

Crater JV Victor Over Prospect

CENTRAL POINT — Crater high junior varsity, trailing 6 to 20 in the second quarter, solved the mysteries of eight-man football and rallied to beat Prospect varsity 32 to 26 here last night.

The teams had eight men on the field when Prospect had the ball and 11 men playing when the Comets were on offense.

Scores were 13 to 6 and 20 to 19 for Prospect at the half and quarter and 26 to 20 for the Comets of CP after three periods.

John Scott scored for the Cougars on passes from Andy Maurer for 65 and 15 yards. Maurer and Jerry Wilson tabulated on runs of 30 yards each. Maurer passed to Art Andressen for two conversions.

Gary Schwab touched twice for Crater on a pass for 25 yards from Bill Buckholtz and on a 20-yard run. Sig Milkowski and Darrell Kiger crossed the goal on five-yard runs and Greg Beman on a five-yard play. Kiger and Milkowski ran extra points.

Tackle Bill Colley was lost for the season by the Comets. He sustained a broken arm.

UCLA Bruins Kickoff College Football Slate on West Coast

The UCLA Bruins, long on ambition but possibly a bit short on experience, kick off the West Coast college football season tonight when they entertain University of Pittsburgh in Los Angeles.

It's the opener for what promises to be the biggest boom year in Western collegiate gridiron competition since the professionals first brought the big-time play-for-pay game to the coast.

With both the Los Angeles Rams and San Francisco Forty Niners apparently headed for off years, the major schools in the two areas expect to take up the slack — at least in attendance.

In the biggest contests Saturday, the defending National Champion Southern California Trojans get what they hope is a breather in the high altitude at Colorado; Iowa State invades California; Washington 150 goes to the state of Colorado to take on the Air Force; Washington State travels to Texas Tech; Oregon hosts Penn State in a Saturday night titan; Oregon State is at Utah and San Jose State at Stanford.

UO, OSU Picked
Oregon draws a tougher to launch the season in Penn State, one of the top teams in the east. The Webfoots are two-point favorites and have All-America halfback Mel Renfro going for them.

Oregon State is rated 13 points over Utah — even without the great Terry Baker, who finished school and now is with the Los Angeles Rams. The Beavers have Gordon Queen at quarter and have installed the flanker-back in their T-formation. They also have the country's leading pass-catcher, Vern Burke.

Coach John Ralston starts his new regime at Stanford and the Indians should waltz by San Jose — the odds-makers say by 17 points. There could be some confusion in the Redmen's backfield, however. Ralston has three quarterbacks playing at the same time — Clark Weaver calling the signals; and Dick Ragsdale and Steve Thurlow as the halfbacks.

Oregon Encounters Pennsylvania State

Powerful Penn State, the defending Eastern champion, and Oregon's ambitious Webfoots are expected to lure upwards of 30,000 fans into Multnomah Stadium Saturday night, while Oregon State and its new quarter-back, Gordon Queen (an asterisk) at Salt Lake City in 1963 college football openers.

The Oregon State-Utah contest also is at night.
Coach Len Casanova, starting his 13th season, will be seeking revenge for a 41-12 defeat Penn State handed Oregon in the 1960 Liberty Bowl game.

The 8 p. m. Portland contest will see the unveiling of perhaps the fastest backfield in Oregon history. Bob Berry, All-American Mel Renfro and Larry Hill are back from last year's starting quartet, while Lu Bain, the Vancouver, Wash., speedster has moved into the fullback slot.

Oregon has new starting linemen in every spot but Dick Inwall at end, but all except center Oliver McKinney are lettermen.

Guard Dave Wilcox, who hurt a shoulder Wednesday, is expected to be able to play.

Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers were to fly out of Corvallis this afternoon for their game against Utah.

Oregon State, without Terry Baker, is hoping Queen, a promising junior, will fill the key quarterback roll. Prothro has added a "floater" back to his offense this season, and All-American end candidate Vern Burke returns.

The defending Liberty Bowl champs are favored over the Utah team which lost 21 letter-

men, but the Redskins are tough at home.

One player for Utah will be a guy named Terry Baker — no relation to the Beaver immortal. This Baker is a sophomore from Ontario, Ore., who has been switched to end because of his 6-4 height. Baker will play behind Roy Jefferson, who caught 17 passes for Utah last season.

Patterson Wins With Overtrick

DELAWARE, Ohio (UPI) — Slick driver Johnny Patterson, with a flick of his whip toward his critics, left today with his fabulous Overtrick for Kentucky's famed red mile and more assaults on world pacing records.

Patterson drove Overtrick to pacing immortality Thursday in winning the Little Brown Jug stake in record time in one of the greatest races ever paced.

Overtrick's 1:57 1-5 first heat clocking was the fastest ever by a pacer for a mile on a half mile track. He came back with a 1:57 3-5 in the second and deciding heat.

The 1:57 1-5 shattered the record of 1:57 4-5 set by Bye Bye Byrd on New York's Roosevelt Raceway in 1959 and tied there by Adios Butler in 1961. The times in both heats shattered the jug record of 1:58 3-5 set by Muncie Hanover and Bullet Hanover in the 1960 Jug.

