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Roy M. Cohn Under Indictment For Perjury

Inducing False Testimony Charged

New York — (UPI) — Roy M. Cohn, 36, lawyer-industrialist who was counsel for the late Sen. Joseph McCarthy's investigations committee, was indicted by a federal grand jury today on charges of perjury and conspiracy to obstruct justice.

The grand jury charged that Cohn had been part of a 1959 conspiracy in connection with federal prosecution of four financiers who allegedly manipulated stock of the United Dye and Chemical Corp.

It also charged that Cohn later induced one of the defendants to "falsely recant" testimony given to a federal grand jury and attempted to get another witness to give false testimony.

The jury indicted another attorney, Murray E. Gottesman, 56, as co-conspirator. It charged that Cohn and Gottesman agreed to perjure themselves before the grand jury about the 1959 United Dye investigation and obstructed justice this year by giving false testimony about recent meetings.

Cohn, in a press release, said the indictment resulted from the "work of vengeful and frustrated men" who had carried on a two-year campaign of slander and harassment against him. He said he welcomed having the charge made public and would prove its falsity and expose "a rank misuse of the machinery of justice for personal revenge and retaliation."

He accused U. S. Attorney Robert Morgenthau "and company" of heading the "vendetta" against him.

If convicted on all 10 counts of the indictment, Cohn could receive a maximum prison sentence of 40 years and a \$36,000 fine. Cohn and Gottesman will appear Sept. 11 before Federal Judge William B. Herlands.

The indictment said Cohn attempted to induce his longtime business partner in boxing promotion, William D. Fugazy, to give false testimony to the 1959 grand jury. Cohn and Fugazy promoted the Patterson-Johnson world heavyweight title fights in New York in 1960 and 1961.

Contract Awarded For Park Bleachers

This morning the county court awarded a contract for ball park bleachers at \$19,807. Safeway Scaffold Company, Missouri, was the lone bidder.

County Purchasing Coordinator William Cochran recommended the county take the galvanized bleachers. The company would erect \$1,000 if county crews erect the bleachers, he said, but added that county personnel do not have time to do it.

The bleachers are to be erected in time for the football season. They have been changed to allow two aisles 42 inches wide as required by the state fire marshal and city of Medford regulations. No aisles will be required in the two end bleachers so the offered price remains the same, Cochran said.

This will give a 2,800 seating capacity at the ball park. Blacktopping for the bleachers has been done by the county road crew at a total estimated cost of \$900.

Committee to Be Formed to Check Seaside Rioting

Seaside, Ore. — (UPI) — An investigative committee will be formed to look into rioting at this coastal community during the Labor Day holiday week end, it was disclosed at a Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday.

Seaside Chamber President W. A. Ter Har said "we are going to appoint an investigative committee to check out the whole matter. We will go out into the state, everywhere it is necessary to get material for the report which will be forwarded to the city council with recommendations."

About 2,000 young persons clashed with the Oregon state police riot squad, National Guardsmen and city police and firemen Saturday night and Sunday.

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No Hunting Allowed In Recreation Area

Absolutely no bow and arrow hunting will be allowed within the developed recreation area at Howard Prairie lake, County Judge Earl M. Miller said this morning.

He and County Commissioner Donald E. Faber said they had heard reports that people were shooting deer in the water, roping them and pulling them to shore. The reports came from various recreationists using the lake.

Parks and Recreation Director Neil Ledward said no hunting is allowed within 400 feet of the lake.

Judge Miller said the area would be posted and the county's park ranger and the state game commission will be asked to be on the lookout for violators of the posted area.

Miller said he is concerned over the safety of people using the recreation area.

Last year the county, upon recommendation of the state game commission, opened the Howard Prairie area to general hunting after the water level was lowered. Miller made no comment on plans for this season.

Gov. Wallace Fails To Halt Integration

Birmingham, Ala. — (UPI) — Gov. George C. Wallace bowed to the federal government for the second time in three months today and white public schools in Alabama admitted Negro students for the first time below the college level.

