Chrysler, Ford and American Motors all advanced 1/2 but General Motors dipped 1/2. Du Pont and Monsanto both rose 1/2. Union Carbide tacked on a fraction and Eastman Kodak held unchanged. Oils were narrowly mixed. IBM rose 2 1/2, Beckman 1 1/2 and Litton 1 1/2. Electronic Associates, High Voltage Engineering and Ingersoll-Rand all added a point.

**ROCKEFELLER TO VISIT EAST BERLIN**  
BERLIN (UPI)—New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller will tour the Berlin wall and make a trip to East Berlin when he arrives here Sunday, Sept. 29, city officials said Thursday.

**BANANAS SEEN AS HEART ATTACK PREVENTIVE**  
EDMONTON, Alta. (UPI)—Dr. R. Foster Scott, an associate professor of pathology at the Albany, N.Y., Medical College, said Thursday that the consumption of bananas could prevent many heart attacks in North America. Scott said the diet of East Africans consisted almost totally of bananas and noted that they do not develop hardening of the arteries — a condition that causes heart attacks.

**CEYLON PREMIER TO VISIT SOVIET UNION**  
COLOMBO, Ceylon (UPI)—Premier Mrs. Sirimavo Bandaranaike will visit the Soviet Union Oct. 21 as guest of Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, it was announced today. She will be the first Ceylonese premier to ever visit Russia.

**ADENAUER PREPARES TO VISIT FRANCE**  
BONN (UPI)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer returned Thursday night from a vacation in Italy to prepare for a visit to France. Adenauer, 87, will step down from office next month. He will leave for France Saturday and is scheduled to spend the week end conferring with President Charles de Gaulle.

# Malaysia Welcomes Offer of Mediation

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (UPI)—Prime Minister Tengku Abdul Rahman today welcomed Japan's offer to act as mediator in the crisis between the new nation of Malaysia and neighboring Indonesia. Japanese Premier Hayato Ikeno said Thursday he would like to bring about an amicable settlement of the dispute over Malaysia's formation, which led to a diplomatic break and riots in both Jakarta and Kuala Lumpur.

"This move, as reported, is good," Rahman said. "We'll give consideration to it should Japan make a formal move." Rahman scheduled nationwide radio broadcasts tonight to tell Malaysia's 10 million people of developments in the crisis. He was expected to explain the "state of preparedness" ordered Wednesday, which called up reserves, strengthened the armed forces, and put civil defense measures into effect.

Rahman also called the first meeting of the Malaysian defense council, made up of leading cabinet members and the armed forces chief.

**Woman Lodged by Police After Mishap**  
Nita B. Zumwalt, 49, of 42 Rose ave., Medford, last night was lodged in the Jackson county jail on charges of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, state police said.

Police said her car went off Crater Lake highway near Shady Cove and had sideswiped a pickup truck near Prospect earlier last night. A rear-end collision occurred on the Jacksonville highway at Ross lane yesterday. No injuries were reported. A car driven by Betty Blossom Thompson, 39, of 3290 Jacksonville highway, hit the rear of a car driven by Joyce Claire Sideras, 38, of route 1, box 307, Medford, police said. The Sideras car was making a left turn onto Ross lane at the time. Betty Thompson was cited by police for following too close.

# California Governor Asks Democrats to Force Republicans to Reach Terms With 'Radical Right'

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Thursday night asked western Democrats to "take off the gloves" and force the Republican party to come to terms with the "radical right."

He spoke at a dinner session of the 13-state Western Democratic Conference, alternately attacking the GOP and praising the accomplishments of President John F. Kennedy.

Brown said the Republicans can't "pay lip service to Abraham Lincoln, while they embrace rabble-rousing Birchers who would leave the fate of American Negroes in the tender hands of (Alabama Gov. George) Wallace.

"They can't preach law and order while they swing into line beside those who call for the impeachment of (Chief Justice) Earl Warren — and those who cry 'bomb Cuba now,'" he said.

The California governor said Republicans need to draw a "clear line between the goals of Abraham Lincoln and the objectives of Robert Welch." Welch heads the John Birch Society.

"I call on Democrats to get in the fight to show the Birchers what they are — racists, warmongers, hatemongers and apostles of nothing," Brown told the Democrats.

A large part of Brown's talk was devoted to praise for the Kennedy administration's record in the West.

He said that the administration had reversed the Eisenhower policy of no new starts on water or power projects and had begun work on 74 major projects and 79 smaller projects.

Under Kennedy, he said, agricultural income in the West was boosted by \$100 million in 1961 and 1962 and more federal money was made available to build schools, finance public works and start small businesses.

The governor's address brought prompt reaction from a leading Birch Society spokesman, former Congressman John Roussetot of Los Angeles. Now district governor of the western states, Roussetot described the California chief executive as "an apostle of indecision and a tower of jelly."

In his panel speech, Brown described how voters in 1962 "retired" Roussetot and fellow

Republican Congressman Edgar Hiestand, "who boasted of their John Birch ties."

"I am proud that my fellow Californians could see through the paranoid patriotism of Republican Birchers," he declared. "But the Republicans still defend this unholy alliance — as witness the election of Robert Gaston as president of the Young Republicans of California."

Gaston admitted his election came with support from society members. However, he denied membership.
