Central Point Teenagers Win Prize from CowBelles

SALEM — Teenagers Darlene Thompson and Shirley Roach, 4-H members from Central Point, won 38 from the Oregon CowBelles at the Oregon State Fair last week for their demonstration featuring beef. They prepared an Italian beef noodle casserole rich in spices, cheese and ground beef.

Their casserole is handy for an emergency meal if made ahead and stored in the freezer. It serves 8.

Italian Noodle Casserole

For the casserole use 1/2 cup onions, 1/4 cup celery and 1/4 cup green pepper, chopping all three; 2 tbsp. butter; 1 lb. ground beef; 1 1/2 tsp. salt; 1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce; 3 cups uncooked noodles; 3 cups tomato juice; 1/2 tsp. oregano; 1/2 tsp. sweet basil; 1 1/2 cups cot-

tage cheese and 1/2 pint sour cream.

Saute onion, celery, and green pepper in butter until tender. Add meat, brown slightly. Stir in salt, Worcestershire sauce, noodles, herbs, tomato juice and bring to a boil; simmer gently about 30 minutes or until noodles are tender and mixture has thickened.

Pour into casserole. Mix cottage cheese and sour cream together and spread over top of noodle mixture. Sprinkle with paprika and place under broiler for about four minutes. Serves 8.

Spiced Pears Timely Dish For Fall Meals

Fall dining can be perked up with Super Spiced Pears and with the pear season still in swing in the valley this is the ideal time to make use of local produce.

These spiced pears may be served warm or chilled, with the meat course, and in particular will complement veal, pork or ham. If desired, use some of the sauce mixture to glaze ham or pork roast during the last 30 minutes of baking time.

This recipe will make six to eight servings.

Super Spiced Pears

Four fresh pears; one can (6 oz.) frozen lemonade concentrate; three-fourth cup brown sugar; packed; one tablespoon prepared mustard; dash ground cloves.

Pare, halve and core pears; cut lengthwise into slices one-half inch thick. In a heavy saucepan or skillet, combine lemonade concentrate, brown sugar, mustard and cloves, boil slowly four to five minutes to form medium-thick syrup. Add pears; bring mixture to boil again. Reduce heat; cover and cook gently about five minutes until pears are fork-tender.

Vary Cole Slaw

Spring cole slaw is a fruit and vegetable melange. Combine 2 cups of shredded cabbage with 1 cup each of diced unpeeled apples and shredded fresh carrots, 1 sliced small onion, and 2 tablespoons each of mayonnaise and dairy sour cream. Sprinkle with 1/2 teaspoon of salt and 1/4 teaspoon of ground black pepper. Toss lightly. Garnish with unpeeled apple wedges and fresh parsley. Serves 6 to 8.
