Salem — A number of southern Oregon residents have received ribbons for entries in the Oregon State fair under way here.

Carol Foote, Central Point, won reserve champion honors for her Cheviot ewe fleece in the 4-H wool show at the fair. Mike Elmore, Applegate, received a blue ribbon for his Corriedale ewe fleece.

Laura Noble, Eagle Point, received a blue ribbon in 4-H food preparation judging and for her decorated cake in the juniors division.

Mrs. Orville Hamilton, Central Point, and Modoc Orchards, Medford, each received a blue ribbon for their entries of boxes of pears and Delmar Smith, Central Point, a blue ribbon in the tree fruits, pears, category. Charles Taylor, Central Point, won a blue ribbon for his plate display of pears.

Otto Bohnert, Central Point, received a blue ribbon for his entry in the prunes, plums and peaches division and Ben Fulton, Butte Falls, a blue ribbon in the other tree fruits and berries division.

Double Drowning Takes Mother, Son

Aberdeen, Wash. — (UPI)—A double drowning Saturday marred the Labor Day holiday on Grays Harbor. A 37-year-old Seattle woman, Mrs. Dorothy Trueblood, and her 11-year-old son, Mark, were the victims.

The drownings occurred just north of Ocean Shores, about 21 miles west of here.

Mark had gone into the surf with a rubber air mattress during an outgoing tide. His mother saw him fall off the mattress and went out after him. She was caught by an undertow and pulled under as her husband, David Trueblood, and three other children stood helplessly by.

A group of tourists on the beach launched a boat and recovered Mrs. Trueblood's body. Resuscitation efforts by State Trooper Gale Stokes and Pete Anderson of Buckley failed to revive Mrs. Trueblood. She was pronounced dead on arrival at an Aberdeen hospital.

Searchers were unable to find the boy's body.
