63-yard punt return for a third score.

Collegiate Gridders Report for Practice At Western Schools

More than 2,000 college football players reported for practice Saturday—all with ambitions pointing toward fame and fortune on the gridiron.

About 400 reported in the Big Six, which will furnish the Western representative for the Rose Bowl. Another 200 reported to top independent schools. And about 1,200 to the smaller schools. From Cal Poly and Fresno State in the California Collegiate Athletic association to such teams as Whitworth, Oregon Tech and Humboldt State in the minor leagues.

The star attractions in the weekend of picture taking and first practices will be at University of Southern California, where the Trojans are setting up shop to defend their ranking as the Nation's No. 1 team.

There are 27 returning lettermen for Coach Johnny McKay, and a total of 63 men reporting. Among these will be the famous "Four B's" who helped the Trojans to a Rose Bowl victory last season: quarterback Pete Beathard, end Hal Brogale, halfback Willie Brown and lineman Damon Bame.

Stiffen From UCLA

These men, along with other prospects, posed for the cameramen Friday and got down to the battle of hard knocks yesterday.

The Trojans stiffen competition for the Rose Bowl berth this year is expected to come from UCLA. But the

Washington had 90 Huskies showing up for pictures and equipment. Of these, 17 are lettermen and eight are starters. Among them is the fabulous Junior Coffey, who may be the best fullback in the world.

Washington State came up for work with 63 players returning from last season. Among these is quarterback Dave Matheson. But Matheson doesn't have Hugh Campbell to throw his pass to this time and may run into trouble. Campbell graduated and is playing for the San Francisco Forty Niners this season.

Big Task

Stanford sent 62 men to greet new coach John Ralston, who has a big task ahead of him trying to mold a winning combination.

Among the independents, the favorite probably will be Oregon, where coach Len Casanova has 63 men returning, including the man who is rated as the greatest fullback in America, Mel Renfro. Oregon State must go to the post this year without Terry Baker, the All-American quarterback who now is calling signals for the Los Angeles Rams in the National Football league.

About 50 men reported to practice at San Jose State and at College of Pacific, 43 men turned out.

The smaller schools will have good talent reporting at the start of next week—or whenever their regular scholastic schedule opens.

60 Gridders Turn Out at U of Idaho
