Albany Man Tells Of Gold Swindle

Los Angeles - (UPI) - A wealthy Albany, Ore., farmer told a Superior Court Tuesday how he was bilked of \$25,000 in a modern day gold brick swindle.

A. M. Ropt testified at the trial of Sylvester Thayer, 56, Westminster, Colo., who is accused of selling two briefcases filled with sand, dirt, nails, pieces of steel and a gold-painted brick.

Ropt said he was one of four men roped into buying placer gold. Thayer was arrested in Chicago where he said he had gone to turn the money over to the Secret Service and charge the four men with illegally buying gold.

Ropt, 47, told the jury Tuesday he had agreed to buy contraband gold along with three California men, James W. Plummer of Hayward, Edward D. Sparks of Modesto and James R. Johnson of Sacramento.

He said Thayer gave him a key to a locker at Los Angeles International airport in return for the \$25,000. The locker contained only the sand-filled bags.

Thayer was arrested less than 24 hours later.

Students Invited To Veterinary Clinic

Jackson county high school and Southern Oregon college students interested in careers in veterinary medicine, have been invited to participate in a "career clinic" being held in conjunction with the fall meeting of the Oregon Veterinary Medical association, Sept. 19 to 21 at Medford.

With the profession predicting a shortage of veterinarians within the next decade, a nationwide recruitment program is under way during 1963, the 100th anniversary year of the American Veterinary Medical association.

The career clinic will be staged Saturday, Sept. 21, at 9:30 a.m. at the Jackson county extension office building, Dr. Walter W. Weller, Ashland, a member of the local arrangements committee, will direct the program.

Veterinarians representing various aspects of the profession will serve on the panel. A film, demonstrations and other presentations will disclose to interested young people the dimensions of careers in the field of veterinary medicine.

Students interested in attending the clinic may contact Dr. Douglas P. Phillips, 1455 North Riverside ave., Medford, who is local chairman for the OVMA fall meeting.

Referral Defeat Campaign Launched

Portland - (UPI) - The Citizens Committee for a Yes Vote on the state's \$60 million tax increase has begun its campaign to defeat a referral of the measure here.

Dr. Howard Cherry of the Portland school board and State Rep. Richard Eymann (D-Marcola) spoke at a news conference on the effect of the referral.

Dr. Cherry said defeat of the tax program would mean the Portland school district would lose about \$3 million, or between eight and nine per cent of its budget. He said the loss would run between 8 and 12 per cent in other parts of the state.

Eymann explained the workings of the proposed bill. He said unless educational funds were cut, almost all other phases of state government would have to be abolished to make up the deficit in the second year of the 1963-65 biennium.

Tractor Accidents Claim Many Lives

Champaign, Ill. - (UPI) - Accidents from farm tractors take more than a thousand lives each year, says a University of Illinois Extension safety specialist.

The leading cause of tractor accidents is excessive speed, he says. Other possible causes are defective wheel brakes, rough roads, quick turns, inexperienced drivers and extra riders.

Hogsett says one-third of tractor fatalities occur on public roads. Proper lighting is essential at dusk or darkness, he says, and during daylight hours a red flag on a tall staff will help draw attention of motorists to a slow-moving vehicle.

COAL TO WEST?

New York - (UPI) - Coal, about as rare as snow on the Pacific coast, may some day become as common there as the region's proverbial sunshine. Use of new integral train rail equipment may permit coal to be carried more economically to Pacific coast utilities for the first time in the near future, say rail transportation experts for ACP industries. Such a change, says the company, could open up important new coal-producing areas in New Mexico, Colorado, Utah and Wyoming - all of which have significant untapped coal reserves.
