

Incredible -- No Aussies Left In U.S. Tennis Championships

Forest Hills, N.Y. — (UPI) — What, no Australians? The incredible has happened in the men's singles division of the U.S. tennis championships where four Yanks, two Brazilians, one Mexican and one Briton make up the last eight survivors with nary an Aussie in sight in the quarterfinals for the first time in 13 years.

Lanky Frank Froehling III of Coral Gables, Fla., took out the big one Wednesday with a four-set victory over second-seeded Roy Emerson while Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., accounted for another one in a four-set triumph over young John Newcombe. The other Aussies departed much earlier.

"I don't see how they can leave me off the Davis Cup team now," said the 21-year-old Froehling, the nation's second ranking player who has been having such a miserable campaign he was unseeded here and ignored by Davis Cup selectors.

Next shot was due for his next shot today against sixth-seeded Bobby Wilson of England, one of those surprising British Davis Cuppers the U.S. will have to face at Bournemouth, Eng., later this month.

Ralston was paired against Ron Barnes of Brazil in the other men's feature while top-seeded Chuck McKinley of San Antonio, Tex., Marty Riessen of Evanston, Ill., Rafael Osuna of Mexico and Thomas Koch of Brazil had the day off.

Froehling came in a winner over Emerson, 6-4, 4-6, 9-7, 6-2, and Ralston bounced Newcombe, 6-3, 6-4, 3-6, 7-5. In women's singles, colorful Billie Jean Moffit of Long Beach, Calif., lost in a major upset Wednesday. Miss Catt bounced Billie Jean, third-seeded and Wimbledon runner-up this year, 2-6, 8-6, 7-5, after trailing 3-5 in each of the last two sets.

U.S. Team Choice in Golf Match

Des Moines, Iowa — (UPI) — The United States team of talented amateur golfers was a heavy favorite today to sweep to its 7th straight victory in the America's Cup continental links rivalry over stellar teams from both Canada and Mexico.

Competition in the two-day event began this morning with three "sixsomes," in which each nation had a two-player team hitting alternate shots in match play against both rival countries.

The afternoon competition was to involve six threesomes, in which each nation will have one player competing against both other nations. The same formula will be followed on Friday's concluding two rounds.

Canada Challenger
The U.S., never beaten in the six previous events, was given a chance to post a record number of points for the biennial event, coming closer to the possible 36 points than it did in taking the 1961 event with 29.

Canada, runner-up for the title five times and third once, was rated the toughest challenger. Mexico has finished second once and third five times.

Today's No. 1 match pits two former U.S. amateur champions, 1960 winner Deane Beman and 1949 and 1958 victor Charlie Coe, against Nick Westlock and Bert Tiechurst of Canada and Jose Luis Ortega and Thomas Lehman of Mexico.

Good Hunting for Doves In Rogue River Valley

Salem — (UPI) — State game director Phil Schneider Wednesday reminded hunters to use the utmost caution with fire during the hunting seasons now underway.

He added that failure to comply with fire safety rules could result in the closure of the upland game bird and big game hunting seasons.

The game director said the cool and damp summer has influenced the growth of grasses and shrubs, and with the drying autumn this rank growth could create a fire hazard in many parts of the state.

Portland — The biggest auto racing event of the 1963 season on the Pacific Coast, will be held Sunday afternoon, Sept. 8, at the Portland speedway when the 10th annual Pacific Coast championships for super modified sportsmen will be held.

More than 40 fast cars of the west, Rocky mountains and western Canada, will battle for 32 starting positions in the 200-lap championship event.

The marathon "200" will see the winning drivers receiving \$1,000 — guaranteed while the other top positions will be handsomely rewarded.

An additional \$100 will be given to the driver who can best the fast time held by two-time Northwest champion Art Pollard, Medford, at 22:50 seconds or 102.87 miles per hour for one lap.
