Nothing which is true or beautiful or good makes complete sense in any immediate context of history, therefore we must be saved by faith."

### Berlin's New Hall To Open

Berlin's new Philharmonic Hall will open on October 15 with a gala performance of Beethoven's "Ninth Symphony" conducted by Herbert von Karajan. The inaugural will climax Berlin's annual Fall Festival weeks, September 29 to October 15.

The hall, irregular in shape and already nicknamed the "Circus Karajani" by Berliners, is located in the Tiergarten district, near Congress hall.

Panelled in light camballa wood, the auditorium holds 2,000. Seats are grouped around the stage in a series of small terraces, which resemble vineyards on a hill. About 25 per cent of the seats are behind the orchestra and most are above stage level. Acoustical and visual intimacy is achieved through this intimacy plan.

Several terraces have been reserved for the use of choirs and supplementary orchestral ensembles for works requiring special effects. Additional features include a 70 register organ, recording equipment and television and motion picture facilities.