Club swinging policemen broke up segregationist demonstrations at two schools in Birmingham and white parents kept their students away from classes in droves in an apparent start of a boycott.

Wallace, however, did not lift a hand to halt the start of desegregation at a white elementary school in Birmingham and the state's largest high school at Mobile.

He remained in bed at the executive mansion in Montgomery, 90 miles away, while the color barriers tumbled here and in Mobile.

It was reported he had a "change of heart" during the night, after sending 200 of his state troopers to Birmingham to make another defiant stand, but Wallace denied this.

"I am determined to resist the efforts to take over our schools. I realize we are against powerful forces," he said.

Next Step Not Told
He did not disclose how he would do this nor did he announce his next battleground.

Mississippi was left as the lone holdout to desegregation at the high and elementary school level less than 10 years after the Supreme Court outlawed school segregation.

Two small Negro brothers slipped into the rear door of Graymont Elementary School in Birmingham and two Negro teen-agers were registered for classes at Murphy High School in Mobile.

Wallace had sent nearly 200 state troopers into Birmingham Tuesday night to turn away the five Negroes who were to enter three white schools today. But the troopers made no appearance at any of the schools.

Last June, Wallace defiantly tried to stop two Negroes from entering the all-white University of Alabama. He backed down, however, when President Kennedy sent troops to enforce their enrollment.

Washington — (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations committee said today it was "entirely satisfied" that the test ban treaty would not keep the United States from using nuclear weapons in wartime. And it said advantages Russia might gain by cheating on the pact are worth the effort.

The committee made statement in releasing a report recommending Senate ratification of the treaty.

Committee members, who earlier voted 16-1 to recommend ratification, said they concluded that the treaty "poses no serious risk" to U. S. ability to make a nuclear strike. Nor, they said, would it appreciably restrict development of a defense system against enemy missiles.

The committee rejected arguments against the treaty made by Dr. Edward Teller, nuclear physicist, and stressed that the test ban first was proposed by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1959. It said "now would seem to be a good time to stop" nuclear explosions in the atmosphere.

Although Russia might "slowly" erode the U. S. nuclear lead in some areas by underground tests, the only kind permitted by the treaty, the committee said the continuance of unrestricted testing might close this gap "much more rapidly."

Los Angeles — (UPI) — George Rivera, 38, was booked on suspicion of murder early today in the death of a passenger on a chartered bus filled with delegates to the Jehovah's Witnesses assembly.

Harold Mather, 38, Roseburg, Ore., died of injuries suffered when he was struck by a car Tuesday night.

Rivera, of Los Angeles, stopped the Greyhound bus returning delegates from Tuesday night's session of the assembly at the Rose Bowl, according to police.

Investigators said Rivera shouted to the bus driver that "I've got hot orders from above for you to return to the yards."

Detectors said Rivera sped off in his car as the driver and Mather stepped out of the bus. He then turned around and bore down on the two men, police said.

Mather was carried 100 feet before the car struck a curb, threw him off and then ran over him. The bus driver was knocked to the pavement but not seriously injured.

District Hires Chief; But It's a Secret
Talent — A new chief for the Talent Rural Fire Protection district was employed by the district board last night, but board members kept his identity a secret temporarily—at the man's request.

The district will be unable to retain the new chief on a full-time basis before mid-October, it was explained, so that it will be necessary for the man to stay in his present job until that time.

Former chief Ralph Connor resigned as of Sept. 1.

County Court Visits Ski Area Construction Site

Progress on construction work at the Mt. Ashland ski area is progressing more rapidly than expected, County Judge Earl M. Miller said this morning after a tour of the site Tuesday.

The concrete foundation is in and the first floor wall up on the Alpine type lodge. The three story structure, except the basement, will be constructed of wood. Weather permitting, the rest of the building should be completed in approximately a month in time for the ski season.

Work on the road into the area is "coming along in good shape," Miller noted. Two or three slide areas have yet to be rockied, then the road will be ready for alignment.

