Medford's Tornadoes Trim Corvallis In Grid Starter

Medford High school's Black Tornado — the football version of 1963 — started out Friday night where the 1962 Class A-1 state championship whirlwinders left off — with triumph in the opener of the brand new season.

With surges of crunching power and flashes of speed and explosive offense, the Tornadoes of the Southern Oregon conference trimmed the Corvallis Spartans of the Valley league. The score was 21 to 0.

Featuring the power-running of 215-pound fullback Bill Enyart, the Tornadoes rumbled to the goal on two long drives — one marked by an exchange of fumbles — and turned one good break into a touchdown.

The Black Tornado crossed the pay line once each in the first, third and fourth quarters with Enyart going two yards, Lance Casebeer nine yards and Mike Barnes 15 yards for the counters. Rich Knight made good on all three conversion kicks.

Corvallis Reaches Seven — A determined, unawed Corvallis club made its biggest bid in the second half when Medford did not score. The Spartans reached the Tornado seven yard line with fourth down and one to go for first down. There Steve Toews broke through and spilled Dick Gerding for a two-yard loss and Medford took possession.

Medford dominated the overall offensive with 290 net scrimmage yards and 16 first downs while Corvallis netted 166 and 10. Enyart headed home team rushing with 106 yards on 15 times with the ball.

Tornado head menter Fred Spiegelberg had three "thinks" in looking back on Friday night: "I think the kids did a really good job."

"I think we were awfully ragged."

"I think we'll get better."

First Opportunity — The host aggregation pronounced to a touchdown on the first opportunity that was presented. It went 78 yards to the goal. Forcing Corvallis to punt on its fifth play from scrimmage, the Tornado took over on its own 22-yard line. In 10 plays Medford had a score.

Mike Barnes, Enyart and Tim Murray did the backing. Barnes,

looming as a fine running quarterback, went around end for 20 and 18-yard gains. Enyart toted four times for a total of 24 yards and Murray got eight in two times with the ball. An eight-yard pass play, Barnes to Walt Verstrate got eight yards along the way.

Four first downs were chalked up on the march. It looked like the long drive might go for naught when the ball got away from Murray on the two. But, the ball was ruled dead before he lost it. Enyart crossed the goal on the next play.

Medford took over on its own 27 after the second half kickoff but two plays later was back on its own 21. A Barnes pass to Greg Gandee for 14 yards and an offside penalty on Corvallis got the Tornado out of trouble with the ball on the 43.

Yard Gained on Exchange — Two packs by Enyart and one by Murray gained to the Spart 41. Enyart spurred to the 26. The ball got away from Murray after a six yard run to the 20. But, on the next play, Gerding, tackled by Toews, fumbled. Medford picked up a yard on the play, for Jeff Hartrath fell on the ball on the 19.

Enyart carried to the nine and on the next play Casebeer slanted right and romped into the end zone.

In the early fourth canto Medford's Terry Winetrot hit the arm of the Spartan's Rick Olson as he was trying to pass. The ball bounced to the ground on the ruled fumble. Tom Wooton grabbed the ball for the Tornado on the Corvallis 15 stripe. On the next play Barnes circled right end behind a solid diagonal wall of blockers and went into TD land.

Medford bid in the final minutes going from its 40 to the Spartan seven in nine plays. But the final stab a 14-yard Knight to Jim Cox pass was short of a first down.

Almost Gets Away — Corvallis' Gary Marks almost got away on a punt run back in the early moments of the second quarter. He was barely nipped by Barnes on the Medford 45 after a 32-yard runback. A face mask infraction was called on Medford on the play and the ball was placed on the Tornado 30.

