

Beman Takes Second U.S. Amateur Golf Championship

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Battling Deane Beman won his second U. S. amateur golf championship Saturday with a 2 and 1 comeback surge which smacked the divot dreams of Dick Sikes, a threadbare 23-year-old from the hills of the Ozarks.

Beman, the silver-spoon former U. S. and British amateur champion, hammered back from a 3 down deficit, saw a 2 up lead vanish on the third nine of their 36-hole match but then fought back to become the 15th man to win the amateur at least twice in its 63-year history.

The chubby, ruddy-faced Beman salted it away when he birdied the 32nd hole with an 18-foot putt to go 2 up and then matched the slender Sikes par for par over the three holes he needed to close it out.

It was a comeback which held the pantherish Sikes, one of a family of nine, away from a goal which he set as result of a 300-mile bus ride in 1962. He had gone to visit a sister in Wichita from his home in Springdale, Ark., and an observer who saw him playing on a public course suggested he try to qualify for the national public links championship.

Sikes did, won it, went on to take the NCAA championship after winning a scholarship to the University of Arkansas and would have been the first man ever to capture all three of these titles.

But it wasn't to be, as Beman called on the poise and polish of a long international career and in the final analysis out-stayed his younger rival.

Beman, in coming back to take his second U. S. crown, in order beat Maryland amateur

champion Dick Latimer, Charles Polk of Clayton, Mo.; Walker copper Charley Kocis, Jim Gabrielsen of Athens, Ga.; Barry Merdink of Muscatine, Ia.; Walt Stahel of Cleveland, who had ousted defending champion Labron Harris, Jr.; northern California open champion George Archer and finally —

Roger Staubach Navies Make or Break Player In East Football Wars

NEW YORK (UPI)—Navy's football team is flying a "Jolly Roger" this fall like the seafaring pirates of old.

Instead of a skull-and-crossbones flag, this is a real flesh and blood Jolly Roger—quarterback Roger Staubach. He's Navy's make or break man in a bid for eastern football honors against a challenge from loaded Syracuse and Pittsburgh.

Penn State, two-time winner of the Lambert Trophy as champs of the East, is down for a rebuilding year but rates an edge over Army, Boston College, Holy Cross, Villanova and the other eastern independents in the second flight behind the big three.

In the Ivy league, Indiana Blackman's Dartmouth Indians figured to survive the loss of quarterback Bill King and center Don McKinnon to repeat as titleholders in a close finish with Harvard.

Delaware is favored as usual in the Middle Atlantic university division and it's Massachusetts or Connecticut over New Hampshire's defending champions in the Yankee Conference.

Staubach, a 6-foot, 2-inch junior from Cincinnati, rushed from No. 4 quarterback as a Navy sophomore last season to national prominence in the last half of the campaign.

Percentage Leads Nation

Roger hit seven touchdown passes, ran for seven touchdowns and led the nation in passing percentage with 68.4. He even completed a pass to himself during Navy's 34-14 rout of Army last December.

In addition to Staubach, Navy's returns 25 lettermen including fullback Pat Donnelly who led the team in rushing last year. Among the linemen are stickout tackle Jim Freeman and center Tom Lynch.

Crater Comet Footballers Defeat Lebanon High 7-0

CENTRAL POINT — Crater high's resolute Comet rose to the occasion to get off to a bright beginning Friday as their new gridiron season was inaugurated.

Lebanon's end Mike Grieve was a thorn in the Comet attack.

U.S. Netters Wrap Up Davis Cup Win

DENVER (UPI) — Dennis Ralston and Marty Riessen swept to a straight-sets doubles victory, 7-5, 8-6, 6-3, over Venezuela Saturday to clinch the Davis Cup American Zone finals for the United States.

Ralston, the fiery Bakersfield, Calif., star, and Riessen, son of Northwestern university's tennis coach, defeated Ivo Pimentel and Orlando Bracamonte in the decisive match of the best 3-out-of-5 competition.

Ralston had hammered Bracamonte and Riessen had put down Pimentel in Friday's opening singles matches.

Saturday's win insured that the final singles matches today on the Cherry Hills country club's concrete courts would be for fun only, and also that the tournament would see the debut of the first Negro to play in U. S. Davis Cup competition.

Pimentel, Venezuela's strong man, turned out to be weaker than Bracamonte Saturday. The 10-time Venezuelan National Champion's service was broken twice by the powerful Americans, both 21, once in the last game for match point. He double-faulted on his last service to give the U. S. the win.
