Fillings for Lunchbox Sandwiches Are Listed

NEW YORK (UPI) — If the children complain that they're tired of the same old sandwich fillings in their lunchboxes, try these new ideas from the American Institute of Baking, Chicago.

—Two butters are better than one on enriched white or whole wheat bread. Mix equal parts of peanut and apple butters. Thin with a little lemon juice.
—In a food chopper, grind together equal amounts of provolone cheese and salami. Use dairy sour cream as a binder. Spread between slices of white or whole wheat bread.
—Double the protein in a hot dog sandwich by serving sliced, cooked frankfurters on whole wheat bread with egg spread. To make the spread, mash the yolks and chop finely the whites of four hard-cooked eggs. Blend yolks and whites with one-third cup of softened butter. Add Worcestershire sauce and ground nutmeg to taste. Makes enough for six sandwiches.

—Chop together leftover cooked ham and process Swiss cheese. Add chopped green pepper for crisp texture and color. Thin to spreading consistency with mayonnaise or salad dressing. Spread on white bread.
—Chicken, Almonds
—Chopped cooked chicken tastes good mixed with coarsely chopped almonds, a little minced onion and salt. Bind with dairy sour cream. Serve on white or whole wheat bread.

—For crisp, tangy flavor, add celery and sweet pickles to deviled ham. You'll need one-third cup of chopped celery and two tablespoons of chopped sweet pickles for one (4 1/2 ounce) can of deviled ham. Add one and a half tablespoons of chili sauce and blend well. Yield one cup, for five sandwiches.
—Ham and bean filling combines one-half cup of drained, canned kidney beans with one (2 1/4 ounce) can of deviled ham, one tablespoon of chopped green pepper and one and a half tablespoons of mayonnaise. Yields

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three-fourths cup, for four sandwiches.

—Hawaiian-flavored filling combines one-fourth cup of chopped, cooked chicken with one-fourth cup of drained crushed pineapple, one (2 1/2 ounce) can of deviled ham and one tablespoon of mayonnaise or salad dressing. Yields one cup, for five sandwiches.
—This filling has built-in slaw. Combine one (4 1/2 ounce) can or one-half cup of deviled ham with one cup of finely chopped cabbage and one-fourth cup each of chopped drained dill pickle and mayonnaise or salad dressing. Yields one and a third cups, for seven sandwiches.