Gerding carried for four yards and a Bill Robertson to Scott McAllister pass gave Corvallis 11 set down on the 16. Dick Waterpugh picked up three yards in two plays and Gerding went six more to the seven only to be stopped behind the line by Toews to end the TD bid. Corvallis moved from its own

34 to the Medford 36 in the first quarter with the aid of a Robertson to Waterpugh pass for 22 yards. But a pass interception by Ron Edmonds gave Medford the ball on its 22. Corvallis passing, which picked up 90 yards gave Medford problems, as did a stunting four-four-three Spartan defense. "Our kids never knew where they were," said Spiegelberg. Yet, the Corvallis defensive strategy, aimed at stopping Medford power, was a gambling one and sometimes left gaps which were to Tornado advantage. And the Hurricane did not 249 yards from rushing.

Spiegelberg particularly noted the line play of tackle Bradrahn and center and guard Brian Petersen both ways. Enyart looked his old self when linebacking and Greg Dipel filled those duties well when linebacking. Dick Botlger was in on a good share of tackles and Casebeer made some key stops.

Waterpugh was a defensive demon for Corvallis with 12 stops and L. J. Fagan had nine. Those two were supported defensively by Mark Gustafson and Jim Pittman.

Gustafson topped Spartan rushing with 42 yards on seven carries. Robertson completed seven of 11 passes for 59 yards. For Medford Barnes netted 48 yards on seven times with the ball. He completed four of eight passes for 27 yards, despite taking a loss of eight on one.

Spiegelberg, in noting the raggedness that is almost inevitable with first games, pointed to lots of mistakes, to missed assignments and infractions that brought penalties. He saw the chore of getting more continuity in the Tornado offense.

But, fans saw plenty of good play to offset efforts and bring a winning effort against a team which could prove tough in its own circuit.

Gold Beach had a 242 to 141 net scrimmage yardage margin. The teams were closer in the first half with GB gaining an edge of 112 to 80.

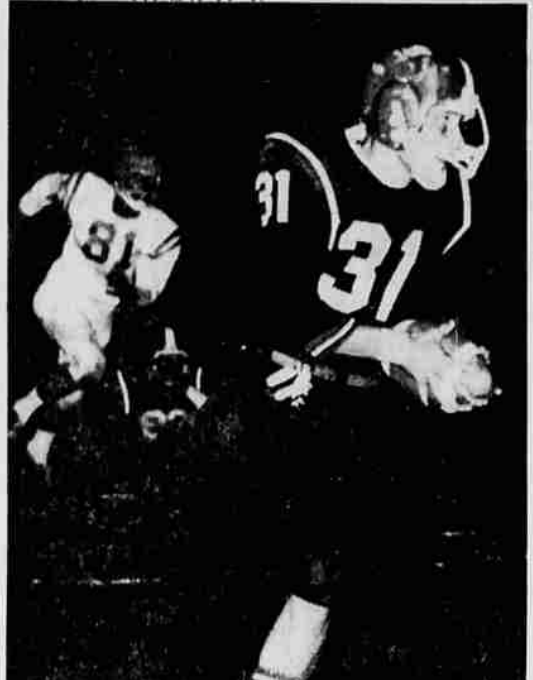
"I think we're going to come back and surprise people," said Bill Stewart, Coach of the IV team, yesterday.

Miss Bardahl Loses First Round Heat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Miss Exide defeated favored Miss Bardahl Saturday in the first round of elimination heats for unlimited hydroplanes in the two-day President's Cup Regatta on the Potomac river.

Driven by Bill Bowd of Seattle, Wash., Miss Exide led from the starting line of the 15-mile heat and widened the gap to 175 yards at the close of five laps. Bow, sitting in for regular driver Mior Slovak, pushed the Seattle hydroplane to 110.883 mph on the first lap. He turned in an average 106.695 mph over an elapsed time of 8.16.8 under gray skies on the chilly three-mile course.

An estimated 32,000 persons watched the event as Miss Exide, second behind Miss Bardahl in the season point race for unlimited boats, picked up 400 points to Miss Bardahl's 300 for second.

The two boats now stand at 1,875 to 1,577 in overall point standings for the year. Sharing the lead with Miss Exide, going into today's second elimination round and finals was Gale V, winner of the opening heat.