Jackson County Parks and Recreation Director Neil Ledward, who accompanied the county judge and County Commissioner Donald E. Faber, said that the drilling for the well is down 80 feet.

The concrete base for the lower extremity of the T-bar type tow has been poured and the 2,600 foot long ski slope has been smoothed off.

In mid-July the clearing of the beginner's slope had been completed by crews of the Mt. Ashland Corporation and 50,000 board feet of timber has been removed from the main line of the T-bar.

Batzler Construction Company, Medford, is general contractor for the lodge which will include a lounge, dining room, cafeteria, ski rental shop, first aid rooms and manager's quarters. Designer is Robert Bosworth.

Weir Reelected Scenic Board Head
Salem — (UPI) — A. N. Weir, Portland, was reelected chairman of the Scenic Area Commission — at the group's annual meeting here today.

It was the first meeting since the 1963 legislature removed the group from the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land and placed it under the State Highway Department.

Also elected were Harold Schick, Salem, ice chairman, and Mrs. George Dewey, Salem, secretary. Schick is state parks superintendent for the Highway Department.

The board appointed W. Ross of the Highway Department as its executive secretary, replacing Harry Barker of the Bureau of Land.

Three Illegal Entries Under Investigation
Medford city police investigated three break and entries in the city Tuesday.

Officers said Crystal Springs Packing Company, 741 South First St., was broken into sometime Monday night. Entrance was gained through a window. A safe, filing cabinet and two automatic coin machines were rifled, but firm spokesmen said nothing was missing.

Investigations were also made of an illegal entry at Lumber Products, 735 South Grape St., and of an attempted entry at a private residence at 509 Boardman St., officers said.

Two California women received minor facial cuts when the station wagon in which they were riding struck and killed a horse last night on Highway 99, south of Ashland, state police said.

A horse owned by William Erwin Purdy, 696 Liberty St., Ashland, trotted directly in front of the car driven by Sandra K. Tuttle, 29, El Sobrante, Calif. Her passenger was Rose Marie Coopy, 22, of El Cerrito, Calif.

Johnson Lunches With King Gustaf; Sees Air Display

Aengholm, Sweden — (UPI) — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, sticking to a Texas-size schedule on the second day of a five-nation goodwill tour, arrived here today for lunch with King Gustaf VI and Queen Louise.

Johnson, accompanied by his wife, Lady Bird, and their 10-year-old daughter Lynda Bird, arrived from Tullinge Air Force Base outside Stockholm, where earlier in the day he saw an impressive display by Swedish-built "Dragon" jet fighters.

"Really Impressed"
At Tullinge, the vice president said he was "really impressed" by the performance of the super-sonic "Dragon" fighters which went through their paces for him.

The Swedish public, accustomed to the cool dignity of Swedish politicians, appeared favorably impressed by Johnson's friendly manner, big smile and ready handshake.

The vice president turned on the Texas charm despite a near disaster aboard the U. S. Army helicopter carrying him and his family into Stockholm from the airport. The helicopter hooked a wheel into a wooden fence during the landing approach to the heliport.

Children Scatter
A crowd of school children on hand to greet the vice president scattered for safety as the fence splintered, but the helicopter landed safely.

Johnson will fly to Finland Friday to continue the 15,000-mile tour that will also take him to Norway, Denmark, Iceland and the Danish-owned island of Greenland.

Residents Object To Route of Sewer
Jacksonville — A number of residents came to the Jacksonville City Council meeting last night to take issue with plans for sewer lines across their properties in connection with the city's sewer system now under construction.

The residents met with councilmen and Dean Parsons, designing engineer with Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, Corvallis engineering firm which designed the project, for about an hour.

The matter was turned over to Parsons for adjustment with each individual property owner. In other items, councilmen were informed that bills for sewer assessments have been sent to city property owners and that several have already been paid in full.

