**Bombing Provides Another Blight on Record of Negroes**

Non-violence disappeared again through shattered window glass in Birmingham, Ala., Wednesday night.

A brief riot that broke out following the second bombing in two weeks of Negro attorney Arthur Shores' home provided one more blight on the record of Negro leaders who have tried to keep their integration movement peaceful.

The new Birmingham flareup wiped out, in part at least, the racial struggle created by the peaceful march on Washington Aug. 28.

The night of terror came at the end of a day of tension. Two young Negroes had been safely admitted to one public school. Rumors were running through the town that segregationists would be out in strength today at two other schools being desegregated.

South of 19th St., in an area populated mostly by Negroes who make up one-third of Birmingham's residents, lights went out early in many homes and the people settled down for what they hoped would be a quiet night.

**Blast Shatters Quiet**

At 9:40 p.m., the silence of a city going to bed was ripped apart by a single blast that could be heard for 20 blocks. Before Mrs. Shores, who was knocked out of bed by the blast, could regain her composure, Negroes were running wild in the streets nearby.

Before the ensuing riot could be contained, one man was dead and 19 persons injured.

One day lost May, this reporter walked beside Dr. Martin

Luther King Jr. during another time of racial demonstrations in Birmingham. King, head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference which was pushing desegregation in the city, was en route to a church rally.

As he walked from the Gaston Motel, which also has been bombed recently to the church, King passed by a crowd of about 300 Negroes lining the streets.

The Negro leader said almost sadly, "There are the people we fear the most. They do not have the spirit of non-violence." Face Serious Problem

Authorities in Birmingham are faced with a law-and-order problem that has the tentacles of an octopus. When one phase is licked, another reached out.

The city's Negro population, restless and growing more militant with desegregation pressures, includes elements ranging from the faithful flocks of the many churches to trigger-happy ruffians.

The same element is in the white community. They clash easily and quickly.

Guns are easy to procure in Birmingham and they are all over the place. Casings of 22-caliber bullets—not used by police—were found near the scene of Wednesday night's rioting.

Cab drivers tell of runs on gun shops in recent weeks. Sporting guns can be bought without a license. Loaded guns often are taken from cars stopped by police.

Despite their difficulty coping with both white and Negro violence, Birmingham police are trying to do their job without state help. To do it, officers often are required to work around the clock.

One simple but dramatic exchange on a police radio Wednesday night illustrates the spirit in the police department.

"Do you want state help?" a control point operator asked an officer on the front lines of rioting.

"Negative," the officer replied.

**WORLD'S LONGEST LINE**

**Decision May Bring Hospital Cost Hike**

Portland (UPI)—Rates charged hospital patients in Oregon will go up as a result of an Oregon Supreme Court decision Thursday. James G. Swindells, executive secretary of the Oregon Association of Hospitals, said upon hearing the ruling.

The court overruled the Multnomah County Circuit Court and ordered a judgment against Portland Sanitarium. It upset a long-standing precedent that charitable associations were immune from damage judgments.

Swindells said the increase would not come immediately. He added the amount of the jump will depend on experience, the availability of group insurance and whether the liability extends to visitors as well as patients.

He said some projections are for an increase of \$1 per day, but this was based only on conjecture. The cost would come from defending damage cases, not so much as the result of jury awards, Swindells explained.

**Jobless Training Nearing Approval**

Washington (UPI)—A Senate-passed bill to continue the federal retraining program for jobless workers appears likely to win House approval.

The measure would eliminate a requirement that participating states foot half the cost starting next July 1.

Under terms of the legislation, the federal government would continue paying the entire cost during the third year of the program. Most states have been reluctant to appropriate money for the project.

The administration asked for the legislation and the Senate passed it Wednesday by voice vote. An attempt by Sen. Winston L. Prouty (R-Vt.) to send the bill back to the labor committee was defeated 44-19.
