London — (UPI) — Red China, which recently issued a warning it might seek revision of its border with Russia, appeared today to be laying claim to vast areas of Southeast Asia and India.

Defector Trying To Escape To West

By — (UPI) — U.S. Army Capt. Alfred Svensson of Scranton, Pa., who won AWOL four months ago and fled to Communist East Germany, was reported today to be trying to escape to the West.

A U.S. Army spokesman said Svensson, 30, was through a Western news agency bureau in Berlin's Soviet sector that he is doing his best to escape to the West.

The spokesman said he had tried to cross the border into West Berlin several times, only to be caught and punished by Communist police each time.

Svensson crossed the Iron Curtain border near Eisenach in a jeep on May 8. The East German agency ADN said he had asked for asylum in Communist territory.

Attention Aroused — The map was reported published in a recent "History of Modern China." It has aroused considerable attention in Asia, and the issue was raised in New Delhi's Parliament recently.

Jet Fighter Plane Crashes at McChord

Tacoma — (UPI) — An F106 jet fighter-interceptor crashed shortly after take-off from McChord Air Force Base near here shortly before midnight Tuesday.

The pilot, Capt. Webb Huss, Cherryville, N.C., ejected from the craft and suffered only cuts and bruises and slight burns on the neck.

Moreover, India's North East Frontier Agency, Assam, parts of Ladakh and other Indian areas also have been marked as part of China.

Whether Peking will formally denounce the map remains to be seen. It recently denied issuing a map laying claim to Soviet territory.

But last March Peking caused a sensation by mentioning Czarist Russia in the official People's Daily as being among the imperialist powers that carried out "unbridled aggression" against China in the past.

The Peking organ spoke ominously of "unequal treaties" imposed on China and charged they annexed Chinese territory.

Some 300,000 square miles of former Chinese territory is held by Russia, including vast acquisitions in Siberia.

Peking mentioned among treaties "forced" on China by czarist Russia those of Aigun of 1858, of Peking in 1860 and of 1911. All resulted in China ceding territory to Russia.

VISITS STOCKHOLM

Stockholm, Sweden — (UPI) — The U.S. cruiser Newport News was due here today for a five-day visit. The 21,000-ton vessel, with a crew of 1,500 men and officers, was to be welcomed in Stockholm Harbor by the Swedish coastal fleet. It was the first visit here for the battleship.

Peking recently also recalled significantly a statement at the time the People's Republic of China was inaugurated which said that "our government declared it would examine treaties concluded by previous Chinese governments... and would recognize, abrogate, revise or negotiate them according to their respective contents."

Russia has kept quiet to date and apparently has chosen officially to ignore the warning shot from Peking, though diplomatic sources have drawn attention to stepped-up Soviet efforts to develop the empty spaces of Siberia.

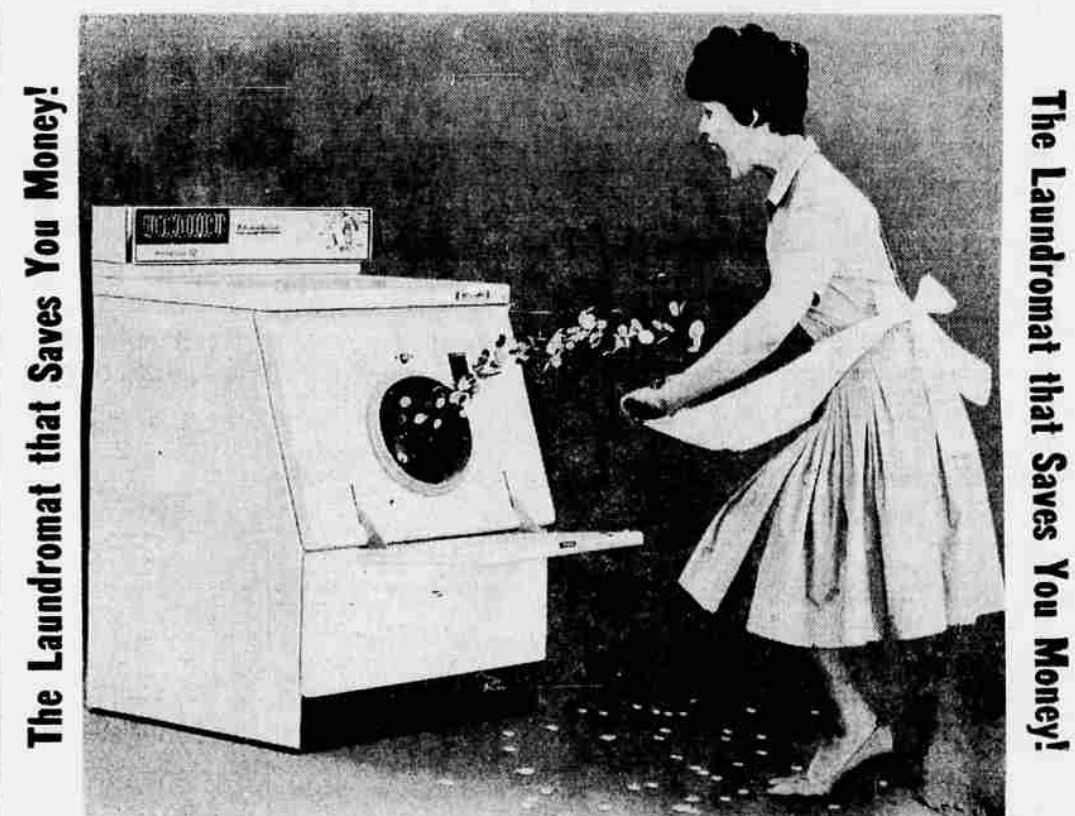
India, less reticent, apparently is out to use the Chinese territorial claims in Asia in support of its own insistence that Peking is pursuing an increasingly expansionist policy.

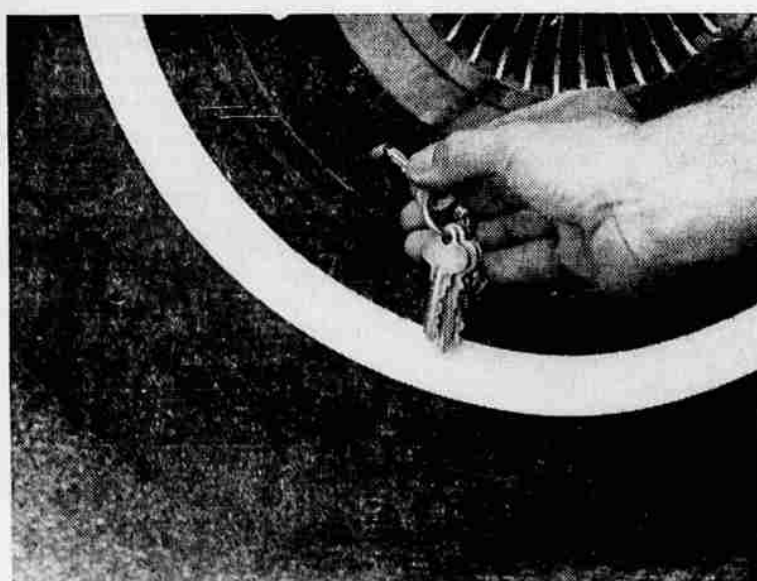