The council was told by City Attorney Ervin B. Hogan that the federal grant application for the Jacksonville Historic Preservation and Restoration project is tentatively scheduled to be mailed Friday.

Temperature Reaches 99 Degrees for High
Temperatures in Medford Tuesday reached 99 degrees for the second time this summer, for the year's high, the Medford office of the U. S. weather bureau reported today. The first time the high was reached was Aug. 7.

South Vietnamese Study Remarks by Kennedy
Saigon, South Viet Nam — (UPI) — South Vietnamese officials studied President Kennedy's critical remarks about the crisis here today for hints on what course future U.S.-Vietnamese relations will take.

Leaders of President Ngo Dinh Diem's regime were angered by Kennedy's criticism of their policies, but they were relieved that he said the United States would not withdraw from South Viet Nam.

The dispute over the government's crackdown on Buddhist opposition has put in jeopardy the joint Vietnamese-American struggle to wipe out Communist Viet Cong guerrillas.

Last week French President Charles de Gaulle extended an offer of "cordial cooperation" to the Vietnamese to help them solve their problems independently of "foreign influence."

Communist China reacted strongly to the Kennedy remarks Tuesday with new charges of U.S. interference in South Viet Nam while the Vietnamese "are struggling with increasing vigor against Ngo Dinh Diem's reactionary rule."

Craft Ploughs Into Ground With Tremendous Roar

One American Among Passengers

Zurich, Switzerland — (UPI) — A Swiss jetliner crashed and burned minutes after taking off from Zurich today, killing all 80 persons aboard, including one American and one-fourth the population of one tiny Swiss village.

Swissair and police officials said the 74 passengers and six crew members apparently died instantly when the plane ploughed into the ground with a tremendous roar. The American victim was listed by Swissair as a "Mr. Glauner, U.S.A."

The plane left Zurich's Kloten airport at 7:18 a.m. (edt) and crashed five minutes later in a field near the village of Duerrenesch, 20 miles to the west.

Fire and Explosion
Eyewitnesses said the plane caught fire and exploded. Parts of the wreckage struck a nearby house and barn in Duerrenesch, setting them afire but miraculously killing or injuring no one on the ground.

The plane tore a crater 35 feet deep in an open field, and the force of the impact was so great that it pulverized the bodies. The largest piece of a human body found was a hand. The plane disintegrated.

Officials conducting preliminary investigations had no immediate explanation for the crash, and they would not confirm that an explosion occurred in the air.

Flying at 9,000 Feet
At the time of the accident, officials said the plane was flying in clear weather at about 9,000 feet. But there was a thick fog on the ground at the scene of the crash.

The Caravelle, on a flight to Rome via Geneva, carried at least six foreigners, one each from the United States, Britain, Israel, Belgium, Egypt and Iran. The rest were Swiss, including 44 of the approximately 200 residents of the tiny Swiss village of Humlikon.

The Humlikon residents, mostly farmers, had been collecting funds for months to make a collective trip to Geneva to visit an agricultural samples plant.

Great Day
This was the great day. All 44 gaily singing and cheering Humlikoners—a many married couples—went to Zurich to board the French-built Caravelle. Many had never seen a plane from close up.

The crash was the first major disaster in Switzerland's 32-year history. The airline's worst previous crash was in 1959 when a Junkers airliner crashed near Konstanz, Germany, killing four persons.

Castro Threatened With Retaliation
Miami — (UPI) — The civilian leader of the 1961 Cuban invasion announced steps Tuesday to retaliate for further executions in Cuba.

"We have reached the point where we cannot permit these bloody executions to continue unavenged," said Manuel Artime, 32, head of the Revolutionary Recovery Movement based in Central America.

"From now on we are going to kill three of Castro's men for every Cuban who is shot. We are going to kill these men where we find them," said the handsome exile leader.

Artime, one of the 1,113 Bay of Pigs invasion prisoners released by Castro for U.S. ransom last December, said he already had men in Cuba and that by the end of September the political structure of his group will have been shifted from this country to Central America.
