Dear Mr. Laurine:
My nylon carpeting is wearing out in the doorways and in front of my chairs and we have only had the carpet a short while. We have a guarantee that came with the carpet but after reading the guarantee we will still have to pay a great deal of money for a new carpet and what is there to assure us that this won't happen again?
Worried Betty

Dear Worried Betty:
Let's hope you have some remnants left over from your wall to wall carpet installation and we here at Laurine's can cut out those worn spots and make an almost invisible patch in your carpet. Betty, no one but no one can assure you that this won't happen again. When you buy a car do you ask how long it will last? Do you ask for a guarantee of 50 many years? Your car or carpet longevity depends solely on original quality and how well you take care of it! Now lets look at your carpet. Did you buy your carpet before you really could afford to put in a real good grade of carpet? Did you buy the best grade of foam pad? Did you buy from a dealer who is recognized in the carpet world as a carpet specialist? Did you know that you can take 1-oz. of Nylon yarn and by steaming it make it as large as a basketball. When you buy nylon or wool you only pay for the poundage of yarn per square yard and only a professional carpet man can actually tell the difference in yarn weight in a nylon or wool rug. Remember your carpet, pad and installation, regardless of who manufactures the carpet, is only as good as the retailer that sells it to you! Goodness gracious Betty please come in and see me!

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
