**Boise High's Braves Thump Medford's Tornadoes 25-0**

BOISE, Idaho — Boise High school's warpathing Braves, a tribe of warriors aroused and quick, won a football conflict Friday night between aggregations rated No. 1 in their respective states.

They tomahawked the Black Tornado thoroughly 25 to 0 on the Boise Junior college turf.

The Braves, with speed and sharpness, dominated the game from the first quarter. They turned three third-quarter Medford fumbles into touchdowns and scored once more in the final period to route Oregon's Class A-1 defending champs.

The four touchdowns were one more than scored all season against the 1962 version of the Black Tornado. It was the first time since 1958 that four TDs were tallied in a fracas against the Hurricane. And, the Boise victory snapped at 14 a string of Medford gridiron triumphs begun in 1961.

Gentle Goes 41

While the Braves outplayed Medford in the second period, they couldn't reach the Whirlwind end zone until a three-yard romp by Steve Mooney five minutes into the second half.

On the next play Gentle got loose for his TD jaunt. Medford interceptions

hall and ran out the clock. Stastics, unofficial, show the Warrior domination of the play. The Braves ran up 281 net scrimmage yards while holding the Oregon visitors to 79. First downs favored the Braves 14 to five.

Brightest Spots

Medford's brightest offensive spots were off the opening kickoff when they moved from their 24-yard line to the Boise 47 and in the late first panel when they went from their 17 to the Brave 46 with the aid of a face mask penalty. But, other than the one time in the late fourth quarter, they got no closer to the goal than to the Boise 46.

Boise had the ball on the Medford 22, 24 and 25 in the first half.

The Braves took over on the Medford 42 to start on their way to a first touchdown. Morse made a three-yard gain and a face mask infraction against Medford moved the ball to the 24. A Gentle pass to Toney gained to the three and Mooney crossed from there.

The Tornado lost the ball one play after the kickoff on a fumble. On the next play Gentle got loose for his TD jaunt.

Members of the Medford squad stayed overnight with Boise players and yesterday morning began the long bus ride home.

Tim Murray punted for Medford after the Tornado netted a yard loss on its series of downs following the kickoff. Boise has possession on the Medford 42. This time the Idaho top rateds needed just five plays to reach the end zone.

Medford interceptions were by Lance Casebeer, Dick Botterger and Rich Knight (the latter after the ball was deflected by Ron Edmonds). Casebeer's snare was one play before the end of the first half. Driven by tacklers back toward the Medford end zone, he tossed the ball to the side. Medford was penalized half the distance to the goal line for the "forward lateral," and ran the last play of the half from one foot in front of the goal.

Hardrath made six tackles in a row.

"I hope we learned a lot," said Spiegelberg. "Our offense was too slow... We've got a long way to go." He expressed concern about the flanks.

**St. Mary's Trims Glendale Gridders**

St. Mary's of Medford, using its passing game to good advantage and touchdowns on a 72-yard run, overran Glendale high Friday night in a non-league gridiron fray at Glendale.

It was the first win of the season for the Crusaders, who knotted in their season starter, and the second loss for Glendale.

John Batzer threw three touchdowns arias and Eric Jensen one. Dennis Rose was on the scoring end of two throws and Jeff Randolph and Anthony Mete each on one. Tim Sakraida packed on a sweep for the 72-yard play and Batzer crossed for the sixth goal.

Scores were 7 to 7, 14 to 7 and 27 to 14 at the quarters. St. Mary's rolled up 574 scrimmage yards with 302 on passing while the Pirates mounted 263 total yards with 174 on the ground.

The Crusaders connected on 12 of 16 passes and Glendale on seven of 14.

To Randolph For 30

Jensen's TD throw was to Randolph for 30 yards in an offensive thrust that moved out from the SM 40. A Jensen to Randy Corliss pass converted.

Batzer hurled to Dennis Rose for 10 yards and a score following a Mete punt return which netted 40 yards. Batzer threw to Roberts for another point. Second Batzer to Rose TD toss was for 12 yards. Then Batzer chucked to Mete for 17 and a goal with another Batzer toss to Corliss for a bonus.

For his touchdown run Batzer ran 12 yards. He rolled out on an option and reversed his field when he found no receiver open.

Glendale hit pay soil on a 30 yard pass play and a three-yard sweep with both extras being run over.
