

Green Bay Takes Measures With Giants by 24-17 Win

Green Bay, Wis. (UPI) Jimmy Taylor of the Green Bay Packers met Sam Huff and the New York Giants head again Monday night.

And again the Packers took the measure of the Giants, as they have in the past two National Football League title games—this time by a 24-7 count.

Taylor ground out 95 yards rushing, scored two touchdowns, had another called back and was pulled down from behind while apparently on his way to still another.

Taylor's touchdowns twice pulled the Packers from behind. Huff, the villain in last year's playoff game when Taylor received one of his worst beatings ever, surrendered that role to end Andy Robustelli in this one. It was Robustelli who hauled down Taylor after a 45-yard gallop to the New York 42.

And it was Robustelli who gave Taylor his biggest working over. Taylor returned the compliments—but got a penalty for it. He was called for a personal foul after roughing up Robustelli shortly after the start of the second quarter. The penalty pushed the Packers into a hole and helped set up the first score of the game—a 12-yard field goal by Don Chandler.

Herb Adderley pulled the Packers ahead on the ensuing kickoff by taking Chandler's boot on the goal line and returning it 100 yards.

An eight-yard run by rookie Nat Craddock and one of the wildest plays ever seen in City Stadium gave New York its scores.

On the last play of the first half, Erich Barnes tapped a Bart Starr pass in the direction of Jim Patton who intercepted on the New York nine. Patton returned 24 yards and then lateraled to Dick Lynch who went 67 more for the touchdown that gave New York a 17-14 half-time lead.

Jerry Kramer's 24-yard field goal grounded Green Bay insurance late in the third quarter. The Baltimore Colts emerged as the only unbeaten team in the pro football ranks when they rallied to down the Washington Redskins 27-21 for their fourth straight victory Saturday night.

In other NFL holiday week-end action, the Philadelphia Eagles turned back the previously unbeaten Minnesota Vikings 34-27, the Cleveland Browns whipped the Los Angeles Rams 23-14, and the St. Louis Cardinals scored a comeback 17-14 victory over the Chicago Bears.

The San Diego Chargers wound up with the best record among American Football League clubs at the conclusion of the exhibition schedule. The Chargers downed the Oakland Raiders 13-3 for their fourth victory in five tuneups Saturday night.

The Buffalo Bills downed the Denver Broncos 21-14, the Houston Oilers turned back the defending champion Kansas City Chiefs 23-17, and the New York Jets scored their first victory by edging the Boston Patriots 22-20 in the AFL's other final exhibition tussles.

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Even though the second-place St. Louis Cardinals kept pace with a doubleheader sweep of their own, 6-1 and 6-2 over Pittsburgh, the Dodgers retained a six-game lead with only 25 to go.

And Los Angeles certainly showed no signs of folding as the Koufax fanned 13 batters in the opening game to close in on his own National League record of 269 for a season. He now stands at 259 and, the way he's going, could break the record the next time out. His 21 wins are tops in the majors.

The Tigers bounced back to win the nightcap 2-1 behind Hank Aguirre, but what did that matter to the Yankees? Their nearest "pursuers," the Chicago White Sox, also settled for a split against the Los Angeles Angels—pulling out an 8-7 victory after losing the opener 7-5.

The Cleveland Indians blasted the Washington Senators 15-3, and then dropped an 8-7 verdict; the Boston Red Sox turned back the Baltimore Orioles twice, 4-3 and 2-0, and the Minnesota Twins won a pair from the Kansas City Athletics, 6-2 and 3-1.
