Book By Zoo Owner Reviewed

ASHLAND—"Realm of the Green Buddha," an exciting account of jungle life by Ludwig Koch-Iseburg, German author, poet and animal lover, was the book chosen by Miss Gertrude Engle for the first review of the fall when Ashland Study club members met Monday afternoon. Miss Engle and Mrs. F. S. Engle were hostesses.

The writer, who is an authority on animals and owns a private zoo, traveled to Thailand after having had his interest aroused by a tiny black gibbon which became a household pet. Adventures of the author and others in capturing zoo specimens included a thrilling experience with an orangutan released from its cage while being transported by air, and the care of a seahorse.

Thailand has never been a colonial colony nor has it known white conquerors, says Iseburg. He found its charm and cleanliness a sharp contrast to that of other Asiatic countries. Its palaces and pagodas give a sense of reverence and tranquility. The Buddhists practice a life of faith based upon love, tolerance and sympathy, while its people are practicing a form of democracy in humility and confidence.

The day's selected subject by Mrs. Marcus Woods was a half-hour of hilarious excerpts from a recently published small volume "Oh Ye Jigs and Juleps," written fifty years ago by a small girl and published posthumously by her daughter.

The little collection of essays by Virginia Carey Hudson was written by the ten-year-old Versailles, Ky., child on a variety of subjects and reflects the Puckish humor of a precocious, sometimes irrelevant imagination.

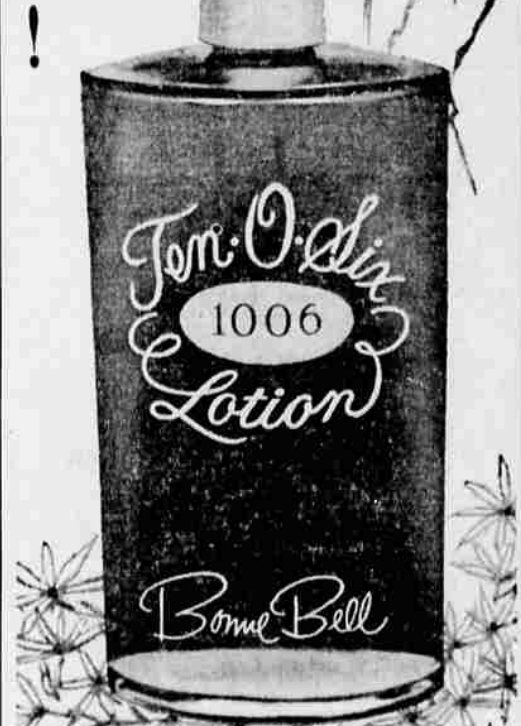
