

# Yankees Use Big Inning To Halt Tigers, 11-6

The pennant-bound New York Yankees staged their biggest inning of the season Saturday when they scored eight runs in the fifth frame — four of them driven in by Roger Maris — to beat the Detroit Tigers, 11-6.

The Yankees, who notched their fourth straight victory, were trailing, 6-3, at the time of the explosion, thanks to a five-run rally by the Tigers in the fourth inning.

But after Mickey Mantle singled to open the New York fifth to knock out Tiger starter Don Mossi, Maris greeted reliever and loser Mickey Lolich with his 21st homer of the year. Later Maris stroked a two-run single to conclude the scoring in the inning, in which 12 Yankees went to bat.

Hal Reniff, who relieved in the sixth inning and shut out Detroit the fourth of the way, was accredited with his fourth victory.

# Jalopies Will Run At Speedway Today

An afternoon of hot and heavy auto racing is predicted for today at the Medford Speedway as the Jalopies return to the oval after a three-week layoff.

Today's Jalopy Derby will be highlighted by a special event, being tried for the first time in the Rogue Valley. After conclusion of the 25 lap main event, there will be a destruction derby. This endurance race for stock cars will determine only which driver can keep his machine going around the track the longest. Every driving tactic will be legal except head-on crashes and deliberate crashing into the driver's door on the autos.

Primary purpose of the scramble will be to see who can outlast all others in the free-for-all. Winner will garner a \$50 purse.

Track officials expect some 15 stockers to turn out for this race. Medford skippers in competition will include Glenn Cave, Gary Skaggs, and Fuzzy Fitzsimmons. From Central Point will come Joe Foss and Ben Neel. Chuck Hazen will race from Jacksonville and Charles Davis will be among the Ashland entries. Additional cars are expected to register at the track this afternoon.

Competition also is expected to be keen in today's regular jalopy slate. With only one more race scheduled for the season, the leaders in the drivers' point standings will be going all out to add to their totals.

Jim Walker, Talent, still leads drivers with 235 points. Walker bolstered his lead at the last race by winning both his heat and the main event, good for a total of 50 points. The Talent driver has headed totals since July 21.

Eagle Point's Harvey Nelson holds second with 183 counters. Nelson advanced from fifth to runner-up with 42 points in the last main event.

Close behind Nelson is Ashland fireman Charles Davis with 180. Pat Tyler, Medford, is fourth with 171. Behind Tyler are Sam Dykes, Medford, 162; John Jones, Ashland, 147; and Dave McCullom, Medford, 141.

Rounding out the top ten are Bill Chase, Central Point, 133; John Bush, Eagle Point, 123; and Floyd McClanahan, Phoenix, 100.

Another special event of this afternoon's program will be a Powderpuff race for women drivers.

Gates open at noon and time trials are slated to begin no later than 1 p. m. with the first race at 2 p. m.

Medford Speedway is located seven miles north of Medford off the Crater Lake highway in east White City. Race goers are instructed to turn right at Cascade Shopping center and follow the signs.

# Froehling In Tennis Finals

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (UPI)—Lanky Frank Froehling of Coral Gables, Fla., a flop in every other major tournament this year, rocketed into the finals of the U. S. tennis championships Saturday by routing Ron Barnes of Brazil and became the last American survivor when Mexico's Rafael Osuna trounced Wimbledon champ Chuck McKinley of San Antonio, Tex., in straight sets.

The 21-year-old six-foot three-inch Froehling played his way out of the doghouse erected by U. S. Davis Cup selectors with a 6-3, 6-4, 6-4, victory over the stylish Brazilian.

Today, with a chance to become the first American champion since Tony Trabert in 1955, Froehling will meet the panther-like Osuna who flattened top-seeded McKinley with a service break in the last game of each set, 6-4, 6-4, 10-8.

YAKIMA (UPI)—The Yakima Bears captured the Northwest league championship Friday night with a 5-1 victory over Lewiston.

Yakima, last a pennant winner in 1960, took the best three-of-five game series, 3-1, after losing the opener in Lewiston.

Ronn Herr spaced eight Bronco hits for the victory, before the largest crowd of the season here — 2,674.

Yakima, which won the second-half title in the Northwest loop, presented Manager Buddy Hicks with his second championship in his four years at the Bear helm.

Lewiston last won the title in 1961, when the Broncos defeated Yakima in a playoff.

Nicklaus, who outdrove his rival on every hole, at times by as much as 50 yards, missed his second putt from less than four feet on the 18th green of the Firestone Country Club course to drop into a tie with Charles. Their par 70's gave them a one-stroke lead over ailing Arnold Palmer and two strokes over U. S. open champion Julius Boros.

# Giants Whip Dodgers; Lead Is Cut Down to 4 1/2 Games

The San Francisco Giants blasted Don Drysdale for three home runs Saturday while handing the Los Angeles Dodgers a 5-3 defeat that cut their National league lead over St. Louis to 4 1/2 games.

Juan Marichal, who never has lost to the Dodgers in Candlestick park, rode to his 21st win on homers by Willie Mays, Orlando Cepeda and Willie McCovey.

The high-kicking righthander also struck out eight for a season total of 205 and became the first Giant to pass the double century mark since Sam Jones fanned 209 in 1959.

Mays gave the Giants a two-run lead with his 34th homer in the first inning, bringing across McCovey who had singled.

Cepeda then powered his 27th over the right field barrier in the fourth and McCovey followed in the sixth with his 37th.

Don Drysdale, now 17-16, gave way in the seventh inning to pinchhitter Frank Howard, who grounded out with two on and two out. John Roseboro's eighth homer accounted for one of the Los Angeles runs.

In the National league's only other afternoon game, the St. Louis Cardinals edged the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-5, when Curt Flood singled home pinch-runner Bob Gibson in the ninth inning.

Gibson ran for Stan Musial, who opened the ninth by drawing a walk as a pinchhitter against Harvey Haddix. Roy Face was called in and Gibson went to second when first baseman Don Clendenon dropped an attempted pickoff throw.

Flood followed with his game-winning single and Lew Burdette protected the lead in the last of the ninth. Barney Schultz was the winning pitcher.

In night games, New York was at Cincinnati, Milwaukee at Philadelphia and Chicago at Houston.

# Thornton Decisions Jose Menno

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Light heavyweight challenger Wayne Thornton knocked down Jose Menno twice in the second round, then withstood a furious closing rally by the Argentinian to win a unanimous 10-round decision in a nationally televised fight Saturday night.

Thornton, the 8-5 favorite, opened a cut around Menno's eye with a straight right at the start of the second round. Then he knocked him to one knee with another right to the head. Menno was up immediately but had to take a mandatory eight count under the California rules.

A moment later Menno hit the canvas again after Thornton chopped a short left hook to his head.
