

Musial, Koufax Shine As Cards, Dodgers Post Wins in National

The Cardinals keep coming and the Dodgers keep going on the rather risky theory that lightning can't possibly strike the same race twice.

Don't bet on it!

First of all this isn't quite the same race the Dodgers lost last year although the growing similarity certainly hasn't escaped their attention.

The Cardinals, who made it 13 out of their last 14 with a workmanlike 6-0 win over the Cubs Tuesday night, keep applying the pressure but this time the Dodgers aren't buckling.

They also won Tuesday night, beating the Pirates, 4-2, on a record performance by Sandy Koufax, and their three-game lead looks far more comforting than the 1 1/2 game margin they held a year ago today.

Grandpa Stan Musial and pitcher Bob Gibson were the Cardinal pace-makers, driving in three runs apiece while Gibson also hurled a six-hitter for his 17th triumph.

Plays Four Innings

The 42-year-old Musial, who became a grandfather for the first time earlier in the day, played only four innings but drove in two runs with a first-inning homer off loser Glen Hobbie and another with a single in the second.

Musial's homer was his 11th of the season and 474th of his career while Gibson's three-run homer in the second inning was his third of the year.

Shortstop Dick Groat returned to the St. Louis lineup after missing five games and contributed a single and a double to up his National League leading average to .330.

Koufax erased his own NL strikeout record in fanning nine Pittsburgh batters en route to his 23rd victory in 28 decisions.

The classy Dodger southpaw, who set the old mark of 269 strikeouts in 1961, now has 276, and his 23 wins in one season also constitutes an all-time record for all Dodger left-handers.

Nap Rucker and Preacher Roe shared the previous mark of 22 victories in a single season.

Koufax allowed six hits, including Roberto Clemente's 10th homer in the eighth inning, but by that time the Dodgers already scored all four of their runs off loser Don Cardwell.

They went ahead on three singles in the first inning, picked up another in the sixth on an error by third baseman Bob Bailey and Wally Moon clinched the outcome with a two-run homer in the seventh.

Cincinnati shaded Milwaukee, 4-3, New York beat San Francisco, 4-2, and Philadelphia defeated Houston, 6-0, in other NL contests.

The Dodgers maintained their precarious three-game margin over the Redbirds Tuesday in downing the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-2. But an envious glance at the 13-game lead held by their counterparts in the other circuit, the Yankees, is enough to keep the Dodgers restless nights.

Don Drysdale, 17-16, due to reinjoin the club following treatment for a bad case of shingles in Los Angeles, got the nod for tonight's game with the Bucs as the Dodgers timidly began preparations for the World Series.

Southpaw Bob Veal, 2-1, who shut out the hard-hitting Cards last week, was set to go for Pittsburgh.

The Dodger management began printing World Series tickets as one of the pennant contenders authorized by Commissioner Ford C. Frick to do so.

Asked fans to not ask for the tickets, which would not be put on public sale until, or unless, the pennant is clinched.

Stuart, Killebrew, Allison Engage in Home Run Battle

The race for the American League's home run hitting crown could wind up in a three-man photo finish.

Dick Stuart of the Boston Red Sox and those Twin terrors from Minnesota, Harmon Killebrew and Bob Allison, are taking turns battling for the lead down the homestretch.

Stuart broke out of his first-place tie with Killebrew when he hit No. 38 Tuesday night off Bo Belinsky, who marked his return to the majors by blowing a four-run lead to the Red Sox. But the Los Angeles Angels went on to score a 6-5 victory in 10 innings.

Allison, meanwhile, socked a pair of homers in Minnesota's 5-4 triumph over the Cleveland Indians to raise his season total to 35. He's the fellow Stuart may have to keep his eyes on in the stretch rather than Killebrew, who has drawn blanks in the Twins' last five games.

Rally In Ninth

Belinsky, back with the Angels after a two-month hitch in Honolulu, was coasting along with a 5-1 lead when the Red Sox chased him during a four-run rally in the ninth inning that tied the score.

The Angels, though, bounced back to win the 10th against Boston relief ace Dick Radatz on clutch singles by Billy Moran and Lee Thomas.

Both of Allison's blasts against the Indians came with a man aboard and helped the Twins wipe out a 4-0 deficit. His first of the game came during a

three-run rally in the fourth inning and he put Minnesota ahead to stay with No. 35 in the next frame.

Gerry Arrigo, a recently recalled farmhand, pitched the final five innings to pick up his first major league victory for the Twins, who moved into second place ahead of the Chicago White Sox.

Defender Wins Again In Golf Am

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Labron Harris Jr., a scholarly slugger from Oklahoma, goes out for two swift rounds today which will help decide whether he is to join such U.S. Amateur immortals as Bobby Jones, Lawson Little and Harvie Ward.

They were back-to-back winners in this 68-year-old fairway classic and the long-driving Harris must survive two rounds today in order to keep alive his hopes for his second straight title.

No golfer has been able to win two in a row since Ward accomplished the feat in 1955 and 1956. The last man before that was Little in 1934 and 1935. Jones did it twice — 1924-25 and then again in 1927-28.

Two Rounds

The field, which included 200 hopefuls when they first teed it up Monday morning, will be narrowed to 16 by nightfall after today's two rounds over the long, narrow Wakonda Club course.

Harris' first opponent today was Walter Stahl of Cleveland. While Harris, "driving better than I have at any time," was beating 19-year-old John McKey of Orlando, Fla., 6 and 5, in the second round Tuesday, Stahl turned back Dr. Sam Valuk of Denver, Colo., 2 and 1.

Harris' path to the title did not look an easy one. Because among the 62 survivors going into the third round today were two-time champion Charley Coe; Deane Beman, the 1960 winner; Billy Joe Patton and the veteran Bill Campbell.

SAN MATEO, Calif. (UPI) — Hard-throwing Sammy Ellis of San Diego and outfielder Chico Salmon of Denver are the statistical champions of the Pacific Coast league, according to final official statistics.

Ellis led hurlers with 158 or more innings with a 2.62 earned run average.

Dave Giusti of Oklahoma City was second at 272 and Howie Reed of Spokane third with 2.83. Reed's 19-7 record made him the league ace, although Ray Rippelmeyer of San Diego (11-2) also pitched well.

Seattle's Bill Spanswick fanned 209 batters and Ellis walked 101 for league highs. Ron Herbel of Spokane lost 18 games, high in the PCL.

Statistician William J. Weiss reports that Salmon hit .325 to edge Jesus Alou of Tacoma at .323. Billy Cowan of Salt Lake batted .315 to finish third.

Bob Will of Salt Lake slugged .370, but his 370 at bats were far short of the required 400.