San Jose Schedule Toughest

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UPI) — The toughest schedule in history confronts San Jose State this year, but coach Bob Titchenal figures he has just the boys to make it a successful campaign. Last season the Spartans hit the depths with a 2-8 record. This time around there is more optimism.

"I think we've got the boys to play any team on an even basis," says Titchenal. "We have more potential."

For a team that has been flirting with big time football for 15 years, the Spartans have a rough road ahead. They meet Stanford, Kansas State, Utah State, Washington State and California during the first half of the slate.

Then they finish off with Idaho, Oregon, Arizona State, Fresno State and University of Pacific. There are only three games at home, all Saturday night affairs, against Kansas State, Arizona State and Pacific. The major strength will be in the backfield. Here Titchenal has Rand Carter back as the No. 1 signal caller. But a young sophomore, name of Ken Berry, may press him. Berry, brother of Oregon's signal-caller, Bob Berry, not only can pass, but he can run.

The Spartans are high, too, on a 220-pound fullback named Charley Harraway. Charley runs the 100 in 10 seconds flat and if he can't go around you, he'll just run over.

The right halfbacks will be Walt Roberts and Jerry Colletto. Dave Johnson, an outstanding end last season. Green Front Wall — There is a lack of experience in the front line. But Titchenal is counting on Larry Hansen, who played tackle last season and has shifted to guard this year, to anchor the forward wall. There are a half dozen big tackles, averaging around 240 pounds to the man. But they lack experience.

The ends are headed by Bill Holland and Ron DeMonter. But they lack much experience, although they are among the 18 freshmen who saw action last year.

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Yanks Cinch Flag; Bouton Wins 20th

Not even the grandest of all Yankees is feeling as high as Jim Bouton — and it's not all the result of champagne. Winning the American League pennant is a matter of habit for most of the veteran New York-

ers, but there's nothing routine about a 24-year-old pitcher clinching the flag and gaining his 20th victory of the season in the same night's work. This is what Bouton accomplished Friday night with a masterful 2-0 decision over the Minnesota Twins that boosted his record to 20-4 and gave the Yankees their fourth straight pennant, their 13th in 15 years, and the 28th in their colorful history. It was the earliest American league clinching since the 1941 Yankees put the flag away on Sept. 4.

Bouton, who posted a 7-7 record as a rookie last year, relied mainly on a "hopping fast ball" to strike out 11 Minnesota batters. He was mobbed by his teammates after retiring the last batter in the ninth inning and was bathed with pink champagne in the clubhouse.

Bouton gave up six hits and was in trouble only in the eighth inning when the first two Twins reached base and the bases became loaded with two out. But after falling behind 3-1 on Harmon Killebrew, Bouton induced the Minnesota slugger to ground out to Tony Kubek.

Pascual, who went eight innings before going out for a pinch hitter, was tagged with his ninth loss against 18 victories.

Floyd Leads Links Open

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI) — Rookie Raymond Floyd of Fayetteville, N. C., a 21-year-old freshman on the professional golf circuit, surged into the third-round lead of the \$35,000 Greater Seattle Open Golf tournament Saturday with a six-under-par 66.

Floyd, who has won only one tournament since he started on the tour last December, fired five birdies and an eagle against a single bogey to back up his 66 and a three-round total of 201. 15-under-par on the 6,667-yard Inglewood Country Club course.

Pressing Floyd was consistent Bobby Nichols, a 27-year-old stylist from Corona, Calif. Nichols, helped by a chipped-in eagle on the final hole, scored a four-under-par 68 for a total of 202.

Dow Finsterwald, sixth leading money winner on the tour this year and one of the steadiest golfers on the tour, worked himself into a position to challenge for the \$5,300 first-place prize money with a fine 66 for a total of 204. Finsterwald birdied the final three holes on the course to put himself in a spot to challenge for the title in today's final round.
