## MANOR-ISMS

A number of new members have recently moved into the Manor. Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Melville from Santa Rosa, Calif., came primarily because Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Stevens are residing here. Mr. Melville is a brother of Mrs. Stevens. Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Koehn, Davenport, Iowa, and Mrs. and Mrs. Wm. J. Powell, Corvallis, Ore., have been with us long enough now to feel right at home. Also Mrs. C. Howell, Trenton N.J., and Allen Buck, Louisville, Ky., Capt. Nelson H. Goss, Coronado, Calif., another new member, and Mrs. M. J. McCullough.

The addition of these new members helps to maintain our remarkable ratio of 100 to 1 with charges all the time of course. This ratio is so remarkably high that it indicates that the majority of retirement projects run about 70 to 1. This is a very average in our national population now-a-days. The large number of couples and men in our membership tends to enrich our recreation programs, such as square and ballroom dancing, bowling, shuffleboard contests and, perhaps surprisingly, pool games. Many women are practicing diligently and readily challenge our men pool-sharks, often successfully.

Some time ago I mentioned that we could produce an entire college faculty in the Manor from members who are teachers of long experience in a variety of subjects. I was not being entirely facetious. Without research in depth—our Administrative office lacks time and facilities for detailed statistics—a casual inquiry would indicate that some 65 or more members as probably 65 or more, give or take a few either way. We have 16 members affiliated with the Jackson County Retired Teachers' association. I am told, and I find that some of our military, clergy, missionaries and medical missionaries included an academic career in their activities. Such a large number of

teachers in the Manor is somewhat surprising, since their home state undoubtedly had or had retirement homes for teachers. The probable explanation is that, after investigation, these teachers found that the Manor offered more of the services they desired. They would require a better chance to live a more comfortable, interesting and active life than was available elsewhere.

Other interesting statistics popped up, such as a dozen or more clergymen and missionaries; and retired military service men, government administrative and executive officials, and scientists. But these are public health nurses, welfare administrators, social workers, et cetera. But there are about 100 members here.

Mr. and Mrs. Shelby Tuttle provided an interesting and pleasant diversion when they arranged for a number of Manor friends to have a Mexican dinner at the Fruit Growers league camp north of Medford. Aside from the fact that (for us) polysaturated oil was used for cooking and frying, on hot seasonings, we had the usual authentic Mexican dishes—and everything was delicious and very much enjoyed. The kitchen and mess hall were spotlessly clean and comfortable.

The short fruit crop has greatly reduced the number of pickers this year, but we were much interested in the camp and the accommodations provided for the men. The barracks in which the men are housed is in a grove of large oak trees and were formerly used by the military.

The recent visit of Manor member Mark Goldy's son, Lt. Mark Goldy, was enjoyed by his many old friends in the valley, as well as new friends in the Manor. Lt. Goldy has just finished a tour of duty in Hawaii, in charge of the crew of his P2V plane in the Naval Air Service, and has been assigned to Washington, D.C. for a two year study in Naval Intelligence.