The victory was sweet revenge for Patterson who had been criticized after his favored Overtrick was upset by Meadow Skipper in last week's Rich Cane futurity.

Collegiate Grid Sport Opens War

College football opens its attendance "war" with the professionals this week end with an estimated 500,000 expected to witness 12 top collegiate contests.

Three games, including Pittsburgh at UCLA, Florida State at Miami, Fla., and Texas at Tulane, are on the card tonight.

The Florida State-Miami battle is expected to attract a near-capacity crowd of 65,000 in the Orange Bowl; 35,000 are anticipated for the UCLA-Pitt game and 30,000 at Tulane in the Sugar Bowl.

Capacity crowds are promised already Saturday at LSU where 67,500 will see the Tigers entertain Texas A&M; at West Virginia, where 35,000 will watch Navy play the Mountaineers; at Little Rock, where Arkansas and Oklahoma State clash before 41,000; and at Missouri, where Northwestern visits before an overflow of 48,500.

The Pitt Panthers boast one of their best all-around backfields, headed by All-America candidate Paul Marva, a halfback. The Bruins have had a year to get used to the T-formation since converting from the single wing and the contest is rated a toss up.

Makes Habit
Florida State makes a habit of upsetting the powers and will have to call on its habit to stop quarterback George Mira and Miami's Hurricanes, who are an eight point choice in the intrastate rivalry.

Texas topped Tulane 35-7 last fall and tonight's game should be a re-run.
Northwestern tackles Missouri at Columbia Saturday in one of the nation's top attractions. Tom Myers' passing and the Wildcats' experience give them a one touchdown edge.

Washington visits the Air Force Academy in the nationally televised game on CBS before 30,000.

Other top attractions Saturday find defending national champion Southern California at Colorado; Eastern champion Penn State meeting Oregon at Portland before a near-capacity crowd of 30,000 in a night game; Alabama at Georgia where another near sellout audience is expected for the Southeastern conference clash. Boston College at Syracuse before more than 35,000, and Clemson at Oklahoma.

Prothro Expects Another Winner

This is another in a series of dispatches dealing with the 1963 prospects of major West Coast college football teams.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—Talk about Oregon State's football prospects this autumn center more around a player who isn't here than on the 26 veterans who are.

That one, of course, is Terry Baker, the All-American quarterback and Heisman Trophy winner drafted No. 1 last winter by the Los Angeles Rams. Baker guided the Beavers to nine wins in 11 games last fall, including a 6-0 victory over Villanova in the Liberty Bowl.

Despite the loss of his team leader, coach Tommy Prothro expects to produce another winner this fall. His assets include the nation's top pass-catcher last year, 25 other lettermen and a plentiful crop of promising newcomers.

Gordon Queen, a junior, apparently has inherited Baker's job. Queen completed four touchdown passes last year in the few times he saw action and his throwing has been outstanding in practice sessions. Back of him are sophs Warren Woodworth and Marv Crowston.

Prothro's winged-T now has a flanker back instead of a wingback after a mid-winter overhaul. That job has been won by a sophomore, Tim Osmer of San Jose, Calif.

The Beavers are two deep in vets elsewhere in the backfield with Dan Espalin and LeRoy Whittle at left half and Booker T. Washington and Bruce Williams at fullback.

Top man at end is Vern Burke, who set NCAA records by catching 69 passes for 1,007 yards last fall. The other end could be Len Frketch, Doug McDougal or Scott Miller, each a letterman.

Prothro has two experienced tackles in Joe Bonilla (218) and Rick Koeper (234), but may lack depth. Ron Doman (188) and Tom Holley (215), moved from tackle, are the guards. Jerry Neil (219), counted to bolster the guard position has been lost for the season because of a knee injury.

At center the Beavers have Hoyt Keeney (211), converted fullback Dick Ruhl (192) and letterman Doug Suckling (211). The Beavers open the season Saturday at Utah and then take on, in order, Colorado, Baylor, Washington, Washington State, Syracuse, Stanford, Indiana, Southern California and Oregon.

Of two injured regular backs just one may be in the offensive starting lineup tonight for Crater, Coach Keith Johnson has reported. Fullback Vern Swanson, who has bruised ribs, and quarterback Darryl Summerfield, who has a banged up ankle, were in pads yesterday. But, Johnson may have only Swanson of the two on the field at the start.
Neufeld at Quarter
The Fireball mentor said that Roger Neufeld will open at quarterback. It will be Swanson or Chuck Taylor at fullback with Sperm Kiger at left halfback and John Hall at right half.
Crater enters the brush tonight after a 7 to 0 verdict over Lebanon of the Valley loop last week. Central, defending A-2 champ, spoiled the 1963 debut of A-1 Sweet Home 30 to 7. Games tonight and next week will enable Crater to see how it compares to Ashland of the Southern Oregon circuit. Ashland is at Lebanon tonight and entertains Sweet Home next Friday.
Reports are that Sweet Home is a gambling team and has variety in its offense. So, the Comets will be on the alert for anything and everything.
Ranks Thin
Sweet Home has reported a problem, which Crater itself has faced through the years—a lack of depth. The Comets will go north described as "quick and strong." That's what Evan Richey, coach of the Lebanon Warriors, called them after the Fireballs pushed his team around all night.
